Mitt Romney and Rep. John Curtis, both R-Utah, filed a bill to free up 326 acres of land to expand the Bonneville Shoreline Trail. An expansion of a trail bicameral bill called the Bonneville Shoreline Trail Promotions Act would free up more than 20 wilderness areas in Salt Lake and Utah counties. It would also allow the extension of the trail, which skirts along the western edge of the Wasatch mountains. A proposal from two Utah Republicans would loosen the boundaries of management along the sidewalk while nominating nearby U.S. Forest Service lands for permanent protection. The legislation balances creating new recreational opportunities with environmental protections, Curtis said. With a rapidly growing population, Salt Lake and Utah counties need more widely available options to hike, bike, and get out. This legislation will do this in a responsible manner and help pave the way for all Utahns to enjoy this world-class trail. Where the expansion would go at the moment, the trail stretches just over 100 miles along the area where the shoreline of prehistoric Lake Bonneville was. The current plans seek to extend the route another 180 miles. When completed, it would stretch between the Idaho and Nephi borders in Utah. The Bonneville Shoreline Trail provides great outdoor recreation opportunities for Utahns, but several wilderness-designated areas along the route prevent the full use of the sidewalk and ban cyclists in those areas, Romney said. Our solution would adjust the boundaries without increasing the wilderness area to ensure that the route can be completed and fully accessible. Quoted in the release, Utah Gov. Gary Herbert expressed his support for the proposed legislation. Herbert said the trail can also be a good place to rebuild and learn about Utah's history. The Bonneville Shoreline Trail has the potential to be both a beautiful recreational asset for Utah residents and a tool for teaching us about ancient Lake Bonneville and Utah's fascinating geological history. I am very pleased to see the Bonneville Shoreline Trail Promotions Act, which is the next step in the process of developing this beautiful trail, he said. Your help is needed to ask your representative and both U.S. senators to oppose the Bonneville Trail Act, which would shrink the four wildernesses in Utah. The Bonneville Shoreline Trail Promotions Act (S. 4215 and H.R. 7626) was introduced in Congress by Sen. Mitt Romney (R-UT) and Rep. John Curtis (R-UT). This bill would eliminate a total of 334 acres Mount Olympus, Mount Naomi, Twin Peaks, and Lone Peak Wildernesses. All but Mount Naomi are along the Wasatch Front east of the Salt Lake City metropolitan area in Utah. The purpose of shrinking these wildernesses on the Wasatch Front is to create a high-standard, multi-use trail open to mountain bikes. Mountain bikes appear to be the reason for the removal of part of Mt. Naomi Wilderness near Logan as well. Since cycling is not allowed in the designated wilderness, mountain biking trail proponents want to cut out these plots from the four designated wildernesses to develop the trail. The bill would also add 334 acres to the Mount Olympus wilderness, using land that until recently belonged to the Boy Scouts of America but which local wilderness activists have never identified as deserving of wilderness designation. The Bonneville Trail Bill should be opposed for the following reasons: Wilderness designation is supposed to be permanent. Just because metropolitan area growth has reached the boundaries of the wilderness there is no reason to push the boundaries back to accommodate use incompatible with desert designation. This bill sets a bad precedent that could be used elsewhere across the country to cut off parts of the designated wilderness when urban and other housing developments creep too close. This bill is a new and worse version of an earlier land exchange bill supported by some Utah wilderness activists as part of a larger package that included significant new wilderness designations of 8,000 acres, while this bill only allows land exchange and trail development, leaving the rest of the package. The proposed Bonneville Shoreline Trail Promotions Act would release 326 acres of wilderness, divided into more than 20 small locations, to expand the trail in Salt Lake and Utah counties. It would designate 326 acres of wilderness to preserve land previously owned by the Boy Scouts of America in Mill Creek Canyon. It also proposes to solve the problem of wilderness boundaries in Birch Canyon to ensure that a trail that runs parallel to the road would be for multiple use.
