Comparing players from different eras is difficult because the game of football has evolved so much over the years. And unlike some other sports, stats, while a great starting point, are not always the biggest indicator as to who is the best of the best. There are aspects of the game that cannot be measured in numbers. With that in mind, we've taken a look at the careers of many NFL greats and put together this list of the top ten running backs of all time. Mike Powell/Allsport/Getty Images A six-time Pro selection and two-time All Pro, Marcus Allen was the first player ever to gain more than 10,000 rushing yards and 5,000 yards received during his career. Spending time with both the Los Angeles Raiders and Kansas City Chiefs, he was seen as not only an explosive threat from the backfield, but one of the best short-yardage and goal-line runners ever. When Allen retired from the game, he held what was then an NFL record with 123 touchdowns. Overall, he had the ball 3,022 times for 12,243 yards and added 5,411 yards receiving. He also set records in Super Bowl XVIII with a 73-yard touchdown run and 191 yards rushing overall. Focus on sports/Getty Images Marshall Faulk started his NFL career in Indianapolis and was a force out of the backfield for the Colts. But it was his days with the St. Louis Rams for most of which he's most remembered. Playing in one of the most prolific offenses of all time, he was a versatile weapon both as a runner and receiver. And it was his versatility that kept opposing defenses off balance because he was such an effective weapon in the legendary Rams passing offense. The only player in NFL history to have 12,000 rushing yards and 6,000 yards receiving, Faulk is also the only one who has scored over 70 rushing touchdowns and over 30 receiving touchdowns. And that's enough to land a spot on the list of the top ten running backs of all time. John Trainor/Flickr/CC BY 2.0 If longevity was the biggest key in the running backs rankings, Emmitt Smith, who played 15 years in the NFL, would be at the top of the list. But it's not. He is, however, one of the most complete backs to ever play the game. He could run. He could have caught the ball. And it could block. He was also a huge team leader. Smith spent most of his career with the Dallas Cowboys before moving on to the Arizona Cardinals. During this time he became the NFL's all-time rushing leader and played for three Super Groups. He is also the only running back to ever win a Super Bowl championship, the NFL MVP award, the NFL crown rush, and the Super Bowl Most Valuable Player award all in the same season. Focus on sports/Getty Images Due to injury, Gale Sayers played in just 68 games during his NFL career, but because of the way he dominated, there's no doubt that inclusion among the top ten running backs of all time. He popped onto the NFL scene by breaking the record for touchdowns in a season with 22 during his rookie year. And he still holds the record for most touchdowns in a game with six, which also came during his rookie campaign. Before a serious knee injury, Sayers was selected as an All Pro in all of his first five seasons. He also won Rookie of the Year honors in 1965 and is still regarded as perhaps the greatest comeback man to ever play the game. David Madison/Getty Images Drafted by the Los Angeles Rams in 1983, Eric Dickerson quickly established himself as a rising NFL star winning Rookie of the Year, Player of the Year, All Pro, and Pro Bowl honors while setting a rookie record with 1,808 rushing yards and 18 touchdowns on the ground. And that season was just the tip of the iceberg as he went on to vertically and dash his way into an illustrious 11-year NFL career. During his career, Dickerson was named All Pro five times and selected for the Pro Bowl six times. And in 1984, he set a single season record with 2,105 yards rushing as he surpassed the 100-yard mark in 12 games. He is also the fastest of all running backs to have surpassed the 10,000-yard mark by eclipsed the plateau in just 91 games. B Bennett/Getty Images The first and only running back to surpass the 2,000-yard rushing mark in a 14-game season, O.J. Simpson has unfortunately become known more for his notorious off-field activities than his achievements on the field. There is, however, no denying the talent he once possessed while carrying a football. Blessed with an incredible burst, Simpson shot through holes in the line and used his world-class speed to overcome downfield defenders. He retired as the No. 2 ground gain of all time, behind only Jim Brown, and had an NFL-best six 200-yard games. Despite the negative image, he has cultivated since his retirement, no list of the top ten backs of all time would be complete without him. Focus sport/Getty Images With incredible lower-body strength and a low centre of gravity, he was often told that trying to bring down Earl Campbell was like trying to tackle a 245-pound bowling ball. One of the most natural runners in NFL history, he punished defenders with his imposing style of play and simply wore down defenses during a game. Over a three-year period, Campbell led the league in rushing, which was something only Jim Brown had done before. It was also named All Pro Three in the series and was named to five Pro Bowl teams during his eight-year career. His physical game may have led to his career winding down a little shorter than he could have been, but he still managed to carry the ball 2,187 times for 9,407 yards and 74 touchdowns. The Buccaneers defeated the Lions 24-14. Rick Stewart/Getty Images Barry Sanders was perhaps the most elusive and electrifying runner the game has ever seen. His ability to cut to a dime and quickly accelerate to top speed frustrated defenders and made him a threat to score from anywhere on the field at all times. Incredibly, he was named All Pro and made the Pro Bowl in all of his ten seasons. He earned rookie of the year honors as well as an MVP. He also made a lot of records. But he never won a championship. Because of the loss of the culture that was the Detroit Lions, Sanders walked away from the game while still very much in his prime, just 1,457 yards short of Walter Payton's career rushing record. Had he not retired prematurely, he would probably be reigning today as the league's all-time leading rusher. Bill Smith/Getty Images There has never been a more complete run back than Chicago Bears Walter Payton. He was one of the best in the game in running the ball. He was a huge receiver out the back. And he was a prolific blocker who could blow up a blitzing linebacker like no one else. Despite playing most of his career back below average offensive lines, Payton was still a six-time All Pro, was selected to play in nine Pro Bowls, was awarded the NFL MVP, and won a Super Bowl. Also, at the time of his retirement, he held records for most career rushing yards, more combined net yards, most seasons with more than 1,000 yards rushing, most yards rushing in a single game, more rushing touchdowns, and most receptions by a running back. Focus on Sport/Getty Images When watching Jim Brown's tape during his playing days, he seems to be a man playing against boys. And the biggest argument against him being the best running back of all time is the fact that defenders during his generation just weren't as great as they are today. The thing his critics fail to take into account, however, when he makes this argument is that if he played today, he would be initiated into all the latest training techniques and advances in nutrition and would be bigger, stronger, and faster himself. Brown led the NFL in rushing in eight of his nine seasons, and his 5.2 yards-per-carry average is the highest ever among all backs with 750 or more carries. He was also named NFL most valuable player three times during his career. Career.

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
