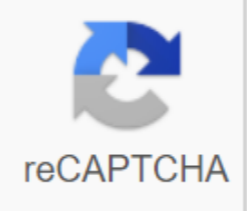

2019 sask hunters and trappers guide

COVID-19 Update: 18 new cases, seven in hospital, 13 more recovery... On 8 October, 18 new cases of COVID-19 were reported in Saskatchewan, bringing the total number of reported cases to 2012. The new cases are found in the Far Northwest (3), Far North (2), Northwest (1), North Central (2), Saskatoon (6), Central East (2), Regina (1) and Southeast (1) zones. Of the 2012 reported cases, 143 are considered active. A total of 1,845 people recovered. Seven people are in hospital. Six people receive inpatient care; five in Saskatoon and one in Regina. One person is in intensive care in Regina. Find out more on ... An online dashboard has been updated to include 13 zones with comprehensive statistical information on COVID-19 activities in these zones. The dashboard can be found by To find your community, use the list on Mehr ansehen Saskatchewan has an automated hunting, fishing and capture license (HAL) system. Licenses are available online at any time, through private issuers, the Ministry of environment and individual provincial park offices, or by calling 1-855-848-4773. For information on hunting fees, firearms rules and season dates, visit saskatchewan.ca/hunting. Anglers will have to create a Hunting, Fishing and Trapping (HAL) identification to purchase a license. It's a one-time need. You can purchase a license using any of the following methods: 1. Online hunting, fishing and capture (HAL) licensing system 2. through private issuers, the Ministry of the Environment and individual provincial parks offices; 3. At 1-855-848-4773 (8:00 a.m. - 9 p.m. Saskatchewan) firearms and all other weapons All weapons, including firearms, mace, tear gas and pepper spray, must be declared by Customs upon arrival. Under Canadian law, visitors are not allowed to import firearms and protective sprays for personal protection. Visitors under the age of at least 18 years of age can import conventional rifles and shotguns for hunting, sports use, competition, travel, or for protection from wildlife in remote areas (except national parks). The import is allowed on condition that the customs is satisfied with the circumstances of the import. Limited firearms include: Most handguns; Semi-automatic rifles and shotguns capable of discharge central fire, have trunks 105 mm (4.14 inches) to 470 mm (18.5 inches) and are otherwise not prohibited; Firearms designed or adapted for firing when reduced to a length of less than 660 mm (26 inches) by folding, telescopic and other means; and firearms By the rules. Prohibited firearms include: pistols with barrels smaller or equal to 105 mm (4.14 inches) long; Pistols designed or adapted to discharge a 25- or 32-caliber cartridge; Firearms adapted from rifles or shotguns by sawing, cutting or any other changes that, when adapted in this way, are less than 660 mm (26 inches) long or have a barrel less than 457 mm (18.5 inches); automatic firearms, whether modified to firearms or not, in the form of semi-automatic firearms; and firearms prohibited by the rules. If you were born after January 1, 1971, you must provide evidence that you have successfully completed Saskatchewan Firearms Safety/Hunter Education Training or a similar recognized course from another jurisdiction before you can buy, hold, or apply for a hunting or seizure license. If you are asked to do so by a license provider, you must present a valid certificate, otherwise you will be denied a license. In addition, all hunters under the age of 18 must be licensed to firearm a minor. Applications can be obtained by calling the Canadian Firearms Center at 1-800-731-4000. A big hunt for big-tailed dill (white-tailed deer, elk and black bear), all hunters require a Saskatchewan Wildlife Habitat Certificate and species license. Some big games require special protection, and only Saskatchewan residents can be hunted. A quota of licenses for both male elk, elk, deer and antelopes are available for the big draw game. All non-residents are big hunters and Canadian resident elk hunters should take advantage of the equipment. Non-resident hunters are allowed a license for one white-head deer of any gender. Non-resident moose permits are available in the north, by allotment for outfitters. Non-resident hunters must find outfitters with permits. Non-residents of Canada are required to use licensed outfitters to hunt large sm, including white-tailed deer, elk and bears. This restriction does not apply to Canadian residents hunting a big game in Saskatchewan other than moose. Visiting the big game hunters must deal directly with outfitters to get the appropriate licenses. Non-residents should contact the Saskatchewan Department of Environment for more information before planning a big game hunt. The Saskatchewan Department of environment provides an annual hunter-hunter and hunter guide available Saskatchewan.ca/environment, setting out new rules, season dates and fees for resident hunters and non-residents. Bird Hunting WATERFOWL For waterfowl hunting you will need a Saskatchewan Wildlife Habitat Certificate, a bird game license, and a Canadian migratory bird hunting permit game and stamp. Canadian permits and stamps are available at Canadian post offices or online permis-permits.ec.gc.ca. can hunt geese, ducks, coots and common snipes. Season dates vary from zone to zone, usually starting in September and lasting until early December. UPLAND GAME BIRDS For hunting wild birds, hunters require saskatchewan Wildlife Habitat Habitat Certificate and a bird game license. Non-residents can hunt for sharp-tailed grouse, Hungarian kuropaty, grouse, spruce grouse and ptarmigan. Non-residents should contact the Saskatchewan Department of The Environment for more information before planning their hunt. Canadian and non-resident onshore bird hunting have season restrictions for sharp-tailed grouse and Hungarian partridge in addition to daily bag restrictions. Each collected bird must be marked with seals granted by the license.
