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Independent Auditors' Report

To the Board of Directors of Community Council of Greater Dallas

Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the Community Council of Greater Dallas (Council) (a nonprofit organization), which comprise the statement of financial position as of September 30, 2021 and the related statements of activities, functional expenses and cash flows for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP); this includes the design, implementation and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditors' Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAS) and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risk of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Opinion

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Community Council of Greater Dallas as of September 30, 2021, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with GAAP

Other Matters

Supplementary Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the financial statements as a whole. The accompanying schedule of expenditures of federal and state awards, as required by Title 2 U.S. Code of Federal Regulations Part 200, Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards and the State of Texas Uniform Grant Management Standards, is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with GAAS. In our opinion, the information is fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the financial statements as a whole.

Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated May 24, 2022 on our consideration of the Council's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the Council's internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the Council's internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

1. Organization

Community Council of Greater Dallas (Council) is a nonprofit, citizen-controlled organization, incorporated to work for human improvement and community betterment. The Council provides planning for voluntary and governmental health, welfare, recreation and other programs of human services. The Council is supported primarily by government grants.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP).

Financial Statement Presentation

Net assets and revenues, expenses, gains and losses are classified based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions. Accordingly, net assets and changes therein are classified as follows:

Net assets without donor restrictions - Net assets not subject to donor-imposed stipulations. Net assets without donor restrictions may be designated for specific purposes by action of the board of directors.

Net assets with donor restrictions - Net assets subject to donor stipulations that will be met by actions of the Council and/or the passage of time. As of September 30, 2021, no such net asset restrictions existed.

Some net assets with donor restrictions include a stipulation that assets provided be maintained permanently (perpetual in nature) while permitting the Council to expend the income generated by the assets in accordance with the provisions of additional donor-imposed stipulations or a board of directors approved spending policy. As of September 30, 2021, no such net asset restrictions existed.

Gains or losses on investments and other assets are reported as increases or decreases in net assets without donor restrictions unless their use is restricted by explicit donor stipulation or by law.

Net assets with donor restrictions whose restrictions expire (that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished) in the same year as the revenue is recognized are classified as revenue without donor restrictions in the statement of activities.

Financial Instruments and Concentrations of Risk

Financial instruments which are potentially subject to concentrations of credit and market risk consist principally of cash, a certificate of deposit and grants receivable. The Council maintains cash balances and the certificate of deposit at financial institutions located in Texas. Accounts at each institution are insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation up to \$250,000. At September 30, 2021, the Council's uninsured balances totaled \$1,184,511. Management has placed these funds with high credit quality financial institutions to minimize risk. The Council has not experienced any losses on such assets.

Grants receivable are unsecured and are primarily due from government agencies. The Council continually evaluates the collectability of grants receivable and maintains allowances for potential losses, if considered necessary. Approximately 75% of grants receivable were due from one government agency.

Certificate of Deposit

The Council has a certificate of deposit totaling \$513,237 with 27 months to maturity at September 30, 2021.

Grants Receivable

The Council maintains receivables due from government agencies for services performed. For government grants and contracts, the excess of reimbursable expenditures over cash receipts is included in grants receivable. Management considers grants receivable to be fully collectible within one year.

Property and Equipment

Property and equipment purchased by the Council are recorded at cost or if acquired by gift, fair market value at the date of the gift. The Council follows the practice of capitalizing all expenditures for property and equipment in excess of \$5,000; the fair value of donated property and equipment is similarly capitalized. Depreciation is calculated using the straight-line method based upon the estimated useful lives of 5 to 10 years.

Revenue Recognition

The Council recognizes contributions when cash, securities or other assets or an unconditional promise to give is received. Unconditional promises to give that are expected to be collected in future years are recorded at the present value of the amounts expected to be collected. All contributions are considered available for unrestricted use unless specifically restricted by the donor.

Conditional contributions are subject to one or more barriers that must be overcome before the Council is entitled to receive or retain funding. Conditional contributions are recognized as revenue at fair value when the conditions have been met. A portion of the Council's revenue is derived from cost-reimbursable federal and state contracts and grants, which are conditioned upon certain performance requirements and/or the incurrence of allowable qualifying expenses. Amounts received are recognized as revenue when the Council has incurred expenditures in compliance with specific contract or grant provisions. The Council received cost reimbursable conditional grants of approximately \$7,640,836 that have not been recognized at September 30, 2021, because qualifying expenditures have not been incurred.

Contributions of services are recorded at estimated fair value if the services received create or enhance nonfinancial assets or require specialized skills, are performed by people with those skills, and would typically need to be purchased if not provided by donation.

Functional Allocation of Expenses

The financial statements report categories of expenses that are attributed to more than one program or supporting function. Therefore, expenses require allocation on a reasonable basis that is consistently applied. The expenses that are allocated include occupancy, office expenses, information technology, and insurance which are allocated on a square footage basis, as well as salaries and wages, benefits, payroll taxes, and professional services which are allocated on the basis of estimates of time and effort.

Compensated Absences

Employees of the Council are entitled to paid vacation, paid sick days and personal days off, depending on job classification, length of service and other factors. The Council recognizes the cost of compensated absences when the vacation, sick days, and personal days are earned by the employees.

Federal Income Tax

The Council is exempt from federal income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC) and has not been classified as a private foundation under Section 509(a) of the IRC. However, income generated from activities unrelated to the Council's exempt purpose is subject to tax under IRC Section 511. The Council did not conduct any unrelated business activities that would be subject to federal income taxes during the year ended September 30, 2021. Accordingly, no provision for income taxes is made in the accompanying financial statements.

GAAP requires the evaluation of tax positions taken in the course of preparing the Council's tax return and recognition of a tax liability or (asset) if the Council has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would be sustained upon examination by the Internal Revenue

Service. Management has analyzed the tax positions taken by the Council and as concluded that as of September 30, 2021, there are no uncertain tax positions taken or expected to be taken that would require recognition of a liability (or asset) or disclosure in the financial statements.

Estimates and Assumptions

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimated.

New Accounting Pronouncements

Changes to GAAP are established by the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) in the form of accounting standards updates (ASUs) to the FASB's Accounting Standards Codification. The Council considers the applicability and impact of all ASUs. ASUs not listed below were assessed and determined to be either not applicable or are expected to have minimal impact on the Council's financial position and change in net assets.

In 2016, the FASB issued its leasing standard in ASU 2016-02, *Leases* for both lessees and lessors. Under its core principle, a lessee will recognize right-of-use assets and related lease liabilities on the statement of financial position for all lease arrangements with terms longer than 12 months. The pattern of expense recognition in the statement of activities will depend on a lease's classification. For not-for-profit organizations, the standard takes effect for fiscal years beginning after December 15, 2021.

FASB issued ASU 2020-07, Presentation and Disclosures by Not-for-Profit Entities for Contributed Nonfinancial Assets, in an effort to increases transparency of contributed nonfinancial assets for not-for-profit (NFP) entities through enhancements to presentation and disclosure. The amendments in this ASU address stakeholders' concerns about the lack of transparency about the measurement of contributed nonfinancial assets recognized by NFPs, as well as the amount of those contributions used in an NFP's programs and other activities. The ASU requires NFPs to present contributed nonfinancial assets (gifts in kind) as a separate line item in the statement of activities.

The ASU also requires the following disclosures:

- Disaggregation of gifts in kind by asset category and corresponding asset value,
- Whether the asset was monetized or used,
- If used a description of the programs or services that used the asset,
- If monetized, information about the reporting entity's monetization policy

- The valuation techniques used to value the asset, including the principal market used to arrive at a fair value measure, and
- A description of any donor-imposed restrictions

The ASU 2020-07 requires the new standard to be applied retrospectively, with amendments taking effect for annual reporting periods beginning after June 15, 2021. The ASU allows for early adoption.

The Council is currently assessing the impact that adopting these new ASU's will have on the financial statements.

5. Line of Credit

The Council had a line of credit with interest at 5.5% which matured in June 2021, at which time all outstanding principal and interest was paid in full.

6. Commitments and Contingencies

In the normal course of business, the Council may become party to various claims, litigations, and assessments. Management is unaware of any such matters may that have a material impact on the financial statements in the event of an unfavorable outcome.

The Council receives government grants that are subject to review and audit by government agencies. These contracts have certain compliance requirements and, should audits by the government disclose any areas of noncompliance, the Council may be required to refund any disallowed costs.

8. Employee Benefit Plan

Effective January 1, 1993, the Council established a 403(b) retirement plan for all full-time employees of the Council with one or more years of service. Under this plan, the Council contributes 3.75% of eligible employees' salaries to the plan. The Council contributed \$115,298 to the plan during the year ended September 30, 2021.

9. Credit Concentration and Economic Dependency

The Council operates entirely within the North Texas area. Therefore, results of operations are subject to the economic conditions of the area.

A significant portion of support and revenue is received from the Texas Department of Aging and Disability Services. For the year ended September 30, 2021, 82% of total revenue was received from the Texas Department of Health and Human Services. Continued funding from this source at current levels is dependent upon various factors. Such factors include economic conditions, compliance with grant provisions, continued government approval, new legislation, donor satisfaction and public perception of mission effectiveness and relative importance.

10. Liquidity and Availability of Resources

The Council has \$4,397,196 of financial assets available within one year of the statement of financial position date to meet cash needs for general expenditure consisting of cash of \$496,231, a certificate of deposit of \$513,237, and grants receivable of \$3,387,728. None of the financial assets are subject to donor or other contractual restrictions that make them unavailable for general expenditure within one year of the statement of financial position date. The grants receivable are expected to be collected within three months. The Council has a policy to structure its financial assets to be available as its general expenditures, liabilities, and other obligations become due.

11. Subsequent Events

The Council evaluated subsequent events through the date the financial statements were available to be issued and concluded that no additional disclosures are required.

1. Basis of Presentation

The accompanying schedule of expenditures of federal and state awards (Schedule) includes the federal and state grant activity of Community Council of Greater Dallas (Council). The information in this Schedule is presented in accordance with the requirements of Title 2 U.S. Code of Federal Regulations Part 200, Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards (Uniform Guidance) and the State of Texas Uniform Grant Management Standards (UGMS). Because the Schedule presents only a selected portion of the operations of the Council, it is not intended to and does not present the financial position, changes in net assets, or cash flows of the Council.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Expenditures reported on the Schedule are reported on the accrual basis of accounting. Such expenditures are recognized following the cost principles in the Uniform Guidance or the UGMS, wherein certain types of expenditures are not allowable or are limited as to reimbursement. The Council has not elected to use the 10 percent de minimis indirect cost rate as allowed under the Uniform Guidance.

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements, we considered Community Council of Dallas' (Council) internal control over financial reporting (internal control) to determine the audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Council's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the Council's internal control.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct, misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control, such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected on a timely basis. A significant deficiency is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses or significant deficiencies. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

Purpose of this Report

The purpose of this report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the Council's internal control or on compliance. This report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the Council's internal control and compliance. Finding No. 2020-001: Statement of financial position account reconciliations — material weakness

Summary: CCGD is responsible for presenting financial statements that are fairly stated in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Bank accounts, receivables, prepaid expenses, fixed assets, payables, accrued expenses, and deferred revenue were not properly reconciled at year end. Timely reconciliation of these accounts were not taking place, resulting in material adjustments during the prior audit.

Status: This finding was corrected in 2021.
