They are related to medicine, MD-PhD programs, dentistry, pharmacy, physiotherapy, nursing, and so on. Your mother calls you and asks you to help with an important family decision. Your maternal grandfather is 70 years old and diagnosed with a disease that will kill him in the next five years. It may have a procedure that will correct the disease and not leave it with any long-term problems, but the procedure has 10% mortality. He wants to do the procedure, but your mother doesn't want him to do it. How would you help tap this question?8. You're a genetic consultant. One of your clients, Linda, had a boy with a genetic defect that may have a high risk of relapse, which means that her subsequent pregnancy has a high chance of being affected by the same defect. You offered genetic testing to Linda, her husband and their son to learn more about their illness, to which everyone agreed. The result showed that neither Linda nor her husband carried the mutation, while the boy inherited a mutation on his father's chromosome that did not come from Linda's husband. In other words, the boy's biological father is someone else who doesn't know he's carrying mutations. You suspect Linda and her husband know about this non-fatherhood. How would you reveal the results of this genetic analysis to Linda and her family? What principles and whom should you consider in this case?9. In the emergency room, the woman gets pain in her abdomen. She undergoes a CT and is diagnosed with an abdominal aortic aneurysm. Doctors tell her that the only way to solve the problem is through surgery, and that the chances of survival are about 50/50. They also tell her that time matters and that if the aneurysm bursts, she will be dead within minutes. This woman is an exotic dancer; she worries that the operation will leave a scar that will negatively affect her work; therefore, she refuses any surgical treatment. Even after strong pressure from doctors, she categorically refuses surgery. Feeling that the woman is not in her proper state of mind and knowing that time matters, surgeons decide to perform the procedure without consent. They anaesthetize her and surgically restore the aneurysm. She survives and sues the hospital for millions of dollars. Do you think that a doctor's actions can be justified anyway? Is it ever right to take away someone's autonomy?10. You are a general practitioner and the mother comes to your office with her child who complains of flu-like symptoms. When you enter the room, you ask the boy to take off his shirt and notice a bruising pattern on the boy's torso. You ask the mother where the bruises came from and she tells you they are from a procedure she performed on him known as cao gio, which is also known as the coin. The procedure involves rubbing warm oils or gels on a person's skin with a coin or other flat metal object. The mother explains that cao gio is used to boost bad blood, and to improve circulation and healing. When you touch the boy's back with a stethoscope, he is in pain from the bruises. A post that recently appeared on the web warned readers about the dangers of aspartame (artificial sweetener - Nutrasweet, Equal) as the causes of the epidemic of multiple sclerosis (progressive chronic disease of the nervous system) and systemic lupus (multi-systemic autoimmune disease). The biological explanation was provided that at body temperature aspartame releases wood alcohol (methanol), which turns into mimic acid, which is in the same class of drugs as cyanide and arsenic. According to them, creamy acid causes metabolic acidosis. Clinically, aspartame poisoning was claimed to cause joint pain, numbness, convulsions, dizziness, headaches, depression, anxiety, slurred speech, and blurred vision. How to prepare for MMI? MMI is different from any other interview format, so the best way to prepare is by participating in full-length mock MMIs and practicing with sample questions. MMI simulations in particular are useful because you will be able to participate in an experience that mimics how actual MMI will be conducted. What better way for you to learn how to answer any type of question, work at your pace, manage stress and anxiety levels, and get personalized feedback on your answers? It is important that you participate in realistic simulations, as this recreates the stress that you will feel during a real MMI. You will also want to make sure that you have enough stamina, as many students may start to feel tired by the middle if they have not had enough practice. It is highly recommended to make sure that you receive expert feedback, so that from professionals who have gone through this process or studied reception and interviews. Although students often practice with family and friends, this is usually not good enough, as family and friends cannot be truly objective in their feedback. For all these reasons, we recommend THE PRACTICE OF PERFECT. If you don't get expert feedback and then tweak the interview strategy, you just cement poor habits and end up running poorly on the real thing. Several mini-interviews are sometimes compared to the speed of acquaintance; Test-takers address a hint or a question at the station, and when the buzzer rings, they should move to the next station. Of course, MMI is much more complex than speed dating. First, students will have 1.5-2 minutes to read a question or script, known as a hint, which is outside the interview room. Once their two minutes are up, they will enter the room and discuss the appraiser's tip for 4-8 minutes - each school can set a slightly different timer here. The ring bell will signal the end of available time at this station, and students should stop their discussion and move on to the next station. Students will continue to rotate between 6-12 before their interview is completed. At some stations, students may have to interact with an actor who plays a role, teach the appraiser how to do the task, or even even with other students to solve the problem. Will I be asked any questions in the interview room? Throughout the MMI, it is likely that you will come across some MMI to follow up on the issues. The appraiser may ask a question or two after you have finished discussing the clues. Not all stations will forget you the next question, but it's a good idea to be prepared for any questions if they are asked.4 What are the most common types of MMI questions I will encounter? While there are many different types of MMI questions, the most common questions you will encounter are: Scenario/Policy/Personal/rkyCollaboration based onActing/Ensure you look through relevant messages to see how to answer each type of question using an effective and organized strategy. Why do I even need to know that there are different types of questions? However, you cannot prepare for all possible content that may come on the day of the interview. Hints may contain scenarios related to almost any type of situation, and it would be impossible to prepare in this way. However, identifying the most common types of questions will allow you to have a strategy and approach to any of these types. This will allow you to formulate an effective response no matter what request you receive.6. Who can be assessed? MMI appraisers can vary from school to school, but in general, they can be professors, other teachers, practicing professionals, students, or any other person. It is important to note that your evaluators do not necessarily have experience in the expected field of learning.7. Will I have a copy of the clue in the interview room or should I remember it? It's entirely up to the school; However, it is most common to have a hint available inside the interview room. If this information has not been provided in the interview materials, you will want to contact the school to find out if this is the case. In addition, you can also ask about the duration of each station and whether you are allowed to take notes in pen and paper.8 If I was given 8 minutes at the station, should I talk all the time? Your goal in MMI is not to take total time, it is to provide an in-depth, concise argument or discussion that considers the request in its entirety. For this reason, it is best to practice responding to a request without taking all the time, so you are sure that your response remains strong throughout. Don't try to maximize the length of your response if it means you'll be repeating the information you've already discussed, adding off-topic information, or finding yourself rambling incoherently. Another finishing your answer before the buzzer buzzer is that it gives the interviewer the opportunity to ask you any follow-up questions that may help strengthen or clarify your answer. If you feel you have given an organized and concise but in-depth response without feeling the need to keep talking. Don't be shy about answering carefully. What if the interviewer doesn't have any follow-up questions? Not feeling the need to keep talking or offering up a small conversation of any kind. MMI interviewers are often instructed not to interact much with students, so they cannot say anything. Just sit still and wait for your interview to be finished. You should get comfortable sitting silently. If your interviewer takes the lead in asking questions about small talk, go ahead and interact with them, but let them take the lead.10 What do I do when I first enter the interview room? The very first thing you need to do is introduce yourself! MMI may feel like a weird and stilted interview, but it's still important to start with a great first impression. For example, as an introduction, you could say: Hello, my name is X, thank for interviewing me today. Can I have your name?. Similarly, you still have to thank your interview as soon as it's time for you to move on to the next station. In conclusion you can say: Thank you, Dr. B, for not having the right time to interview me today. It was very nice to talk to you. The introduction and conclusion ensures that your first and last impressions will be professional and polished, leaving the interviewer a positive impression of you.11. I feel very stressed! What should I do? First, feeling stressed is normal. Admit that these are normal feelings for high-stakes interviews! In the long run, training and strategy are important. Make sure you practice effectively by taking part in a realistic mock interview with an expert personalized feedback. Next, approach your practice in manageable pieces, instead of having endless hours every day and burning yourself. Finally, exercise, proper nutrition, and sleep well are essential for stress management. For short-term stress management the day before and in the day, make sure you check the campus if you've never been so you know where to go for an interview. The day before the interview is not the time to do hours of practice; Instead, try to do something relaxing like go for a walk, read a book or watch a funny movie. Dissuade your family members and friends from asking you about the interview until it's over, since you don't want to keep thinking about it and getting stressed. Get a good night's sleep the night before and don't forget at least 30 minutes early to give time for parking and navigating the interview room. If you're nervous outside the interview room, try these relaxation tips: Take a small sip of water. The practice of deep breathing. Take 2 Graph breathe through the nose and 4 counts to exhale through the mouth. Suppose a winning pose: Stand up straight and put your shoulders back, place your feet firmly in the ground and make sure your chin rises. Visualize a soothing place (resting place) or receive an acceptance letter to increase trust. Relax your jaw, smiling.12 Can I just read about my MMI online or should I really practice? You absolutely need to practice! MMI is a complex interview format, so to master it, you have to practice. Ideally, you should engage in a realistic simulation - so that it should be accustomed, have to repeat the actual terms of the interview, and you should dress accordingly. It is also smart to get feedback from an objective, knowledgeable professional so you know what you have done well and what to improve; Otherwise, you run the risk of cementing bad habits. You can't learn to ride a bike just by reading about it online and interviews are no different. I use a lot of wit or like it when I speak. Help! Filler words are common in day-to-day speech, but they can distract appraisers and can give the impression that you are nervous or that your thoughts are disjointed. To combat this issue, first, realize that your filler word (a um, er, like, so, you know, etc.). Next, work on eliminating these from your day-to-day speech by taking a brief pause instead of saying the word filler and then continuing with the rest of your sentence. You can control the use of the word filler by recording your responses and watching them; calculate how many words filler you use to respond and work to reduce that number gradually.14. Aside from practicing with sample questions and engaging in realistic simulations, what else can I do to prepare? One of the most important things to do to prepare for MMI is to read about hot topics in medicine, or your health field, as well as current and future challenges in your profession. Politics interview questions are quite common for MMIs and you need to be able to present the pros and cons of each policy while understanding enough about the topic to pick a face and defend it. If you are not on top of current problems and problems in this area, you will really struggle to answer these types of questions properly. Subtle answers show a lack of knowledge, a lack of maturity and a lack of interest in the area that you hope to continue. It is also a good idea to explore the school you are interviewing to learn as much as possible. Take a look at their mission statement, values, and any aspects of their program or school that interest you most. If you have not yet been provided with specific information about your MMI, do not be afraid to contact school to find out how many stations you come across, whether there's a clue in the room if you can bring a notepad and a pen, and and The length of each station. Knowing the specifics of your MMI in advance can help you prepare effectively and reduce stress levels as you already know what to expect. Finally, review AACM's core competencies to make sure your answers demonstrate the qualities and traits you need to succeed in your expected profession. You should try to come up with a real experience when you have demonstrated these competencies, since your answers should have specific show details, not just tell your skills.15 How can I make the most of the time outside the interview room? Time outside the room is as important as the time inside it. Make sure you read the request carefully at least twice before formulating a response. You want to make sure you understand this and have any instructions carefully. Next, determine what type of question it is and figure out the main points that you want to do. Each answer should have 3 to 4 main points to make sure it is not too long or too short. You should also have order points in mind, so your response is organized. If you have a piece of paper, you can write down the highlights to help in your organization. If the program does not provide a piece of paper, you will need to keep this in mind in your head. Tip: Practice without a piece of paper, so you're ready to do it on the day of the interview. Please keep in mind that programs can change the rules at any time without giving you advance notice, so you should be prepared for this even if they have given students paper in the past.16 Do the interviewers know anything about me? Interviewers won't know anything about you. MMIs are private interviews, meaning interviewers have not seen anything in your app and only know your name. This contrasts with open interviews, which may include some panel or traditional interviews where interviewers have seen some or all of your documents and can ask you anything in them.17 What if my program does a hybrid of MMI and panel/traditional interviews? Programs often combine two types of interviews into a hybrid format. You can have a full or half length MMI and then a panel or a one-on-one interview. For these types of interviews, you need to be fully prepared to deal with both parts. Check out both types of interviews and strategies we recommend in our blogs. TIP: All types of questions can pop up on all types of interviews. Although the scripts are common on MMIs, they can also pop up on the interview panel. Strategies for answering different types of questions do not change regardless of the type of interview.18 What is MMI valued? MMI will score each student at each station themselves. Interviewers do not see each other, so the student gets as many points as there are stations. On station you'll be Scored on: The power of your content. How strong and convincing are your ideas and arguments? Your communication skills. You are judged not only by the strength of what you say, but also by the way you say it. Are you calm and professional in your speech? Do you have many words filler? Do you seem relaxed or are you looking around and fidgeting? Remember that you are showing professional skills here. You have to seem ready to communicate clearly, calmly and succinctly. Your suitability for the profession in which you apply. Do you seem mature, thoughtful, empathetic, reflexive and altruistic? Your answers show you thinking about yourself or jumping to conclusions or are you seeking to gather information and consider the needs of others before yours?19. How important is my assessment of the interview really? An interview is an important part of your post-interview score and not preparing for it is a common factor with students who get rejected. Once you've been interviewed, most schools reserve spots (or only) weigh the interview results in the final decision. In addition, there are many students who get admitted each year to professional schools without perfect statistics. Even for competitive medical school programs, students get admitted with GPAs 3.5 or MCAT scores below 510. Their experience certainly played a part in getting the interview, but their interview speeches were probably also extremely strong to get them accepted.20 Medical schools say there is no real way to prepare for MMI and I have to be myself. They also say there are no right or wrong answers. It's true? In a nutshell, no! If there was no way to prepare and there would be wrong or correct answers, wouldn't everyone get caught? The truth is that there are relevant and inappropriate answers and approaches, and you should look at our strategies for each type of question to learn more about how to approach each one. Also, we don't want you to be just yourself: We want you to present your best self. In our day-to-day lives, we have many different aspects of our personalities that we can deduce or suppress. It's okay to wear sweatpants and a living room on the couch during your vacation, but you would never just be yourself and wear sweatpants for a job, right? In the same way, you wouldn't just respond the same way you would to have members of your family or friends in a professional school interview. To consistently demonstrate your most mature, professional and thoughtful self, you must practice and prepare.21. How long should I have to prepare for MMI? Can I just take a crash course? As we noted earlier, you should do PERFECT practice and get expert feedback to improve your interviewing skills. Crash courses, books and online guides can't do it for you and are therefore ineffective on their own. You have to start preparing for at least 6 weeks, if not more, before the interview date. Keep in mind that some programs only give notice for a week or two before the interviews are scheduled, so you should start training before you even hear from the schools where you applied. Six or more weeks allows you to spread your practice and actually implement strategies slowly and consistently so you see improvement over time and cement good habits.
