MHSAA D2 Football Back-to-Back State Champs

What a D2 football state championship finish at Ford Field for St. Mary's, the back-to-back champs! The win marks the 10th State Championship in program history.

On Friday, November 28, the Eaglets soared to a big win (51-14) both on offense and defense over Dexter, a team that made its first appearance at a State Championship. Quarterback Jabin Gonzales had four touchdown passes and was named player of the game. In the first half, he passed to junior Lorenzo Barber, senior Reece Hurst who returned it 27 yards deep into Dexter territory, and Daniel Taylor who finished the half with another TD. At the half, the Eaglets were up 24-14.

In the third quarter, Brandon Adams Jr. ran another TD in for 65 yards (31-14) and several points later Lorenzo Barber scored making the game (45-14).

Brannon Hardy sealed the deal in the fourth quarter with a 27-yard touchdown to finish the game and define OLSM's championship feat! Way to go, OLSM offense and defense! Leading in sacks was senior Gage Nessen. Reece Hurst and junior Caden Blankenberg recorded interceptions. Overall, the

win was fueled by a big collective team effort with multiple playmakers on both sides of the ball.

"It's great for the program, community and all the alumni who came out for the game," said Jermaine Gonzales, head coach and OLSM Athletic Director. "Last year's State Championship win was really special, and this year's group is my first football class when I got the coaching and AD job so it's an extra special moment for us to get a back-to-back state championship."

REFLECTION

In December we focus on the celebration of the Nativity of our Lord Jesus Christ, which in fact is one of the most important solemnities in our Liturgical calendar. Christmas is preceded by Advent (from Latin "ad-venire" meaning "to come to,"), which is a time of preparation for the coming of the Lord. It encompasses the four Sundays (and weekdays) that precede Christmas. This year the first Sunday of Advent was Nov 30. Our preparation in Advent has a double focus.

In the first part of Advent, we are preparing for the second coming of Christ at the end of time, while in its second part, from December 17 to December 24, our focus is on preparation for the celebration of the anniversary of Our Lord's birth on Christmas.

St. John Paul II in his homily on the First Sunday of Advent, November 29, 1998, while proclaiming the Jubilee Year, made the following remarks concerning Advent:

In the Words of

ST. JOHN PAUL II

"Let us go joyfully to meet the Lord" These are the words of the Responsorial Psalm for today's liturgy of the First Sunday of Advent, a liturgical season which from year to year renews our expectation of Christ's coming. In Advent, we await an event which occurs in history and at the same time transcends it. As it does every year, this event will take place on the night of the Lord's Birth. The shepherds will hasten to the stable in Bethlehem; later the Magi will arrive from the East. Both the one and the other in a certain sense symbolize the entire human family. The exhortation that rings out in today's liturgy: "Let us go joyfully to meet the Lord" spreads to all countries, to all continents, among every people and nation ...

For this reason, the refrain, "Let us go joyfully to meet the Lord" sounds so appropriate. We can meet God, because he has reached out to us. He did so as the father in the parable of the prodigal son (cf. Lk 15:11-32), because he is rich in mercy, dives in misericordia, and wants to meet us from wherever we come and wherever our journey is taking us.

"God comes to us whether we have sought him, ignored him and or even avoided him. He reaches out to us first; his arms open wide like a loving merciful father ..."

In todav's Gospel we heard the Lord's invitation to be watchful: "Watch. therefore, for you do not know on what day your Lord is coming". And then immediately: "Therefore vou also must



be ready; for the Son of man is coming at an hour you do not expect" (Mt 24:42, 44). The exhortation to be watchful resounds many times in the liturgy, especially in Advent, a season of preparation not only for Christmas, but also for Christ's definitive and glorious coming at the end of time. It therefore has a distinctly eschatological meaning and invites the believer to spend every day and every moment in the presence of the One "who is and who was and who is come" (Rv 1:4), to whom the future of the world and of man belongs. This is Christian hope! Without this prospect, our existence would be reduced to living for death.

SHRINE OF ST. JOHN PAUL II: JUBILEE YEAR PILGRIMAGE SITE

Did you know that the Archdiocese of Detroit has designated our Shrine Chapel at Orchard Lake one of 12 Detroit-area pilgrimage sites ahead of the Jubilee 2025; a place for pilgrims to visit and receive a plenary indulgence?

The Church celebrates ordinary jubilees every 25 years. In December 2024, the late Pope Francis ushered in the Holy Year 2025 by opening the Holy Doors of St. Peter's Basilica in Rome for a year of grace, forgiveness and renewal — centered on the theme, "Pilgrims of Hope."

In 1470, Pope Paul II established the practice of celebrating jubilees every 25 years, instead of 50, to allow more people to experience a Holy Year within their lifetimes.

As we enter the quiet, expectant beauty of December, I find myself reflecting on a deeply meaningful month at the Polish Institute. November is always a time of remembrance, gratitude, and connection. This year it brought together the very heart of who we are as

Polish Americans: people shaped by faith, heritage, history, and community.

ANNUAL DAY OF SERVICE | Throughout November we observed All Saints' and All Souls' Days, sacred moments in our Catholic tradition that call us to remember those who have gone before us. This spirit of remembrance carried into our annual Day of Service at Holy Sepulchre Cemetery (Read more about it on page 13).

POLISH INDEPENDENCE DAY & VETERANS

DAY | We then honored two significant observances that fall on the same date. Polish Independence Day and American Veterans Day share November 11, a powerful convergence for Polish Americans. One marks the restoration of a free Poland after generations of struggle. The other honors the service and sacrifice of those who defended the United States. For our community this shared date carries a profound message. It reflects the dual loyalty, pride, and gratitude held by generations whose families fought for freedom in both homelands and whose stories continue to shape the identity of Polish Americans today.

RECLAIMING POLISH HERITAGE | In November we also had the privilege of hosting Miller Canfield counsel for a Polish citizenship seminar in partnership with the Kościuszko Foundation, Michigan Chapter. Many families joined us to learn about reclaiming their heritage. These gatherings

remind us that our identity is living and active and that our Institute plays a unique role in helping Polish Americans stay connected to their roots.

FPA CLOSING CEREMONY | The Friends of Polish Art Fine Art Competition Closing Ceremony in the Galeria came alive with conversation as several artists shared the stories, techniques, and inspirations behind their pieces, including Nancy Kozłowski, winner of the FPA Richard Kubiński Award for Best in Show for her work Rzepak (2020). It was a joy to learn how their work continues to inspire reflection, curiosity, and pride within our community.

TREE LIGHTING PERFORMERS | At the annual Tree Lighting on November 23, Cantemus Domine, the adult choir from Our Lady of Czestochowa Church in Sterling Heights, offered a beautiful a cappella performance inside the Galeria, followed by a Polish and English Christmas carol sing-along outdoors. We extend heartfelt thanks to Justyna Pal for her magnificent direction. Guests explored the Galeria from 4:00 to 8:00 PM and viewed our winter exhibit featuring selections from the Polish Institute collection.

CONCERT & STUDENT SEMINAR | On

November 30 we welcomed soprano Dominika Zamara and pianist Vanessa Kwiatkowski for *Echoes of Europe: Arias and Songs from Poland and Beyond.* The concert proved to be the perfect post-Thanksgiving gathering for families and friends, filled with Polish, Italian, and French repertoire. Dominika, who is from Poland and joined us directly from a performance at Carnegie Hall, also offered a seminar for the Girls Division and the music classes at St. Mary's Preparatory. It was an honor to give our students the opportunity to learn from an international artist whose career reflects both discipline and passion.

Polish Citizenship by Descent Seminar Helps Many Renew

Connections to POLAND

Last month, the Polish Institute of Culture & Research at Orchard Lake, working in partnership with the Kościuszko Foundation Michigan Chapter. welcomed a full room of guests to the Galeria for an in-depth seminar on Polish citizenship by descent. The level of interest confirmed how many individuals and families are seeking to renew their connection to Poland through formal recognition of their heritage. The session was led by two highly respected experts. Richard Walawender, Honorary Consul of the Republic of Poland in Detroit, joined us on campus, while Dr. Andrzej Kiedrzyn, senior counsel with Miller Canfield in Warsaw, connected with attendees via Zoom. Together they offered a clear and comprehensive introduction to the principles that govern Polish citizenship law.

Throughout the presentation, our speakers outlined the fundamental criteria that applicants must meet, including verified lineage, citizenship at birth, continuity of citizenship across generations, and the documentation required to demonstrate each element. They also highlighted the value

of citizenship by descent, noting that it allows individuals of Polish ancestry to reclaim an important part of their identity and benefit from the opportunities linked to European Union citizenship.

Mr. Walawender walked attendees through the legal pathways available for acquiring citizenship, explaining how one's personal history, family circumstances, residence, and marital status can shape the best route forward. His explanation of the major legal categories helped participants understand the steps most relevant to their own situations.

We extend our heartfelt thanks to both Mr. Walawender and Dr. Kiedrzyn for sharing their expertise and engaging our community in such an informative and thoughtful discussion. We are grateful as well to everyone who took the time to attend and participate. The Polish Institute is proud to support programs that strengthen Polish heritage and deepen community understanding. We look forward to welcoming you at our upcoming events.




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HONORING November 11

A Shared Story of Service and Freedom

November 11 holds deep meaning for our community. It is both Polish Independence Day and Veterans Day in the United States. On this day in 1918, at the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month, the First World War came to an end. For Poland, it marked the long-awaited restoration of independence. For the United States, it became a day to honor all who have served in its armed forces. For Polish Americans, these histories are forever intertwined.

During a recent visit to the Polish Soldiers Cemetery and the Orchard Lake Schools graves at Holy Sepulchre Cemetery in Southfield, we came upon a weathered bronze grave marker, almost lost beneath brush and overgrowth. After clearing the marker, a story began to emerge—one of a nearly forgotten Polish American who served with courage in the First World War. Joseph Frank Przybylski, the son of Polish immigrants in Michigan, enlisted in 1918 at the age of 23. He served as a private in the 102nd Engineers, part of the 27th Infantry Division. His grave bears the notation "PH," marking him as a recipient of the Purple Heart. The official application for his headstone, filed by his widow Julia, confirms this honor.

The full details of his wounding are unknown, but records suggest it may have occurred near Ypres in Belgium, where the 27th Division fought under temporary British command. The 102nd Engineers were responsible for maintaining communications with the front lines, repairing telephone wires under fire and, when necessary, carrying messages by hand through the trenches. It was dangerous, essential work.

Joseph Przybylski represents one of the hundreds of thousands of Polish Americans who have served—and continue to serve—with distinction in the United States armed forces. Their stories, often quiet and unrecorded, helped shape both nations.

As we reflect on November 11, we honor the generations who fought for Poland's freedom, the men and women who served under the American flag, and those whose sacrifices lie etched in stone across our cemeteries. Their legacy is our inheritance, and their memory remains our responsibility.

Polish Christmas Eve Traditions the Beauty of WIGILIA



Christmas Eve has always held a special place in the hearts of Polish families. It is a night filled with quiet meaning, gentle ritual, and a sense of belonging that reaches back through generations.

The opłatek is always the first to be shared. This simple wafer, embossed with scenes of the Nativity, carries a deeper purpose. It symbolizes

forgiveness, unity, and the hope that peace will remain in our homes. When families break the opłatek, they offer blessings to one another and speak from the heart. It is one of the most intimate and beautiful moments of the evening.

The Wigilia table is prepared with care. A white obrus (tablecloth) reminds us of the purity and simplicity of the manger. Many tuck a bit of hay underneath as a quiet nod to the stable where Christ was born. The meal itself is meatless and made up of 12 dishes, each one representing the apostles and the fullness of the blessings we hope for in the coming year.

Children watch the sky for the first star. Only when that star appears may everyone gather at the table, pray together, break the opłatek, and begin the feast. It is a small moment, but one that brings the whole family together in anticipation and joy.

And there is the old Polish belief that on this one night animals can speak. It is a gentle reminder that all of creation rejoices at the birth of Christ, and that Wigilia is a night when the ordinary world feels touched by something sacred.

These traditions have traveled with Polish families across oceans and generations, continuing to shape Christmas Eve in our homes, reminding us of who we are and where we come from.

Wesolych Świat Bożego Narodzenia. May your Wigilia be peaceful, warm, and filled with the joy of tradition.
