Honoring the Life and Legacy of St. Mary's Founder Sister Rose

It is with great sadness that we share that St. Mary Development founder Sister Rose Wildenhaus passed away peacefully on August 11. Sr. Rose was 86. Her life was lived in service of others and in dedication to God.

Sr. Rose grew up in Dayton as a member of the St. Mary Parish. She entered Sisters of the Precious Blood in 1954, and embarked on a long career of improving the lives of others. In the first part of her career, she spent 21 years serving children as a teacher and principal. She went on to dedicate 30 years to her life to improving the lives of older adults through St. Mary Development.

Her work on St. Mary began nine years before the official start of the organization, when she met Dick McBride in 1980. The two were on a committee that aimed to spread God's love to those experiencing poverty, racism, lack of access to quality education, and other social justice issues. The two connected on that committee and found themselves frequently talking. Eventually they wanted to do more than talking. They wanted to act. But to start, they prayed.

During those days, Dick went to Mass at St. Leonard Seminary in Centerville, but participation in the seminary was dwindling and the Franciscans were considering selling the 240-acre campus. While other organizations would have paid millions for the property,

On the surface, everyone understands what it means to get older; as the years pass, our bodies, minds, and lives change. We may look different and feel different, some new problems may arise while others go away. But when we dig deeper, the aging process is much more complex. Being educated on what happens as we age presents an opportunity to navigate aging more confidently and better informed – which is the aim of the WISE program.

Wellness Initiative for Senior Education (WISE) is an educational program that helps seniors better understand the aging process so they can make healthy, life-enhancing choices. The program originated at the New Jersey Prevention Network in 1996, and has since been implemented in more than 1,300 community and senior centers across the nation, reaching more than 40,000 older adults.



"This model emphasizes how what's going on inside me is going to impact what's going on outside of me," said Steven Gregory, Prevention Specialist and Service Coordinator for St. Mary. Steven has taught four rounds of the WISE program across multiple St. Mary communities, and has seen more than 40 residents go through the program.

The program leverages a bio-psycho-social model, which empowers a holistic view of wellness that looks inward and outward, addressing biological factors like hormones, anxiety, and depression, psychological factors like how we think and process the world around us, and social factors like how we interact with other people. The six-week program is made of weekly lessons that introduce participants to thematic aging topics, including:

- **1. The Changes Associated with Aging:** Discovering the factors that contribute to aging other than the passing of time
- **2. Aging Sensitivity:** Exploring what age means in our society, how aging is different now than it was in the past, and the body systems impacted by aging
- **3. Cultural and Generational Diversity:** Creating space to appreciate cultural and age differences
- **4. Medication:** Introducing core concepts around medication safety, substance misuse, and prevention
- **5. Substance misuse and addiction:** Understanding addiction and how to recognize and prevent it
- **6. Enhanced Quality of Life:** Improving life with exercise, meditation, social activity, and more

While these topics certainly provide life-enhancing tools for residents to leverage, Steven says the power of the WISE program is much simpler than that; It's an opportunity to learn.



"Usually seniors learn about Medicare and Medicaid. They learn about facts, figures, and forms. But we often miss that they're still thirsty for education. They still want to learn things. You can never underestimate how important it is to give people opportunities to educate themselves on more than insurance and planning," said Steven.

That was the case with Arnesta Russell, a St. Mary resident who said the WISE program was like being back in college. She loved the opportunity to learn new information, discuss it, socialize, ask questions, and contribute.

"WISE empowers residents to share information with their neighbors and siblings, enhancing not just their lives but the lives of those around them," said Steven. "Sometimes we miss that positive social interactions and education can really have an impact."

"I often say God just pushed us. He dropped stuff in our lap. We wouldn't have something, and by golly if somebody didn't come knocking at the door and say 'I think I'd like to work for a nonprofit.' How did that happen except that God brought that to us?"

That single dollar set the course for decades of meaningful, life-changing work the two would do together through St. Mary Development. Up to 2000, Dick and Sr. Rose created 1,480 affordable housing units. Between 2000 and 2013, they created an additional 1,574 affordable housing units. If you total all the people living in St. Mary homes, it adds up to homes for almost 9,000 people. Seniors, families, and children – 9,000 people who have a place to sleep each night. 9,000 people who have a place to call home. That's quite a legacy from two people who followed God's call and trusted in God's help.

"When we sit back now and look at it, it's just an amazing thing that God has worked through us and we were smart enough in most instances to wait until God told us what to do before we jumped in."

- Inclusionary Housing Programs: Policies and Practices
- Rebuilding America's Legacy Cities: New Directions for the Industrial Heartland
