Passing of Jim Tovey

It was with great sadness and shock that we learned of the sudden passing of City of Mississauga Ward 1 Councillor Jim Tovey on January 15, 2018.

Jim was a passionate advocate for, and supporter of, heritage preservation and natural conservation, and a true visionary who looked to make Ward 1, Mississauga and the world a better place.

Jim was one of the driving forces behind many endeavors, notably the Small Arms Society, the adaptive reuse of the Small Arms Building, the Lakeview Legacy Project, Inspiration Lakeview, and the Lakeview Waterfront Connection, just to name a few.

After many years as an active resident and citizen

member of the City's Heritage Advisory Committee, he was elected to Mississauga City Council in 2010, representing Ward 1. A true Heritage Hero, Jim served on many Boards and advisory committees, including serving as a Board Member for Heritage Mississauga.

Jim was born and raised in Malton, and was a long-time resident of Lakeview.

Our thoughts are with his family at this most difficult time.



50 years ago, on January 12, 1968, the first Town of Mississauga's Council Meeting was held. The event marked the first official municipal meeting after the 1967 transition from a collection of distinct villages spread out across Toronto Township, into an amalgamated Town. The Town existed until it was incorporated as a city in 1974.

Goodbye Port Credit (1974)

There was talk about amalgamation with Toronto Township as far back as 1965. Some people were for it and some were against the idea. It was more talked about especially in 1967 because Toronto Township received the OK to become a town on 1 January 1968 although no name was yet chosen.

In 1967 Toronto Township proposed an idea to Port Credit Council that if Port Credit joined them then the new town would be called Port Credit but Port Credit Council turned them down. The Council said that they would go it alone until forced to join.

There was still no name for the new town until the municipal elections in late 1967. On the Toronto Township ballot there were two names from which to choose: Mississauga and Sheridan. Mississauga won by a landslide. In Port Credit the two mayoral candidates thought the same about amalgamation (they were against it). The voter turnout was 22% and Tom McCollum won. Port Credit had gained town status on 1 January 1961.

As it turned out Port Credit, surrounded by the town of Mississauga and the lake, went for it alone only for six years. You can see visually to this day some of what this council did. They okayed most or all of the High Rise apartments you can see between Stavebank Road, Hurontario Street and the Port Credit GO station. Tax money had to come from somewhere. People were kind of split on the idea of joining Mississauga. They were looking at the pros and cons of it.

Things ran OK until 1973. Then the Provincial Government passed Bill 138 which was the Creation of Peel Region. The Region will now have three cities: Caledon, Brampton and Mississauga. This forced Port Credit and Streetsville to join the City of Mississauga which was created on 1 January 1974.

By this time Cy Saddington was once again mayor of Port Credit. The very last Town Council meeting was on 27 December 1973 at Clarke Hall. The Council had met there from 1941 onward. Actually business was pretty much as usual with a few resolutions to vote on. One that passed was the one

to give full-time town employees a \$100 bonus for their loyalty. Another resolution (#178/73) has affected us (being the Historical Society) to this day. That was a by-law which set aside a fund of \$200,000 to purchase and to fix up the old "Wilcox Hotel" on Front Street South by the new City of Mississauga to be a Port Credit Museum. This museum was to be administrated by the Historical Society. Needless to say this motion was defeated. At the end of this meeting was the last resolution (#181/73) which was moved by Terry Butt and seconded by S. E. Donner. "THAT Whereas Bill 138 of the Ontario Legislature has integrated the Municipality of the Town of Port Credit with the new City of Mississauga as of 1 January 1974. NOW be it resolved that the Council of the Municipality of Port Credit be dissolved effective as of 23:59 on 31 December, 1973. And that this meeting be adjourned. Carried."

There were quite a lot of people at the meeting. It had been argued whether or not to join with Toronto Township/Mississauga in the past and now it was done and yes there were lots of opinions for both sides. All of Mississauga would have been known as the City of Port Credit (seems strange typing that!) if council had gone along with the idea in 1967. But as you see today The City of Mississauga and the Historical Societies have done a lot of work to keep the name of Port Credit alive and well!
