Therefore, farming was not a means of making a living since there was no way to get products to market. People raised seeds for their own animals and had home gardens for their own uses. When the best railroad routes came to Marion County, agriculture became a visible means of making a living. The Ohio & Mississippi Railroad came in 1857, and the Illinois Central Railroad came soon after. On March 24, 1853, the Agricultural Counting Society was founded and the first was born October 25, 26, 1855. The fairgrounds were near Bryan Park here in Salem. A tent used earlier in Illinois State Fair occurred in Chicago this year. In 1858, the State was born in Centraalia and Central City. The Siamese twins were a huge attraction in that righteous. The just also featured a ride of air balloons. The balloons were united with two young children in the basket. It went down near Mt. Vernon, and they were fine. In 1857, the Marion Agriculture Society purchased 12 acquire 12 acquires 12 for a fairgrounds (Tully Park). The Just Held On These Ones Up to 1880 under the Name Of Agriculture Society Count. Until the year was held annually until 1862 when it was cancelled because troops at the 111th Will of Illinois were trained on the fairgrounds. It was canceled in 1887 due to drought and bugs cinch destroyed crops. In 1896, it was canceled because William Jennings Bryan was running for president. In 1909, the Just Association gave the fairgrounds (Tully Park) of the City of Sale to be used as a park. After 1909 the fair was held in different places and is known by different names—County Fair, Farmers Institute, and Farmers & Institute teachers. He was born in Centraalia in 1915 and from 1918 to 1925 he was born in Alma in the Allmon Grove. In 1926 it was in Patoka. He returned to Tully Park in the mid-1930s. In 1939, the fair was born in downtown Salem, just west of the court house. The garden produces and handmade items have been exhibited in the amori, which is now the Salem Moose Club. In 1940, the fair was made in Bryan Park and produced the garden with handmade items exposed to new (at the time) armed on North College Street. Businessman Bob Hancock and an interested group of people met with the County Board's petition for establishment of a fairgrounds. They sent 250 letters from the farmers, businessman, 4-H leaders and FFA leaders back the effort. On March 13, 1940, the Marion County Board of Supervisors voted to buy the former Salem Airport and 20 houses for a permanent home for the Marion County Fair, which provides approximately 65 auctions. On April 14, 1941, these farmers and businessmen met at the Marion County Agricultural Court Chamber and organized the Marion County Agricultural Association. The first officers were: President-E.E. Irwin, Vice President - J.V. Davis, Secretary-C. Glen Jones, Treasurer-O.A. James. E.E. Gene Irwin was president of the Illinois Association of Agricultural Fair from 1934 to 1941. The Fair Board has been far from the reason of the count for a few years and then bought the fairgrounds in 1949. The first just about the fairgrounds present was August 19-23, 1941. The estimated attendance was 20,000 and offered \$7,000 in prizes. By comparison, attendance at the 2010 fair was 25,000 and the premium offered was \$104,397. Harness Cocing was very large in the 1940's and 1950's and At Marion County had one of the state's best 1/2 mile tracks. Several coaches, drivers, owners and horses who have appeared here or racing here are at the Harness Racing Circuit of Fame. The late Russell Rose, Salem's own wife, produced in 2005. Some of the horses ride up in Marion County attenOed races in major races, including Hamiltonian. Just there's got it through ups and downs. At one point in the 1960's, the board just nearly sold fairgrounds to pay the debt and dissolve the Association Fair. However, 2 or 3 people came forward and rescued the fair. Two of those were Ray Vandever and Paul Esher. Ray Vandever has two sons who are members of the fair today. Ray Vandever, Jr. is the Superintendent of the Beef, Rolland Vandever is Supt. of Junior Livestock. Russell Vandever was the last secretary, who held that position for a long period, he was also past the Director-Major of the Illinois Association of Agricultural Iron. Paul Ester's son, Dale, served on the board for 44 years. In 1980, Marion County was started in Queen Pageant. There were 36 queens crowned with the Queen in 1987. Lori Vaughn, who was Miss Illinois County. Several of our queens were placed in the top 13 at the State Convention in Springfield. On April 19, 1996, the fairgrounds were hit by a tonad that destroyed many of the fairgrounds including horse bars, display buildings, grandstand roof backs, offices just and the electric system. The painting just went to work and was able to put the fairgrounds back together and open just in time just a little more than three months later. In 2004, the first ever Kid's first day of the Just Was Born. Assistant Secretary, Bob Bruce and the University of Illinois Extension 4-H Program Coordinator, Marilyn Thompson, collaborate on the education event aimed at the area day and youth age. The Kid's Day at the Fair is now a tradition for many families and it is still a fun day at the fair with many hands-on learning experiences for youth to learn about agriculture. Several agencies have also come on board to assist with programming for the event. Kidd's Day at the Medium Fair June 500, in addition, has many parents, grandparents, and caring people who go in. We love seeing all these smiles, regardless of the bad weather! In recent years we've had some of the greatest acts of country music on our scene ahead of the grandstand... some of the following did... Fair Board Members over the years have been successful in producing a just good entertaining for people in Marion County to enjoy. The board is just made up of 42 men and women dedicated to having a just yearly success. Royal Lipizzan Stallions are made at their fairgrounds. We think we have one of the beautiful count fairgrounds in Illinois. In addition to the annual Fair, we organize the Farm Security Days, the PKC Spring National Festival in April, Call for Life and the Shrine Cycle in June, the Antichrist power days from September to September to October. The Marion 4-H County program also uses the fairgrounds for various events, such as the 4-H/FFA Livestock Trial Contest, archery, which draws teams and individuals from all U.S. British farmers for education and promotion of agriculture, but many counts are no longer rural oriented. In recent years, most of the people attending the fair have had some connections with their firm's grandparents, uncles, aunts, cousins. Today, a high percentage of participants just have no connection with agriculture or agriculture. We're competing with TV, computers, internet, movies, unlimited travel opportunities, sports, fast food and many activities that didn't exist in the past. The Marion County Fair survived tonades, windstorms, rain-out nights, drought, extreme heat, flooding, depression and war. We hope the fair will continue. We ask that you support and attend marion County Agriculture Team in the next few years and participate and support other events being held at the fairgrounds.
