While these two forms can sometimes be used interchangeably, they often express two very different meanings. These different meanings may seem too abstract at first, but over time and practice, the differences will become clear. And will and will relate to a specific time in the future. FORM Will (will) Examples: You will help it later. Can you help him later? You're not going to help him later. FORM Be Going To am/is/are and VERB Examples: You'll meet Jane tonight. Are you going to meet Jane tonight? You're not going to meet Jane tonight. The full list of simple forms of the future of USE 1 Will to express a voluntary action Will often assume that the speaker will do something voluntarily. Voluntary action is one the speaker proposes to do for someone else. Often we will use to respond to someone else's complaint or request for help. We also use will when we ask that someone help us or volunteer to do something for us. Similarly, we will not or will not when we refuse to voluntarily do something. Examples: I'll send you the information when I get it. I'll translate the letter so Mr. Smith can read it. Can you help me move this heavy table? Did you make dinner? I'm not doing my homework for you. I won't do all the housework myself! A: I'm very hungry. B: I'll make sandwiches. A: I'm so tired. I'm about to fall asleep. B: I'll give you coffee. A: The phone rings. B: I'll get it. USE 2 Will to express a promise will usually be used in promises. Examples: I'll call you when I get there. If I am elected president of the United States, I will be sure that everyone has access to affordable health insurance. I promise I won't tell him about the surprise party. Don't worry, I'll be careful. I won't tell anyone your secret. USE 3 Be go to express the plan Be going to express that something plan. He expresses the idea that a person intends to do something in the future. It doesn't matter if the plan is realistic or not. She's not going to spend her vacation in Hawaii. A: When are we going to meet tonight? B: We'll meet at 6:00 p.m. I'm going to be an actor when I grow up. Michelle is going to start medical school next year. They drive all the way to Alaska. Who are you going to invite to the party? A: Who's going to make John's birthday cake? B: Sue's going to make a cake for John's birthday. USE 4 Will or Be Going To to express the forecast as it will and will express the idea of a general forecast about the future. Predictions are guesses about what might happen in the future. In prediction sentences, the subject usually has little control over the future, so USES 1-3 is not used. In the following examples, there is no difference in meaning. Examples: 2222 will be a very interesting year. Year 2222 will be a very interesting year. The next President will be John Smith. The next President will be John Smith. The film will win several Oscars. The film is going to win several Oscars. In a simple future, it's not always clear what a USE speaker has in mind. There are often several ways to interpret the meaning of a sentence. There is no future in the time of the Regulations, like all future forms, a simple future cannot be used in positions ranging from the expression of time, such as when, while, before, after, by the time, if, if, etc. instead of a simple future, a simple gift is used. Examples: When you arrive tonight, we'll go to dinner. Not right, when you get here tonight, we'll go to dinner. Correct ADVERB PLACEMENT Examples below show placement for grammar advers such as: always, only, never, ever, still, just, etc. Examples: You will never help it. Will you ever help him? You'll never know Jane. Are you ever going to meet Jane? RELATED/ PASSY Examples: John will complete the work by 5:00 p.m. The work will be completed by 5 p.m. Sally's going to make a nice dinner tonight. A beautiful dinner will be made by Sally tonight.
