



## INTERNSHIP DETAILS

The primary responsibility of an intern will be tutoring grade 10, 11, and 12 students both in groups and one-on-one settings. International travel and/or cross-cultural experience will be helpful in the internship, but is not required to apply.

Interns must be able to:

- Listen and adapt to local culture
- Solve problem analytically with attention to detail
- Posses written and oral communication skills
- Complete tasks under pressure or time constraint
- Take initiative
- Execute tasks without constant direction
- Take constructive criticism
- Respect authoritative figures
- Be adaptable and have good sense of humor

## Eligibility

Undergraduates that have completed a minimum of one year of college, graduate students, and recent university graduates may apply.

## Application Submission

Application submissions should include:

- Application Form
- Resume

## Selection Process

Applicants will be notified of reception of their application within 72 hours of submission. If considered for an internship, a selection committee will interview the applicant. Interviews will be held during the month of March. Interns selected for a position will be notified no later than April 15.

## Location and Duration

All internships are on-site at the Ubuntu Youth Project in Durban, South Africa. Internships are preferably a minimum of six weeks between June 15 and August 10. The longer you can stay, the larger your impact.

## Housing and Wages

All Ubuntu Youth internships are unpaid. Interns are responsible for the cost of travel to and from their internship, as well as living expenses such as food. Accommodations while in South Africa can be arranged with Ubuntu Youth.

## Work Schedule

Interns maintain the same work schedule as full-time Ubuntu Youth staff. We work Monday through Saturday, averaging 40 to 60 hours a week.



## FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

### **Are Ubuntu Youth internships paid or unpaid?**

All internships are unpaid.

### **With whom will I live with in South Africa?**

If you live in the Ubuntu Youth-arranged housing, you will live with Ubuntu Youth staff, volunteers, and interns.

### **What are my room and board options?**

Living in Ubuntu Youth-arranged housing is the easiest, safest, and most affordable option. Interns can live with Ubuntu Youth staff for \$110/week. This includes room and board, family-style meals, and transportation to and from work each day.

### **Who pays for and arranges my travel?**

Interns are required to pay for and make their own travel arrangements. However, we can provide guidance to interns for flight-booking advice, such as which airline to use and who to book through.

### **What does an average day look like for an Ubuntu Youth intern?**

There is no typical day! However, you can expect to spend time each day teaching group lessons and/or tutoring students one-on-one.

### **Will I have to do anything before my internship starts?**

Ubuntu Youth interns will have required reading materials to be completed before the beginning of their internship, and we will have several meetings with directors and/or board members.

### **What will I get out of this internship?**

Interns will gain valuable perspective in the operation of nonprofits and international development.

### **Do I need malaria medication?**

No, we are not in a malaria zone. However, if you plan to travel before or after your internship, you should check if you need malaria medication. If you are traveling after your internship, you can get malaria medication in South Africa for much cheaper than you would in the United States.

### **Do I need a yellow fever shot or any other vaccines?**

No, you do not need any additional vaccines beyond those required for college.

### **Do I need a visa?**

You do not need a visa unless you plan to stay in South Africa for more than 90 days.
