In fact, it can be said that his doppelganger is Willie Robertson, star of the series Duck Dynasty. Maybe it's a ZZ Top style beard he shows off at certain times of the year. Or it may be that, like Robertson, Mulvaney is an avid hunter specifically for pheasants. But don't be fooled. Mulvaney was once a clean cut, overachiever on a northern Colorado bump, a beautiful pet, given that he's now Chris Finnegan's top teacher on his pitching staff. Mulvaney's postgraduate career as a coach has only just begun. It was only two years ago that he was throwing 90 mph darts from Carl Iwasaki's bullpen in Greeley, CO. But during his short stint as Mulvaney Mulvaney saw a lot. And the family line really helps. His dad, Mike, was athletic director at Arvada West and a longtime college coach at the Colorado School of Mines. Before that, he played in Wyoming all the way to the AA's Cincinnati Reds. He hit .302 for the Billings in 1988 and knocked out 117 RBIs for Chattanooga and Greensboro a year later. His uncle Brad Mulvaney played for Arkansas and spent some time with the Dakota Independent League. I've been in the college baseball dugout my whole life, Mulvaney said. In addition to reading and writing, he taught me everything I know in life, how to deal with success, how to deal with failure and understand that good things come to those who work hard. Mulvaney grew up in Arvada, CO., a city of more than 100,000 people located about 10 miles northwest of Denver. In high school, he wrote baseball for three years, so Arvada West won the league title in 2014. He was named an All-Conference performer three times and was considered an academic all-state selection in 2013. I've played baseball all year and haven't played football, Mulvaney explained. I really didn't like how to deal with it. Who could blame him? And who needed a gridiron, because baseball brought a lot of exposure. After his senior year, Mulvaney had the Grand Canyon, the Utah Valley and Colorado Mesa, all recruiting for war for his services. In the end, though, Northern Colorado won. It was the best fit, baseball-wise man, he said. I enjoyed the coaching staff and affordability. As a freshman, Mulvaney appeared in 31 games. He led the team with victories (4) and struck out 18. He scored his first career victory over Chicago State and made four batters against the Grand Canyon. In his second season, Mulvaney made 19 appearances on the mound, recording a 3.97 earned-run average while striking out 20. He limited opposing hitters to a .288 batting average. But he saved his best last, ringing up 37 batters in his senior campaign while posting a 2-1 mark with a 4.80 ERA. His signature moment came when he struck a season-high six in a five-inning masterpiece vs. Texas in the Rio-Grande Valley's 5-4 win. Going to Northern Colorado gave me the opportunity to play all four years, Mulvaney stated. He also spent one summer playing collegiately in Oregon and two anchorages competing in the highly competitive Alaska Baseball League. He graduated with a bachelor's degree in sports and exercise sciences, focusing on coaching. That led him to his first gig as a pitching coach in Iowa with the Waterloo Bucks of the Northwoods Collegiate Summer League. From there he became a graduate assistant in Division II at Regis University in Denver, coaching outfielders and coaching first base. Then, last summer, he took a job coaching Minot, N.C. for the Souris Valley Sabre Dogs Expedition League before came to call. Coach Finnegan recruited me in high school, Mulvaney said. So when he talked to other coaches last summer about the need for a pitching coach, they recommended me and he reached out. Here's a recent Q&A with Mulvaney How long have you been at Garden City Community College? I finish my first year, I started in August 2019. How do you get a job? Finnegan wrote to me in the summer of 2019, when I was coaching trenitreni. I called him back- said he was looking for a pitching coach to come. We talked for a couple of weeks, he offered me a job and I immediately accepted. The most satisfying part about your work? Seeing a player work hard to make a change and see that pays off for them. Especially when the change takes longer to come true. The person you look up to the most and why? I look at my dad the most because he has done a lot of great things in his time coaching and training. He has always been an example to me in life. Favorite movie? Favorite movie is Bull Durham. I watched him 100s times on bus trips with my dad growing up and playing and now coaching. You're never getting old. What type of music are you listening to? Exclusively country music. The 90's and early 2000s, as well as red dirt. Something most people don't know about you... I could run fast before. Now you can't say you're looking at me. What is the best part or most challenging aspect of working in athletics? The best part of athletics is how it brings together the school and the community to support young adults in pursuit of their dreams. Dreams.

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
