Without the tax, private Christian primary schools must seek funding elsewhere. Administrators at Christian elementary schools can use grants to fill the gap. Grants can pay for educational materials, educational institutions, sports programs and other attributes of Christian education, and schools do not have to pay grants. Many nonprofits, business and private associations offer grants to Christian elementary schools, and these schools can also apply for state grants. The National Catholic Education Union administers numerous scholarships intended for Christian elementary schools. The NATIONAL SOCIAL Justice Education Grant provides up to \$750 for teachers at a Catholic elementary school for social justice education. Michael J. McGivney Memorial Fund's grant program provides \$12,000 to \$25,000 scholarships to Christian schools for projects that boost research. Only schools in the U.S. and Canada are eligible for grants. In 2008, the fund took six grants totaling \$100,000. The Knights of Columbus set up the fund in 1980 in memory of its founder. Many nonprofits in the United States support regional Christian schools. Lily is focused on education in Indiana's Christian schools. Endowing provides grants to K-12 schools to strengthen institutions and their educational and research programs. Fans of the early second century, who have devoted a significant part of their lives to understanding the various tribal movements, political situations and common feelings between the British tribes and the occupiers the Romans are likely to find some fun and enlightening moments. For the other 99 percent of us, Eagle is a predictable and invaluable film that manages to offer some fun despite itself. The Eagle is not a bad movie, it just fails to live with the brilliance of the potential it shows. There are too many themes that go nowhere, and the film seems unsure who it is trying to appeal to. Even the interesting action scenes are heavily edited – probably to secure the PG-13 rating – so fans of the action will be slightly entertained. There are some historical details that are interesting, but they are quickly conceived over so that history will be left to ask. There's a connection between the two main characters who start out as enemies and grow up respecting each other, but she doesn't handle all this well, so fans of predictable dramas will leave feeling bewild. And this is the Eagle in a nutshell - a few interesting parts that do not get into the film he wants to be. Now, all that is said, there are still moments of delight that need to be plucked from Eagle. The plot is derivative and predictable, but not a bad story. Acting is different, but it's solid overall. The eagle does a few things well, but feels like he has a better story there, just below the surface. A funny thing happened on the way to Britain In 140, a young Roman centurion took his first command and surprisingly wanted to be appointed to the northernmost part of the Roman Empire, in what would one day become England. It was a wild era, with a pomegranate time for tea or a biscuit to be had, and Hadrian's Wall marked the boundary of the familiar world. Beyond that, tribes of people who will one day borrow their genetic stock to make up modern English and Scottish people who resisted the influence of Rome. The uprisings were common, and 20 years earlier the entire 5,000th Legion disappeared, along with its Roman imperial eagle, thus bringing shame to the whole of Rome. The Roman eagle was considered part of Rome itself, and the disgrace of its loss was affirmed by the family of the ninth Legion commander, leaving a stain on the reputation of his son, the new commander Marcus Aquila (Channing Tatum). After his posting, Aquila quickly earned the respect of his men in battle, but suffered a terrible wound in the process, leading to an honorary dismissal. While recovering at the home of his uncle Aquila (Donald Sutherland), he witnessed a battle in the arena between a gladiator and a British slave named Esca (Jamie Bell), who was honored and courageously impressed Aquila so much that he advocated on behalf of the slaves to save his life. Esca then became Aquila's personal slave and vowed to pay the Romans for her life, even though she hated him in principle. As Aquila recovers from his wounds, he hears rumors about the missing Eagle, who is in the northern tribe. He accepted the reluctant Eska as leader and set off north of Hadrian's Wall to find out what had happened to his father, take Eagle again and regain the honor for his family. Based on the 1954 novel, Orath of the Ninth by Rosemary Sutcliffe, The Eagle is at its heart the story of Eska and Aquila. The plot of the imperial eagle itself is the motivating factor for the progress of the film, but the focus quickly becomes greater for the two men, each from a different culture, with reason to interfere with the other and how they learn to work together. The details are a little different, but it's a story you've seen many times before, in many different places where war and hatred have been divided into two groups. One of the most impressive things the audience will notice about Eagle is that the majority of Romans speak with an American accent. There was an unwritten rule that when acting on an adaptation of ancient Roman life, the cast should talk to So to hear the actors portray the Romans with American accents is intentional and it stands out. This is a piece of modern symbolism and is expanded through the relationship between Aquila and Eska, who represent modern America and many of the countries where America now has a military presence. It's an interesting parallel, but one that never goes anywhere, thanks to the action-oriented ending. If anything, the film accidentally descended in favor of America's expansion, if symbolism is meant to be a constant theme throughout the film. A boy and his Brit Essa owe aquila his life and swore in honor of his father that he would serve Aquila, who the Roman had taken on with his heart. But that doesn't stop Esca from explaining much why Aquila and the Roman Empire suck. When the pair left the relative safety of Roman Empire-occupied England to head north, Esca took the lead, forcing Aquila into a position where he had to rely on the robe to fulfill his purpose, thereby exposing himself to the different cultures and people they encountered along the way. From the first moment you know that this can be done in one of two ways: either they try to kill each other, or they become BFFs and both learn some important life lessons. The dramatic narrative really doesn't leave many alternatives. The film tries to play on this topic and offers a few twists and turns, but there are never any real surprising moments. In fact, the most surprising thing is how predictable the film is. The heart of this film is the Roman and British bonding and finding mutual basis, both actors do a decent job -Tatum plays his role as a stoic Roman soldier and copes well with what he is given while Bell shines as Esca. The problem is, there will never be a real reason to get close. Of course they fight enemies several times, and there are a few strings of honor connecting them, but it just seems that it is rather to keep in mind that they become friends, although one of them passionately hates everything that others stand for, and the other sees the former as a slave. It's not a dynamic you'd expect a real friendship from - except for a Hollywood movie. Channing Tatum is likely to receive an unwarranted amount of criticism for his performance in the film, and many of these characters will judge the failure of the characters' relationship as his fault, but that's unfair. He does what he's asked to do, and it's the script and the spin of the film. It seems obvious that between Tatum and Bell, Bell is the better actor. While Bell does a good job and finds it pleasant and interesting, the plot forces his character to do some extremely strange things that are never really justified - especially during the climax of the film, where Esca does and inexplicable choices about his situation, then apparently becomes magic, allowing the final conflict, despite the annoying little things like space and time. Without going into spoilers, Esca performs a task that should take days, perhaps weeks, in what appears to be minutes. The good, the bad and the strange conspiracy of the Eagle seems to have a small identity crisis. This forces a conclusion that you know is coming, and as a result the characters become slaves to the plot. The most heartwarming examples are from one of the antagonists. He seems quite reasonable and rational character, and then rightly in the end he does something amazing evil for absolutely no reason, thereby justifying other decisions made by other characters. The film seems to be a point to remain neutral on which side it's good and bad - allowing the film to take a bit of contemporary symbolism in terms of imperialism - but at the last second it seeks to give an action-oriented conclusion that only one type of work. The Eagle eagle is also obscured by talented actors in small roles, which is more puzzling than interesting. When you look at Sutherland and later Mark Strong as a former soldier, you'll assume that both will play an important role, but both exist only to push the plot. No actor has been given much to do but help create the scene for the things Aquila and Esca achieve, which is a shame, especially given the interesting and unexplored nature of Strong's character, and the huge amount of potential he could add to the story. If you can put aside all this, if you can ignore the missed opportunities and sometimes schizophrenic plot, The Eagle has its good points. While the relationship between Esca and Aquila has rushed, the two actors seem to have a decent chemistry, making the ultimate fun to watch, even if the journey to get there is vicious. The idea of a son trying to understand his father's fate and then honoring him may not be the most original idea ever, but it is still convincing enough to make the film enjoyable from time to time. If anything, it's an old tale of the adventures of the school, where the era is the most important thing, but the details of that period cursed. The brutality of the era is overlooked in favour of the spirit of adventure, and this works - albeit on a very shallow level.
