Gatsby is a millionaire and owner of a luxury mansion where he often holds extravagant parties, and he is described by the novel's narrator, Nick Carraway, as having an extraordinary gift for hope. The character's biography of James Gatz hails from rural North Dakota, and was born around 1890 in a poor family ranch. He attended St. Olaf College in Minnesota, but dropped out a few weeks into his first semester because he hated supporting himself while working as a cleaner. After dropping out, he went to Lake Superior, where he met copper magnate Dan Cody in Little Girl Bay in the summer of 1907. Cody became Gatz's mentor and invited him to join his ten-year yacht trip. At the age of seventeen, Getz changed his name to Jay Gatsby and over the next five years learned to know the ways of the rich. Cody left Gatsby for \$25,000 in his state, but after his death, Cody's mistress defrauded Gatsby out of inheritance. In 1917, while preparing for the infantry in World War I, 27-year-old Gatsby met and fell in love with 18-year-old debutante Daisy Fay, who was not: rich, stylish and knowledgeable on the way of peace. During the war, Gatsby rose to the rank of Major in the 16th Infantry Regiment of the United States and was awarded for his prowess for his participation in The Marne and Argonne. After the war (as he also tells Nick Carraway years later), he briefly lived in the United Kingdom, where he studied at Trinity College, Oxford. However, he objects to being called the Oxford man. I was only five months away, he explains to Tom Buchanan. That's why I can't call myself an Oxford person. While there, he received a letter from Daisy saying that she had married a wealthy Tom Buchanan. Gatsby decided to dedicate his life to becoming a man of such wealth and growth, which, in his opinion, will assure the love of Daisy. Gatsby returned home and settled in New York, which was transformed into the jazz era. He suggested, but never confirmed, that Gatsby took advantage of the ban by making a fortune from bootleggers and built links with various gangsters such as Meyer Wolfsheim (who Gatsby claims to be the man who established the World Series back in 1919). With his huge income, Gatsby bought a mansion in the fictional West Egg (a reference to the Great Neck or perhaps Kings Point) of Long Island. The Western Egg lies on the opposite bay from the old money Eastern Egg (link to Sands Point), where Daisy, Tom, and their three-year-old daughter Pammy live. In his West Egg mansion, Gatsby hosts elaborate parties every open to all comers, in an attempt to attract Daisy as a guest of the party. Through Daisy's cousin Nick Carraway, Gatsby finally has a chance to reunite with her. Gatsby does not reveal to Daisy or Nick the truth about how he came to acquire his wealth. During several meetings, Gatsby tries to rekindle his relationship with Daisy with what happened five years ago. He seeks to care for her wealth and asks to leave her boorish, unfaithful husband. In The House of Buchanan Jordan Baker, Nick, Jay and Buchanan decide to visit New York. Tom borrows a yellow Rolls-Royce Gatsby to drive up to the city. On his way to New York, Tom makes a detour at a gas station in the Valley of the Ashes, snatching parts of Long Island. The owner, George Wilson, shares his concern that his wife, Myrtle, may have an affair. This unnerves Tom, who was having an affair with Myrtle, and he leaves in a hurry. During a party in an expensive hotel room, the casual conversation is re-charged in a confrontation between Daisy, Gatsby and Tom. In a fit of anger, Gatsby insists that Daisy was always loved him, not Tom, and that she only married Tom for his money. Daisy admits she loved Tom and Gatsby. The party then breaks up, with Daisy kicking Gatsby out of New York in a yellow Rolls-Royce, while Tom leaves with Daisy's friend Jordan Baker and Nick in Tom's car. From his room upstairs at the gas station, Myrtle sees a car approaching. Mistakenly believing Tom came back for her, she runs out to the car but hit and killed instantly. Panicked, Daisy drives away from the scene of the event (which never revealed that it was either an accident or intentional). At Daisy's house in East Egg, Gatsby promises Daisy that he'll take the blame if they're ever caught. Tom tells George it was Gatsby's car that killed Myrtle. George goes to Gatsby's house in West Egg, where he shoots and kills Gatsby before committing suicide. Gatsby was later found dead floating in his pool. Despite the numerous guests attending Gatsby's parties, only one (a man known as owl eyes) attends his funeral. Also at the funeral are Nick Carraway and Gatsby's father, Henry K. Gatz, who claims he was proud of his son's achievement as an independent millionaire. Gatsby as the landmark figure of Jay Gatsby became a cultural touchstone in 20th century America. When Gatsby's poor native son tells Nick Carraway, his only true friend and relative of Daisy, he was brought up rich and that he studied at Oxford because all my ancestors were educated there, MSNBC political commentator Chris Matthews sees him as an eternal American aspiring: Gatsby needed more than money; he had to be someone who always was.... The article notes that Brunt changed his name from Bornstein and said he was a man who turned his back on his legacy and his family because he felt that recognition as Jewish would damage his career. The character is often used as a symbol of great wealth. Reporting in 2009 about the collapse in house prices and tourist spending in the exclusive Hamptons on Long Island, near the fictional setting of Gatsby's home, the Wall Street Journal quoted a struggling hotelier as saying Jay Gatsby was dead. Gatsby was recently read as the personification and embodiment of human-induced climate change, as Gatsby's life depends on many human-oriented, selfish endeavors who are to some extent responsible for the current environmental crisis on Earth. The film Portraits by Jay Gatsby was portrayed by several actors in the film adaptation of the novel by Fitzgerald. Warner Baxter first starred in the lost silent film of 1926.
