Parking

Please note there is an automatic parking system called "Parking Eye" in operation within the church grounds. Parking is only permitted in the church car park when members or visitors to the club are using the Sports Club facilities.

If you have parked in the church car park you <u>must</u>enter your registration in the "parking eye" system.

Registration terminals are located in the parish hall, the bowls pavilion, the tennis club and the snooker room.

Parking is FREE but Non Registered Vehicles will attract a fine of £100

Any of our members would be pleased to assist you with registration.

There is NO PARKING from 8.00 am to 1.00 pm on a Sunday <u>without exception</u>, or during church events such as weddings or funerals. Parking restrictions as required by the church must be obeyed

Subscriptions

Members joining any of the sports clubs are required to pay a membership fee to the Sports Club to maintain the overall operating costs of the club and a fee to the relevant section. **Note that there is only one payment to the Sports Club required and you can join as many sections as you like just by paying the additional fee to that section.** Subscriptions are due by End March each year.

Our Mission Statement



With well over a century of continuous bowling activity, Formby Village Bowling Club still adheres to the founding principle established by the Reverend John Brooke Richardson, that the club "should be open to all in Formby irrespective of religion or class". This founding principle has been expanded over the years to include the words "open to all without discrimination". Based on this principle our overall aim is to foster the game of Crown Green Bowls.

We are committed to providing a safe environment in which players of all ages can enjoy a range of social and competitive activities.

The day to day running of the club is in the capable hands of our club committee. They work closely together to ensure the Green and the club house are maintained to a very high standard. Our Green is the envy of many visitors.

We observe the protocols and procedures defined by the British Crown Green Bowling Association and members can be assured that all legal, welfare and safeguarding requirements are fully complied with.

Social bowls, where you play simply for the fun of it, takes place most weekday afternoons from April through to October. The ladies have the sole use of the Green on Tuesday and Thursday afternoons and the men on Wednesday and Friday afternoons. There are fun competitions on some Saturdays and also organised visits to other clubs.

For those who are more competitively minded there are currently 9 teams playing in four different local leagues throughout Formby, Southport, Maghull and Orkskirk. Standards vary so there will probably be a league team that satisfies your ambitions. There are also club competitions open to ladies, men and some mixed events.

We are always ready to welcome new members of any standard, from beginners to the highly experienced. Beginners will find willing helpers to guide them through the rules and techniques and we now have our own British Crown Green Bowling Association qualified coaches.

Rules for the Use of the Green

- 1. The priority for the use of the Green will be in the following order:
 - League matches or competitions
 - Member Internal competitions
 - Friendly matches
 - General membership use (Social)
- 2. In playing league matches, the order of preference for selecting players will be first team before second.
- 3. Both Ladies and Gentlemen will be eligible to be selected to play in league teams where they are allowed by the league rules.
- 4. The green is available for use generally from 08.00 hours to 22.30 hours daily. Play is not allowed on Good Friday or Christmas Day.
- 5. Subject to the above Fixture Lists, members may use the Green as follows:
 - Men at any time except Thursday afternoon (Ladies Social)
 - Ladies at any time except Wednesday afternoons (Men's Social)
 - Juniors may not use the green any afternoon except Saturday or when competing in club competitions and league matches.
- 6. In afternoon mens social, games are usually played as double matches playing to 15 points. Each pair of players shall be made up in order of member(s) arrival at the pavilion. At the conclusion of each game players shall invite any member(s) waiting for a game to join in. The player(s) to retire shall be such as may be agreed upon. No more than **six** games shall be on the Green at any one time.
- 7. Ladies social games have a structured format such as may be agreed on that afternoon.
- 8. Outside the identified Social sessions, players may arrange games as they deem fit between themselves (except for the priorities as defined above).
- 9. Suitable footwear i.e. flat soled shoes without heels shall be worn on the green at all times.
- 10. It may be possible to allow limited use of the green during the winter season. This will be investigated and the membership informed each year. Use will be subject to the condition of the green and weather conditions and at the discretion of the committee/greenkeeper.
- 11. The floodlights cannot be used when only one member is on the Green.
- 12. A Committee Member / Team Captain / Event Organiser shall have full control of the Green and shall decide all matters in dispute during play. His decision shall be final at the time.
- 13. Handicaps will be used for certain competitions, please refer to the explanation within this document of how these are calculated and applied. The competition subject to handicap are detailed in the vents calendar published annually at the start of the season. All entry forms will detail if handicaps apply. A list of player handicaps will be displayed on the club notice boards. Handicaps are subject to review annually as detailed elsewhere.
- 14. The Committee may, at its discretion, let other clubs or organisations use the Green free or at a charge.

AT THE CONCLUSION OF PLAY WHEN LEAVING THE PREMISES PLEASE ENSURE ALL EQUIPMENT AND ITEMS USED ARE STORED AWAY AND ALL BUILDINGS AND THE GATES LOCKED AND SECURED.

PLEASE BE AWARE THAT THE GREEN IS OFTEN TREATED WITH CHEMICALS

NO FOOD OR DRINK IS ALLOWED ON THE GREEN AT ANY TIME

YOU ARE STRONGLY ADVISED TO WASH YOUR HANDS WHEN YOU HAVE FINISHED PLAYING.



The Club Handicap System

The Committee shall appoint a sub-committee of three full time members for the purpose of deciding handicaps to determine individual player handicaps for internal competitions and events.

- 1. Certain internal competitions are run with the application of player handicaps as detailed in the Competitions and Events lists published annually. Competitions run without handicaps will not affect a player's individual handicap. Social bowling does attract handicaps.
- 2. The relevant competitions are the following:
 - The Challenge Cup
 - The Don Welch Trophy
 - The Secretary's Cup
 - The Rose Bowl (Both Mens and Ladies Competitions)
 - The President's Cup
 - The Lonsdale Trophy
- 3. Handicaps are allocated at +4 for new members on joining with little or no previous experience of bowling and revised where necessary at the start of each season. Where a seasoned player joins the club the handicap committee will review the player's level of experience and agree a suitable handicap to be applied. The Handicap Committee will discuss and decide any disputes.
- 4. No player shall receive more than +4, or owe more than -3 points, except that players over the age of 75 at the start of the season shall receive one extra point in the Challenge Cup, making +5 possible for such players in that competition.
- 5. Winners of competitions are given a 2 point deduction per win and runners-up a 1 point deduction, until the maximum given handicap of -3 points is reached. T
- 6. Players who enter competitions and do not reach any finals receive 1 point added back to their handicap at the start of the next season, provided they are not already on +4 points.
- 7. Where a doubles competition has handicaps applied the two players handicaps will be averaged by adding together and dividing by two, and be rounded up.
- 8. Members who do not enter competitions will not affect their handicap score. All adjustments are effective for the following season.
- 9. In all Handicap games the first line of the scorecard should be completed with negative and positive handicap figures entered on the score card first line. (Hence a player on -3 has to score 24 points to win and a player on +4 point has to score 17 to win)
- 10. The finishing score for all competitions shall be 21 up.
- 11. Member's allocated handicaps will be recalculated and published at the start of the season on the club notice boards.
- 12. All disputes shall be dealt with by the Handicap Committee, whose decision shall be final.

Please also refer to the competitions and events lists published annually by the committee where details of the all internal competitions are shown detailing which events are subject to handicap rules.



Frequently Asked Questions

How do I get a key for the clubhouse?

A key to gain access to the clubhouse is available to members from the Treasurer (**Geoff Ruddock**) for a small usage fee payable annually. See below for full details of our KEY POLICY.

How do I get into a league team?

There is no written policy about how new members get into a team. A good place to start is to enter our internal competitions and gain experience of competitive bowling. A second option is to attend 'social bowling' sessions, you will very quickly be noticed by team captains! The third option is to approach team captains directly. We have "A" and "B" teams in four different leagues and opportunities regularly arise.

What are internal competitions?

Details of the dates and style of competition are posted on our Website, our Facebook pages and the notice boards at the clubhouse. Entry forms are posted on the clubhouse noticeboards – you simply write your name and leave the rest to the competition organisers. One day knockout format competitions will include a consolation tournament (Plate), ensuring that all first round losers will play at least two games. This does not apply to the mens Challenge Cup or competitions that run through the season. All competitions are subject to FVBC and BCGBA rules and regulations.

Can I get help to improve my game?

Yes, we have a British Crown Green Association qualified coaches available. Book a session for free and the coach will help instill the disciplines needed to become a competent bowler. Ask any committee member for their contact details.

How can I help with the maintenance of the Club?

The green is maintained and cut regularly by a team of volunteers (known as the "Cutting Crew") working under the guidance of our committee Greenkeeper, Dave Jones. Dave is always grateful for any help offered by members to join the cutting crew or to offer any other help. Estate management is overseen by other members of the committee and **working parties are held on the first Tuesday of each month** to perform routine tasks around the club such as edging the green, painting, repairing infrastructure, equipment maintenance, general cleaning etc. We now look after our sprinkler system and have our own borehole to source ground water. There are also administration functions that you may be able to assist with. If you have a skill set that you think would benefit the club please speak to any committee member and offer your services.

We would like to think that all able bodied members will make a physical contribution to help maintain the estate.

Each month the committee member responsible for Estate Management will post a list of the working party tasks to be performed. You simply turn up and get stuck in.

How do I join the Formby Village Bowling Club Facebook Community?



To join our Facebook Community, you first need to join Facebook. Once you have joined you can then ask to join our Facebook Community by sending an email or an existing member can invite you to join.

We all have equal rights to post photographs, articles, news items etc. – the only editorial policy we maintain is that the 'post' should be directly connected with Formby Village Bowling Club. Our Facebook Community is a 'closed' community and can only be viewed by its members.

How do I find out about the other sections of Formby Village Sports Club?

The Bowls section is just one part of the Formby Village Sports Club.

There are also sections for Tennis, Padel, Table Tennis and Snooker



Formby Village Sports Club is a Limited Company that carries the legal responsibilities for all of the sports sections operating under its umbrella. The Sports club has a small committee that oversees the running of the club and assists each sub section as required to run their clubs. All clubs are located at the Trinity Church site in Rosemary Lane Formby.

There is no physical "sports club" as such, it exists to allow the various sports clubs to operate without the need for each to have their own Insurances and Energy Bills for example. Each section has its own committee to run and organize their respective sports, Tennis, Padel, Bowls, Snooker and Table Tennis. They can call on the Sports Club committee for assistance whenever needed.

Members joining any of the clubs are required to pay a membership fee to the Sports Club to maintain the overall operating costs of the club and a fee to the relevant section. Note that there is only one payment to the sports club required and you can join as many sections as you like just by paying the additional fee to that section. Some sections will offer discounts or introduction packages if you wish to "try before you buy".

Crown Green Bowls Etiquette

The following guide takes the player through the cycle of a typical game following a recognized pattern.

At Commencement of Game

Players should introduce themselves with a handshake. If the event is refereed, you may find that the Referee makes the introductions. Find your markers and make sure they know who you are. Markers should make themselves known to each other and both players and markers should be aware of the score required to win the game. The footer should be placed within three meters either side of the 'Entrance to the Green' and one metre from the edge. The 'Entrance' should be marked with an appropriate sign and this should be in place before the visiting team commence practice. The foot corresponding to the bowling arm must be placed on the footer. If you are the player bowling the jack, you should show your opponent the jack and allow your opponent the opportunity to determine which bias is being used.

Game/End in Progress

Allow your opponent a view of the line taken by the jack. Bowl only when the previous jack or bowl has stopped running. Once bowled, no attempt should be made to affect the running of any bowl. If you wish to follow up your bowl you must do so without obstructing the view of your opponent.



On your return to the footer, you must again keep clear of the 'jack line' to avoid distracting your opponent who is about to bowl. If you require advice on the lie of the bowls, the onus is on you to find out for yourself. The Referee may give an opinion if so willing and in the vicinity but it is not in the Referee's remit to do so. Non-playing players and spectators are allowed to give advice but must do so from off the playing surface. If advice is asked for then this should be asked for by the player who has command of the footer i.e. the player who is about to bowl. Temptation to shout 'who's on?' by the player whose bowl has just stopped, should be resisted. This will only cause unwanted and often unlawful interference. If your opponent is about to bowl and wants to know who is on, your opponent will ask, if not, respect your opponent's choice and wait until you regain the footer.

Remember that the players playing, the Referee and the Measurers (when required) are the only ones allowed on the Green.

The player who arrives at the 'head' first should not obstruct the opponent's view or stand directly behind the jack. If you intend to strike at any time during an end, then you must warn your opponent and take every precaution before striking to prevent injury to any other party located within the 'danger area'. Remember that safety is your responsibility. The Referee does not need to know of your intention to strike unless the Referee is also within such an area.

Be aware of other games in progress at the same time as yours. Move briskly and tread carefully across the Green. If you have to leave the Green for any reason during a game then you must inform your opponent and obtain permission from the Referee. In this instance 'leaving the Green', means out of sight of the Green.

Conclusion of End

Do not move the jack or any bowls claimed to count before agreeing with your opponent. If measures are required then stand away and let the Referee and/or measurers get on with it. Signal your score to the markers only when conceded by your opponent.

Succeeding End

To start the next end the leader must place the footer within one metre of the spot where the jack lay at the previous end but not within one meter of the edge of the Green. If the leader fails to set a mark for any reason, then the opponent must play from the footer position chosen by the original leader.

End of Game

Accept defeat gracefully and always offer congratulations to the winner at the end of the game.

In General

Have respect for your opponent and refrain from any adverse comments during the game. Have respect for the Referee and abide by the Referee's decisions. Remember that it is not the Referee's job to give decisions on the lie of the bowls. Any lack of confidence directed towards the Referee because of an apparent reluctance to give opinions/decisions is therefore out of place. The Referee is not there to be at the beck and call of the players. Remember also that mobile phones and pagers in active mode are not allowed on the Green and that smoking is not allowed whilst participating on the Green.



Sportsmanship

Etiquette also embodies sportsmanship. For example, if a running bowl is impeded after going beyond the head or is so wayward it runs into another head, the Laws of the Game allow such a bowl to be replayed. But is this taking advantage where none was intended? On this and other similar occasions sportsmanship should prevail and players forgo the right to replay such a bowl.

Code of Conduct – Formby Village Bowling Club

Members are expected to conduct themselves in ways which display the following:-

- 1. Good standards of behaviour both on and off the green.
- 2. A sporting approach to team colleagues, opponents, officials and spectators.
- 3. Behaviour befitting good ambassadors for the club.

Members must not:-

- 1. Use abusive or threatening behaviour towards others.
- 2. Harass, bully or abuse other persons, physically or verbally
- 3. Show any form of discrimination against other persons motivated by gender, marital status, sexual orientation, race, colour, nationality, ethnic origin, disability, age, occupation, religion or political opinion.

Any member whose conduct is considered to be contrary to the best interests and welfare of the Club, will be requested to attend before the Committee or its Representatives to give an explanation of such conduct. If such a member fails to attend, or if such explanation in the opinion of the Committee be unsatisfactory, the Committee shall have the power to suspend such a member from the Club.

The notice of suspension shall be given in writing.

Clubhouse Organisation and Key Policy

Locks

Locks fitted to the Bowls Pavilion, Tool Shed, and Men's Toilet comply with BS3621, as specified to Security Level 1 in the Insurance Policy documentation agreed by the Formby Village Sports Club Main Committee.



Lists of Key Holders

A comprehensive list of all members of the Bowls Club holding keys to the Pavilion and Lockers is kept on the Bowls Club database by the treasurer.

Ownership

All Club Keys will remain the property of the Bowls Club. If they are lost, stolen, or mislaid, replacements will be provided by the Club, but a charge will normally be made. Copying of keys is strictly forbidden. Any member ignoring this ban could be liable to misconduct procedure.

Bowls Pavilion

Keys are available to all Full Members of the Bowls Club for a small charge. This is non-refundable.

Lockers

There are a limited number of lockers provided within the Pavilion available for a small rental Fee (currently £5 per annum).

Gents Toilet

The Gents toilet is located externally on the Beaufort Hall adjacent to the Bowls Pavilion. Access to this toilet is by a key permanently kept in an accessible position inside the Bowls Pavilion. Please ensure the key is returned to its correct location after use.

Ladies Toilet

The Ladies toilet is located within the Beaufort Hall. Access is via the door to the kitchen of the Beaufort Hall. A kitchen door key to the Beauford Hall is kept in an accessible position inside the Bowls Pavilion. Please ensure the key is returned to its correct location after use.

Captain's Keys

All team Captains are provided with a Pavilion Key, toilet key, and locker key.

Cleaner's Keys

The Cleaner is provided with a Pavilion Key, a key to the Beaufort Hall and a key to the Gents Toilet.

Tool Shed

Keys to the tool shed locks are issued to the Men's Committee members responsible for maintenance work etc. Spare keys are permanently kept in an accessible position inside the pavilion for general use.



Safeguarding Policy

FVSC accept our obligation to exercise a duty of care and to safeguard the welfare of everyone participating in the Club's activities.

We are committed to do this by acknowledging that our members

- welfare is paramount
- have the right to protection from bullying or abuse irrespective of age, gender, ability, race, cultural background, religious beliefs or sexual identity,
- have the right to be safe,
- have the right to be treated with respect and dignity

We will ensure that

- all allegations of bullying or abuse are dealt with under the policy guidelines
- the response to them is swift and appropriate
- such concerns or allegations will be shared with the Safeguarding Officer (SO) who will contact the appropriate authority if necessary.
- confidentiality will be maintained for all concerned
- the effectiveness of our policy is reviewed regularly
- a responsible person shall be appointed annually as Safeguarding Officer to whom members can address any concerns

The Safeguarding Officer is responsible for

- monitoring and recording concerns
- ensuring issues are dealt with appropriately and under the policy guidelines
- making referrals to the appropriate authority without delay
- liaising with other agencies
- arranging safeguarding training when appropriate
- arranging emergency first aid training when appropriate
- checking that the coach has appropriate coaching certificate/license to coach
- arranging with other committee members for the safe recruiting of any volunteers/coaches to work with juniors

Welfare, Health and Safety Who to contact

The club has nominated committee members who look after the Welfare, Health and Safety and Safeguarding of members.

For Health and Safety, the committee chair and the estate manager visit the club and green annually before the opening of the season and undertake a risk assessment (a legal requirement)* of the site for its safety according to given criteria. The criteria is matched to suit the requirements of the BCGBA recommendations for H&S and our own insurance requirements.

As a brief overview, the HASAWA 1974 requires that workplaces provide:

- Adequate training of staff to ensure health and safety procedures are understood and adhered to.
- Adequate welfare provisions for staff at work.
- A safe working environment that is properly maintained and where operations within it are conducted safely.



A report of findings is submitted to the committee with any relevant recommendations. These recommendations are ALWAYS acted upon.

For Safeguarding issues, please contact the Safeguarding Officer. Contact details are displayed on the Safeguarding Notice Boards within the pavilion.

Club Objective

FVBC provides social bowling, matches and competitions for all ages of players including those aged under 18 years.

Child Protection – applicable if/when junior members join our club

FVBC recognises that the welfare of junior players must be upheld and that it has a duty of care to provide a safe, caring environment whilst junior players are in the charge of FVBC.

Any persons under the age of 18 who are visiting our premises but are not members of the Club must be accompanied by an adult at all times.

Disciplinary Procedure

Infringements of FVBC rules will be dealt with in a timely manner by the Committee in the first instance and an appropriate course of action decided upon.

If the infringement is serious or persistent, the matter shall be referred to the Sports Club and the appropriate authorities may be informed.



Formby Village Bowls Club Health & Safety Policy

Formby Village Bowls Club recognises its responsibilities under the Health and Safety at Work Act 1974 and accompanying legislation. We are strongly committed to encouraging our members to take part in all our activities, but the health, well-being and safety of each individual is always our paramount concern.

Note: Defibrillators are located on the outside wall of the Parish Hall and within the Tennis Club and Beaufort Hall.

To support our Health & Safety policy statement we are committed to the following duties:

- To provide and maintain a safe Clubhouse and Green, safe equipment and a safe environment for members and guests, particularly for others working for the Club and thus to undertake regular, recorded risk assessments of the club premises and all activities undertaken by the club.
- Create a safe environment by putting Health & Safety measures in place as identified by the Assessment
- Ensure that all members are aware of, understand and follow the club's Health & Safety policy
- Appoint a competent club member to assist with health and safety responsibilities
- Ensure that normal operating procedures and emergency operating procedures are in place and known by all members
- Provide access to adequate first aid facilities, and certified members trained in basic life support and use of AED
- Report any injuries or accidents sustained during any club activity or whilst on the club premises
- Ensure that the implementation of the policy is reviewed regularly and monitored for effectiveness

EACH CLUB MEMBER HAS A DUTY TO:

- Take reasonable care for his/her own Health & Safety and that of others
- Co-operate with the club on health & safety issues
- Correctly use all equipment provided by the club
