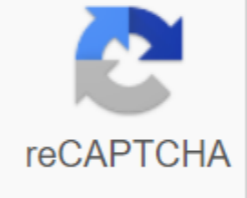

Requirements of second class from 5a to 5d: (5a) Report what precautions you need to take for safe swimming. (5b) Demonstrate your ability to take the BSA beginner test. Jump feetfirst into the water above your head in depth, align and swim 25 feet on the surface, stop, turn sharply, resume swimming and then return to its original location. (5c) Demonstrate methods of water rescue by reaching with your hand or foot, reaching with the right object, and throwing lines and objects. (5d) Explain why swimming rescues should not be undertaken when reaching or throwing rescues is possible. Explain why and how a rescue swimmer should avoid contact with the victim. First class rank requirements 6a, 5b and 6c: (6a) Successfully complete the BSA swimmer test. (6b) Tell us what precautions to take to travel afloat safely. (6c) With assistant and victim practice, show the lines of salvation as a tender and as a lifeguard. (The practice of the victim should be about 30 feet from the shore in deep water). Swim continuously for 400 yards, using each of the following strokes in a strong manner, in good shape with rhythmic breathing at least 50 continuous yards: front bypass, side kick, breaststroke, and elementary on the back. Discuss and review with your consultant the principles of BSA Safe Swim Defense. Explain this: Common drowning situations and how to prevent them. How to identify people in water who need help. The order of water rescue methods. How to use vary depending on the situation and condition of the person in need of Situations for which rescue in the water should not be undertaken. Demonstrate achievement rescues with various items such as hand, foot, towels, shirts, paddles, and poles. Demonstrate tossing rescues using a variety of items such as line, buoy, rescue bag, and free-floating support. Successfully place at least one such aid within reach of the victim's practice 25 feet from shore. With the approval of your consultant, view in person or on video rowing rescue is carried out using a rowing boat, canoe, kayak, or stand up paddleboard. Discuss with your counselor how effectively and effectively the rescue was carried out. List the various items that can be used as aids in the go of salvation. Explain why buoyant aid is preferred. It is correct to demonstrate the rescue conscious practice of an object 30 feet from the shore in deep water, using two types of floating assistance provided by your advisor. Use the correct input and a strong stroke approach. Talk to the subject to determine his condition and give instructions and support. Make one aid to the object, release it and swim at a safe distance as the object moves to safety. In a separate rescue, provide other assistance to the subject and use it to tow the security item. Discuss with your counselor when it is appropriate to remove heavy clothing before attempting a swimming rescue. Remove the street clothes for 20 seconds or less, enter the water, and approach the conscious practice of the subject 30 feet from the shore in deep water. Talk to the item and use a non-buster aid, such as a shirt or towel, to tow the security item. Discuss with your counselor the importance of avoiding contact with an active actor and demonstrate lead and waiting methods. Perform the following nonequipment saves for conscious practice the subject 30 feet from the shore. Start in the water from a position next to the object. Talk to the subject to determine his condition and give instructions and support. Perform an armpit tug for a calm, responsive, tired swimmer resting with a float on his back. Perform a cross-breast carry for an exhausted, responsive object of treading water. In deep water, show how to escape from the hands of the victim on the wrist. Repeat for the front and back holds on to the head and shoulders. Follow the following rescues for an unconscious practice item on or near the surface 30 feet from the shore. Use the correct input and a strong stroke approach. Talk to the subject and spray water on him to determine his condition before making contact. Quickly remove the victim from the water, using, if necessary, and position for CPR. Perform equipment to help with floating Perform a front approach and wrist towing. Follow the back approach and armpits towing. Discuss with your counselor how to react if the victim dives before reaching the lifeguard, and do the following: Restore the 10-pound weight to 8 to 10 feet of water using the surface of kicking Repeat with a dive with the head surface. Demonstrate knowledge about resuscitation procedures: Describe how to recognize the need for life-saving breathing and CPR. Demonstrate the knowledge and skills of CPR, including life-saving breathing, in accordance with current guidelines. Support the object face up in the calm, shallow waters of the standing depth. Turn an object face down into a faceup position in the water of standing depth while maintaining support. With your consultant, discuss the causes, prevention and treatment of other injuries or diseases that may occur during swimming or boating, including hypothermia, dehydration, heat-related diseases, muscle cramps, sunburn, bites, and hyperventilation. Your consultant may accept recent training at a PPC recognized agency as completing this requirement only if he or she feels that your skills are satisfactory and do not need additional reinforcement. Are scouts required to have their swimming and the first announcement of merit badges made for them persue life-saving?? Thanks, JoshJun 04, 2014 - Scouter Paul@Josh - All requirements are listed above. I believe that you will not find a badge of merit that requires the completion of a pre-sign of merit. There are also no minimum age restrictions for any merit badges. Scouter PaulJun 21, 2014 - Nicholas Helockl is always wondering why this merit icon is always considered impossible? Many people in my troops and previous troops were unable to complete this merit badge. June 23, 2014 - Scouter Paul@Nicholas - I haven't heard it called impossible. We had a lot of scouts earn it in summer camp. June 29, 2014 - Scout Jason@Scouter Paul - MB First Aid is a prerequisite for getting emergency preparedness MB. In addition, Lifesaving MB requirements are designed for 12-14yo scouts. July 27, 2014 - My son's Scouts mom is working as a lifeguard this summer in the Park District and had to get certification (25 hours of training) does this count on everyone for this badge??? August 14, 2014 - Scout JWDoes taking American Red Cross Guard Starting Class to meet the requirement for this badge of merit? November 09, 2014 - Scouter Paul@mom and @JW - There is no requirement in this merit badge that refers to the certification of any other organization. For a scout to earn this badge of merit, he demonstrates the skills to merit an icon advisor. Just working as a lifeguard or taking an ARC class doesn't meet the requirements, but will likely help the scout learn how to make many of the skills listed in this merit badge. A sign consultant can agree by complying with some relevant requirements, I'll talk to your employer or lifeguard instructor to make sure that the skills have been demonstrated - that is, up to Advisor. November 01, 2019 - Scouter Paul@Reece - Your son's Lifesaving Merit Badge Counselor can discuss with your son what specific requirements can be met as part of his YMCA Rescue Test. ThanksJan 05, 2020 - Scouter Paul@Joel - It's up to the company you work to decide what skills are needed. Completing this merit badge will certainly be a good start in developing skills, but I expect that more formal certification training will be required in most cases. The BSA Rescue Award includes many of these same skills and is comparable to Red Cross Lifeguard Training. Most likely, she will count on employment. March 5, 2020 - Bill@Scouter Paul, just clarify when he says the requirements are for 12-14-year-olds, 11-year-olds who are a strong swimmer can still earn this merit badge for your other comment that there are no minimum age limits for any merit badges jul 15, 2020 - Jeff@Scouter Paul, let me add that sometimes there are some off-the-books requirements because of logistics or legal reasons.#1. At one summer camp, you had a requirement to go canoeing. MB requires skill in canoeing or kayaking. The camp used a canoe for MB and wanted to provide limited time spent on Whitewater training rather than Canoeing.#2: MotorBoat. I've seen age restrictions on this for legal reasons. In some jurisdictions, the minimum age requirements for the operation of motorized #3: Welding. I've seen a lot of MB seminars for this with a minimum age, usually 15. I suspect it is for reasons of responsibility in place, offering MB. July 15, 2020 - Scout Paul@Jeff - Two of your points are not off the books... For Whitewater m.b., either canoeing or m.b. kayaking is a prerequisite stated in the requirements. For a motorboat, the 4a requirement guarantees the scout has permission before launching the boat. For welding, there is no minimum age, so no BSA is required. But, every time an external vendor is used to presenting a merit icon experience, they can certainly have safety recommendations for participants that are more restrictive than the BSA. Other can be the minimum age of the Red Cross at 14 years to participate in wilderness and remote first aid of course if some scout would like to use this to provide first aid care Icon.
