

Attendance Policy

Participation in community life is an essential part of the Secular Carmelite's vocation. Everyone is expected to attend all meetings, retreats, and days of recollection.

Aspirants and members are responsible for contacting the President or their Formation Facilitator, as soon as possible, when s/he is unable to attend a monthly meeting, retreat, or day of recollection.

Excused absences will be granted for illness, transportation, unavoidable family obligations, or an extraordinary circumstance.

Those in formation should expect to make up missed sessions and/or have their formation extended.

If there are more than <u>three absences</u> in a calendar year, the Council will review the situation on a case-by-case basis.

Thoughts on Prayer



Determined Determination Excerpt from 'Prayer Empowering Pills'' by Rudolf V. D'Souza, OCD.

Prayer in fact presupposes the action of God and co-operation on our part. When both happily meet, there is growth. What is concretely required on our part is generosity and virtue. Teresa firmly suggests the virtue of courage and perseverance through "determined determination." [Way 21, ii].

But those who do give themselves with determined determination, "the Lord shares with them His food even to the point of taking a portion from His own mouth, to give them" [cfr.W 16,ix]. Here we understand clearly that 'prayer' is only the beginning of the whole mystery of our salvation. As Teresa writes in the definition "mental prayer" is nothing but "friendly intercourse {conversation}," which signifies, when it really reaches its highest point, it is going to be, not only friendly, but reach the depth of friendship and love far beyond expression. It ought to be a liberating experience. God in this state cannot resist a soul that desires Him ardently. Not to desire God is equal to not finding Him. Prayer is the power that provokes encounter. But we need to understand that 'encounter' with God may not be always be a pleasant, soothing experience. 'Mental prayer' is the way by which we loose ourselves in order to find Christ. (Phil. 3:7-22). It is an exposing of oneself to God's company and presence, because we cannot in any way force God to be our companion. If He offers His companionship, it is not out of our merit but a sheer gift from Him. Dealing with God in all humility and determination is the only way to love and have Him. Hence, prayer is nothing but our exposure to God and to His riches. As the sun, God's company is never failing, but His rays could be prevented if one closed the door or window of one's soul. The need for spiritual exposure to God is an absolute precondition for prayer. It is in prayer that we come to know God and His mysterious works. Our eyes of faith are wide open and hope becomes stronger through prayer. Through prayer, the spiritual faculties are energized and vitalized to receive God. The initial effort at prayer is normally rewarded with gifts and graces from God, which saturate us to the point of thirsting for Him more and more with determination and courage.

Meetings in Carmel

Constitutions (24c):

St. Teresa appreciates the assistance of another in the spiritual life: love grows where there is respectful dialogue, the purpose of which is to know oneself better so as to be pleasing to God. Community meetings take place in a congenial atmosphere of dialogue and sharing. Prayer, formation, and a joyful atmosphere are essential for deepening friendly relationships and ensuring for everyone mutual support in the daily living-out of the Teresian Carmelite lay vocation in the family, at work, and in other social situations. This requires regular and active participation in the life and meetings of the Community. Absences are only allowed for serious and just reasons, evaluated and agreed to with those in charge. The Provincial Statutes are to establish a limit on unjustifiable absences, beyond which, an individual will be considered inactive and liable for dismissal from the Community.

OCDS Provincial Statutes (7):

Our Carmelite vocation is lived out in community. Communities shall meet at least monthly allowing sufficient time for:

- —prayer: Morning or Evening Prayer from the Liturgy of the Hours/Divine Office and if feasible, mental prayer as a community
 - -formation
 - -socializing/fellowship
 - -business meeting

OCDS Provincial Statutes (3):

The foundation and essence of our vocation is prayer. Therefore in imitation of our Blessed Mother Mary and heeding the call of Jesus, her Son, to "pray always without becoming weary" (Lk. 18:1). Secular Carmelites will seek union with God and strive to live in the constant awareness of his presence.

Fr. Aloysius Deeney, OCD:

"Meetings are indispensable for keeping ourselves on the right track in regards to what it means to be a Carmelite. They're indispensable for checking ourselves, for not going off on our own tangent."

OCDS Provincial Statutes (6):

The early hermits on Mount Carmel, following in the footsteps of our Lord and of our Holy Father Elijah, sought the solitude of the desert to pray and to listen for the "still small voice" (1 Kings 19:12) of the Holy Spirit. Echoing this practice and tradition, Secular Carmelites are encouraged to:

- a) Attend at least one retreat per year—<u>preferably a Carmelite and/or community retreat</u> when possible
- b) Participate in days of recollection.

The Infant Jesus in the Devotions of St. Teresa of Jesus and St. Thérèse of Lisieux

St. Teresa of Jesus, always traveled with her statue of the Infant Jesus when she was establishing new convents. Her devotion to the Infant Jesus was established after an very interesting incident. One day Teresa of Avila was coming down the steps of her convent when she saw a beautiful young boy. The Child spoke to her and said: "Who are you?" Teresa answered: "I am Teresa of Jesus, who are you?" The Child answered: "I am Jesus of Teresa!"

St. Thérèse of the Child Jesus (to which she later added the title "and the Holy Face") was throughout her life particularly devoted to the Infant Jesus just as her great spiritual mother, Teresa of Avila, had been. Thérèse placed and Infant statue in the novitiate at Lisieux when she had charge of the novices, because she knew how many blessings the Divine Child brought to the Carmelite novices in Prague when it was placed in their midst. The same statue still stands in the cloister at Lisieux.

The spiritual teaching of St. Thérèse of Lisieux is often called the "Way of Spiritual Childhood". Her most simplistic approach to attaining holiness is deceptively simple but it has the power to make each one of us a Saint! The infancy of Jesus was for her a source of inspiration.

In teaching about her "little way" Thérèse writes in her autobiography:

St. Teresa

"Who art thou?"
"I am Teresa of Jesus. And Thou?"
"I am Jesus of Teresa."

"My mortifications consisted in breaking my will, always so ready to impose itself on others, in holding back a reply, in rendering little services without recognition, in not leaning my back against a support when seated, etc., etc."

In mortifying her own self-will she was offering herself to God through ordinary everyday living. She says:

"It was through the practice of these nothings that I prepared myself to become the financee of Jesus, and I cannot express how much this waiting left me with sweet memories."

She also wrote, "I went to war against myself in the spiritual domain of self-denial and little hidden sacrifices. I found humility and peace in this hidden combat in which selfish nature can get no hold."

With her teaching us the path to sanctity found in the midst of ordinary life Pope Pius X claimed Thérèse the "greatest saint of modern times" and on October 19th, 1997 Pope John Paul II declared Thérèse of Lisieux a Doctor of the Universal Church.
