RELATED: How to install and configure the Kevo Kevo smart lock The feature is called Automatic Lock, and it's really nothing more than having the Kevo automatically re-lock 30 seconds after it's unlocked. It may be convenient, but it will, no matter what. So if you walk into the house and leave the door open for more than 30 seconds, the lock will close again anyway, demanding that you unlock the Kevo before you can close the door. It's not a huge inconvenience in any way, and if you can move on from that little quirk, Auto-Lock can be a great security blessing for you. To enable it, head to your Kevo lock inside the door and remove the entire inner deck. You'll need a screwdriver to remove all three screws holding it in place (two on the side and one at the bottom). Once the cover is off, you'll see a small panel of four switches on the device. Locate #4 and turn it on. If you can't use the nail to push it up, use the tip of the screwdriver. Put the inner lid back on the lock and you're okay to go! Be sure to try it first before officially using it; This way you will know that it is working before trusting him to close the door behind you. To set up the fob and get it to work with your Kevo lock, start by taking a pencil or pencil and press the button in the middle of the fob. The small LED light will blink green. Then head to your lock (make sure it's unlocked for and remove the battery cover or the entire cover in order to expose the program button. Press it when you have access to it. So no matter which one you have, you will be able to move on very well. Step One: Remove your existing Deadbolt First, you'll need to remove the current deadbolt installed on your door. This usually only involves removing a couple of screws from the face plate of the lock inside your home. After removing these screws, all deadbolt must be separated quite easily. Just separate the exterior and inner portions of death to get the whole thing out of the door. You may need to tap a little on this with a mallet to loosen it up if it doesn't come out easily. Then you will have to remove the latch. However, if your existing deadbolt is from Kwikset, you can use the existing latch and keep it installed, as it is identical to what comes with smart locking. If you need to remove the existing latch, just remove the two screws holding it in place and remove it directly. Now you have a clean whiteboard to install your new smart lock. Let's go to the good part! Step Two: Install smartcode Smart Lock to start installing the new door latch if you don't use an existing one. Slide the latch into the door, make sure the central hole in the latch is centered inside the door hole. If not, remove the latch and rotate the mechanism 180 degrees (while holding onto the actual deadbolt) to change the position of the central hole. Reinsert the latch, making sure the UP marking on the latch faces none Secure the latch on the door using the two short screws included with the kit. Starting at the inside of the door, place the lock by feeding the cable underneath the latch and inserting the spin rod through the latch hole. Be sure to align the D shape of the rod in order to achieve it. Outside, place the mounting plate over the hole and power the cable through it. Secure it to the rest of the lock using the two long snouts included in the kit. This should now keep the lock in place at the door. Then separate the cover from the device and remove the battery pack. Plug the cable from the side of the lock number pad to the device and paste any of the excess cables into the extra space inside. After that, install the device at the door, be sure to align it with the turning rod so that it slides into the hole of the mechanism. Secure the mechanism to the door using the two small Phillips screws included in the kit and using the lower screw terminals on the sides. Then insert four AA batteries into the battery pack and reinsert the battery pack into the device. The lock will be sniffed and the state light will light up. From there, the lock should activate a couple of times and then cry again. If you see a check mark light on the numeric keypad, the installation was successful. If not, there was a problem with the installation - something may not be aligned in relation to the shift rod, or the deadbolt is locked or getting stuck into something. Once successful, install the device cover using the two small hex screws and the allen key included. After installation, the lock is technically ready to go, but you need to add a user code if you want to open it using the numeric keypad. You can do this by removing the black inner cover piece and pressing the program button while the door is unlocked. Then tap the numeric keypad check mark and enter the user code you want to use, which must be between 4 and 8 digits. When finished, tap the lock button on the numeric keypad. To turn on the screen at any time (thus illuminating the keys), you can press it with your palm, tap the lower left area, or tap the screen with three or more fingers. Step three: Plug it into your Smarthome Hub SmartCode locks without a smart hub, but the whole point of a smart lock is that you can control and manage the lock remotely from your phone, so it's great to connect it to a smart center. How to do this depends entirely on what kind of hubs you have, but the process should be mostly the same everywhere. In my case, I'll connect the lock to my Wink center. You must first open the Smart Hub app and navigate to where you add a device to the center to put it in search/discovery mode. Once this is done, press the A button on the back of the smart lock. a few seconds and the lock will connect to the center. From there, you can manage and control the lock from the app. As mentioned at the beginning, the smart locks of the Kwikset are not fully compatible with the Wink center, and just lock or unlock it from the .app.

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
