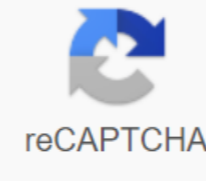




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## Cutting tools and their uses pdf

Since your tools are what you use every day to create your job and earn a great life, you don't have to put your money for the better? Too many stylists cut their hair every day using the same tools that came with the kit they purchased at school hair. Having the right tools will improve your technical quality and help increase customer retention. It is important that each hairdresser or stylist toolkit should contain eight basics: Adjustable Blade Clipper (for the whole purpose of cutting and narrowing) Removable Blade Clipper (for free-handed clipper and clipper-over-comb work) Corded Trimmers (to create outlines and trim beards) Scissors (for general cutting and layering) Mixing scissors (for thinning and mixing) Clipper Combs (for nationwide cutting) Below are my best choices in each category. These are the tools you have to use every day and the most popular among the hundreds of hairdressers we have worked with over the years. Andis/Williamsport Bowman Andis Improved Master (\$112). This is a common belief that it is the best adjustable blade clipper on the market. The case is entirely made of aluminum and steel, making it one of the most durable clippers made. The downside of Andis Clipper is that, like any high-quality item, it's high maintenance. Oil is required between haircuts and regular cleaning of the inside of the clipper. Use it with guide fastening combs when needed, of course. Wahl/Baber Depot Wahl Cordless Designer, \$110: This is one of the only wireless clippers that holds up well in a professional environment. It itself looks just like any wired clipper, just, you can disable it. The clipper itself is very lightweight, but still powerful enough to hold up to professional use. Wahl claims that the engine clipper with the built-in lithium-ion battery has a 90-minute running time, and we found that this is true. Oster Oster 76, \$135: This clipper has been used for decades and is widely considered the best removable blade clipper ever made. It is reliable and effective on wet or dry hair. Its only drawback is that it is air-chilled and fan Sometimes blow the hair in the stylist's face, doing the clipper-over-comb work in dry hair. For those who think that the fan is a problem, we strongly recommend one of the Andis BGR models, as they are removable blade clippers that are same size, but no fan cooled. The BGRs are on par with 76, and they even take 76 blades. Andis Andis T-Outliner, \$52: Trimmer Workhorse. This trimmer cuts closer than anything we found. The T-shaped blade makes pruning around the ears very easy, and the small, almost oval shape makes it easy to hold. JW Joewell S2 6, \$99: For everyday haircuts, this si-n is a good balance between cost and performance. Choosing a haircut is very personal for each stylist, but we find this one soykolo we achieve most often when we need a good, basic haircut. Supercut Supercut Taperline 44/20, \$105: This is the standard hairdresser, and is one of the worlds most imitated scissors. With 44 thin teeth, this cut creates a very smooth mixture. The hardened steel retains a sharp edge, and the slits and jagged teeth provide the smoothest blend possible in thinning/mixing sleep. This is an important tool for easily removing the lines of demarcation between the clipper and the haircut work. Pen Jatal Pen Razor, Styling, \$43: It's a great razor with good ergonomics, balance, and feel. The blades have very little protection to protect against cuts. The kit includes 10 blades and a no-touch blade change system. Feather Feather Artist Club SS Razor, \$115: This razor combines classic design with modern technology. It looks and feels like a traditional straight razor, but has an innovative blade holder that makes changing the blade quite easily. The handle withstands disinfection chemicals, well and the razor is deliberately balanced for a large shave. Oster Oster 1-2-3 Combs System, \$8: These combs offer a very flat surface that intentionally significantly reduces the clipper drag while performing a clipper-over-comb. They are also made with very hard plastic, and will not bend when performing a flat top or clipper-over-comb work. A hand cutter sod, or sod kicker, as users know it, is a little-known option for creating bare ground. This article looks at the hand-cutter soda. The trick is to make internal incisions is to drill the starter hole using a 3/8 or 1/2-inch bit in the cutout area. Then insert the blade puzzle into the hole to start the incision. The downside of cutting a thick stock off the puzzle is that more stock needs a longer blade, and more blade is more likely to be flexible during the cut, resulting in cut edges that may not be vertical or clean as you want. You can minimize flexion with a larger blade, but the larger blades don't turn as tight as smaller blades, so there's an inherent trade-off. Typically, the blade should be at least one inch longer than the thickness of the broth to make sure that the blade cleans the sawdust during the incision. Fight saw special handsaws that cut very tight curves, usually in a more subtle stock, like trim casting. But they will work as a last resort for external (from the edge) cuts to a fairly thick stock; say up to two or even three inches thick. Coping saws offer precise control that allows you to nibble off a tree at your own speed. The drawbacks of the saw cope three times. First, they have very thin, thin blades that are flexible and break easily, so you have to be very careful to keep an eye on your line and keep the blade straight at all times. Secondly, the length of the blade is short, which makes for a short stroke cut and therefore a lot of work for you. Third, the depth of the cutting is limited by the depth of the saw frame (or the distance of the throat), and the frame often gets in the way when you're cutting parallel to the edge of the stock. You can bypass this limitation somewhat by making a reduction in the relief to remove waste as the curve progresses. Mutual saws are designed for demolition, not for woodworking, but for rough cuts in heavy stocks like landscaped wood or thick joists, they will get the job done. The trick is to keep the blade speeding, but advance the tool slowly to prevent a jarring bouncing effect so familiar with these brutal tools. Just be careful not to let the blade overheat and burn the tree. Use a wooden blade with a narrow profile that will allow sharper curves.
