 This stone sits in a very picturesque area within the ruins of the old Barevan Church yard by an old stone coffin.








Dalwhinnie Stone @ 102kg

• A lighter version of the Inver Stone but still with its very own characteristics & this stone makes for a strong lift.



Dinnie Stones @ 144kg & 188kg

• Lift both of these stones together & have your name in history with the great Donald Dinnie himself.







Glen Roy Stones @ 133kg & 137kg

 Two stones, Big Red & Sister Grey. Lifting either one is a great achievement in strength with the Historic Stones.



Testing Stone Of The Fianna @ 127kg

• Lift this stone & see what it took to become a Fianna Warrior, achieving the honour to protect the clan.








Sadlin Mare Stone @ 99kg

• The test here is to saddle the mare. The 'Mare' being the plinth stone & the 'Saddle' being the loading stone.







Dropping Cave Stone @ 122kg

• This stone sits outside of a cave & next to the sea. Watch out for high tide when visiting this stone.



Castle Menzies Stone @ 115kg

• This stone sits out front of Castle Menzies & is a very smooth stone making it an even harder challenge to pick up.







Newtonmore Stone @ 101kg


• This stone sits under the watchful eye & shadow of a large tree while waiting to be lifted from the ground.





Wallace Putting Stone @ 125kg

 This stone is surrounded by history & named after Scotland's Highlander & warrior 'William Wallace'.





Ardvorlich Stone @ 152kg

This stone sits on Ardvorlich
 Estate & next to a path for hill
 walkers & is a very strong lift
 to break it from the ground.



Clach Neart Glenlivet Stone @ 130kg

• This stone sits on an old coffin road & when lifted the test is to place it on top of the plinth & balanced.



Auchernach Stones @ 100kg & 130kg

 These two stones sit on Auchernack Farm & were once used within the Highland Games & lifted over a bar.
