Well, the uprising in Birmingham, Alabama-based Confederate Motor Company focuses on motorcycle design, and they're busy designing and producing some of the coolest, fastest and most eye-popping bikes on this side of Jesse James' garage. For the motorcycle manufacturer, we're talking about a small product line here: two models are available now, plus a third planned for 2008. And with prices starting at about \$70,000, no one will buy Confederate cars as needed. Just like the Viper or the upcoming Corvette NoR1, people buy Confederates for their one-of-a-kind style, handling and performance. Its design seems inspired by Mad Max, but the F131 Combat Hellcat (pictured above) is already in second generation and is currently developing 150 hp and 150 lb-ft. torque from his 131-cu.-in. V-double engine. At 490 pounds dry, it's appropriate and unapologetically low and black, not even a passenger seat. The battle hellcat's carbon fiber wheels, 300mm dual front brakes and muscular 50mm inverted front forks, combined with The Confederacy's own chassis and swingarm design, bode well for its ability to track angles with grace and should bring this newest cat to a quick but not screeching stop. Twin xenon high-intensity headlights light up at night and add to the overall style of the bike. The exhaust system at Hellcat is wrapped in and around the swingarm, and its 5.25 sq ft of oil is shifted inside its carbon steel frame. It's neat, isn't it? The second bike of the Confederacy is the B-120 Wraith. Easier in weight (less than 400 pounds), even more minimalist Design, but still relatively powerful (125 hp), this machine may look better suited to an art gallery than a motorcycle motorcycle Inclusion 120 cu.-in. Jims/Confederate balanced V-double engine, Wraith limited production to just 250. But it's not just a show piece: Wraith was clocked at 155 mph during a speed test in September in Bonneville. Jesse James: We actually started planning a new show on a plane back from Iraq in 2006.The Celebrity Apprentice gig came up later. PM: Instead of being an employee of Original Productions and Discovery like you were at Monster Garage, you now own a production company, PayUpSucka Productions, making Jesse James dead. JJ: So I get to do what I want obviously. PM: Who builds the vehicles that you drive on the show? Do you design and build them, or someone else? JJ: The best fuel motorcycle we used was someone else's racing bike. We built an eight-car and a Trophy truck in our own store. And the BMW I was driving in Alaska on the icy road we changed ourselves. It uses 0-weight oil that looks and pours like iced tea, it's so thin, but at minus 65 degrees Fahrenheit it was necessary. PM: How does your insurance company let you get away with all these things? JJ: Hey, it's for television, so that's ok. Actually, I have more problems with lawyers than with insurance people. I have a lot of insurance. I have insurance. Basically, I just go ahead and do it before they get wind of it. And then I promise not to do it again. Like an episode where I try to set a record of flying P-51D around pylons in Reno. I don't have a pilot's license, and the FAA wasn't very happy. PM: I remember an episode of Flying Car Monster Garage at Kitty Hawk Airport. The FAA tried to shut you down, wasn't it? JJ: Exactly, the FAA was on its way to the airport to get us to stop. So we barely got the actual flight shot before they got there. PM: Which trick was unexpectedly the most difficult? Or do you even call them tricks? JJ: The tricks are not real. What we do on my show is real. It's really a test, so I call them tests. But the one that got me the worst was trying to waterski a motorbike across the pond. The theory is to go fast and keep the throttle pinned, and just glide over the water. It didn't work. I made a face factory in the mud and then landed on top of the VCR strapped to a small one of my back. He chipped a couple of vertebrae and I had to ride in the race only a few days later. But hey, it's TV! PM: Any tricks - I mean the tests offered by viewers, what won't you do? JJ: Just some stupid stuff. Like skateboarding from airplanes. PM: How West Coast Choppers (James Custom Motorcycle Business) do with you spending so much time away store do TV? JJ: It's all right. We still build 12-14 bikes a year for customers and the waiting list is over a year. Some people still have money. If the business is bad, they just come twice a week, not every day.
