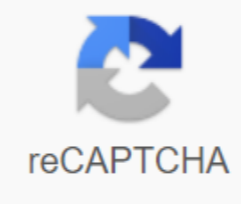




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## Positive and negative effects of video games essay pdf

There is a constant myth about SAT Essay: the idea that you can't prepare content because you don't see a hint until the day of the test. This is a myth because, in order to be standardized, the test must require the same complexity of the argument in every SAT essay question: yes or no, then or this, that causes what. And since all of these arguments are very simple, almost every argument for an SAT essay can be reduced to one of the 6 we list here. In addition to this, however, we also explain how to argue each one, and give you a sample of support for both sides of each argument. The questions are extremely common, asking things like the world changing for the better, but they only ever require a very simplistic thesis statement about a complex idea. There are, for example, many ways in which the world is changing and not changing for the better. The most accurate answer should be yes and no, but it's the opposite of what you have to say on the SAT. Because on sat essay, simplicity and clarity is the name of the game. You have to make a broad, definitive statement about what people should be doing or something possible. You don't have to believe it, you just have to present a few examples (one to three) that can show why your statement is correct. Thus, SAT Essays is easier than most students think. All essay questions in this article are taken from real SATs or College Board preparatory materials. We classified them not by content, for example, by success or personality, but by their reasoning. This is because the logic of the question, not its content, is what determines the best argument on which to build an essay. For each type of SAT essay question below, we give you 3 sample hints similar to what you'll be working in, and a breakdown on how to argue both sides of any SAT essay issue of this type. You'll get detailed examples of SAT essays that will help you through how to build an argument. SAT Essay Fast Type 1: Discuss what people should do this type of SAT essay issue lends itself to many different kinds of examples. Anything that includes people and their choice of fair play. See the chart below for more information on how it works. Should people ... be judged according to their capabilities rather than their achievement? weight of all opinions equally, or place more weight on informed opinions? Always value new things, ideas or values over the older? Step 1: Choose a side. Yes, people should always appreciate new things, ideas or values over older ones, or not, people don't always have to appreciate new things, ideas or values over older things. Step 2: Consider what logically supports your statement (see green boxes for breaking down types of support to be used). For example, if you argue: Yes, people should appreciate new things like your thesis, you can testify about a time when people appreciate new things, and it turned out to be good, or a time when people didn't appreciate innovation, and it turned out to be bad. Step 3: Think fast about 1-3 real or literary examples that meet the criteria in step 2 (see blue boxes for ideas). To support the Yes thesis with proof of when people value new things with success, we could talk about civil rights in the United States, the Industrial Revolution, the new FDR deal, or any other example of dealign with positive innovation. We could also discuss evidence where failure to accept new things proved bad, like the fear of vaccination and Galileo being excommunicated for his (true) scientific beliefs. SAT Essay Fast Type 2: Discuss which of the two things are better These questions can be fodder for 12-scored essays because they can be answered so easily: this thing is better than this thing. Then you just have to think about 1-3 examples in which this thing worked and/or in which the other thing does not work. See below for more information on how to do this. Is it better... to take an idealistic approach or a practical approach? perform or work high-paying? use cooperation or competition to succeed? Step 1: Choose a side. It is better to use collaboration to succeed, or better to use competition to succeed. Step 2: Consider what logically supports your statement (see green boxes to break down the types of support you should use). As with the Prompt Type 1 above, in this case you can use evidence to support your thesis or arguments against the opposite thesis. For example, if you write that Collaboration is better for success, you can use evidence of the time when collaboration led to success, or when competition led to failure. Step 3: Think fast about 1-3 real or literary examples that meet the criteria in step 2 (blue boxes). After our thesis of cooperation is better, we can talk about when people cooperated with great success - like the civil rights movement, or Abraham Lincoln's cabinet during the Civil War. We could also discuss how competition is inferior on examples like the subprime mortgage crisis of 2008, or North Korea versus the South Korean standoff. SAT Essay Fast Type 3: Support or refute illogical statements This can be a tough SAT essay prompt - if you don't know how to tackle them. The easiest way to really knock this type of essay out of the park is to say yes, it's possible and then think about an example. The other side - no, it's impossible - is harder to prove logically, but can be done. See the chart below for more information on how it works. Is it possible for ... cheating to have good results? work to achieve the goal be valuable even if the goal is not achieved? any obstacle that needs to be turned into something useful? Step 1: Choose a side. Yes, any obstacle can be turned into something useful, or not, it is not possible for any obstacle to be turned into something useful. Step 2: Consider what logically supports your statement (see green boxes to break down the types of support you should use). Unlike the two types of hints above, this one is more simplistic - just find evidence that can support your thesis in an easy way. If you write No, it is not possible for any obstacle to be turned into something useful, you just need to find evidence of when obstacles exist but do not lead to anything useful. Step 3: Think fast about 1-3 real or literary examples that meet the criteria in step 2 (see blue boxes). To support the No thesis, we could use an example of how gender discrimination against women and income inequality do much more harm than the good it has caused. SAT Essay Fast Type 4: Cause and Effect It can be logically challenging, depending on which side you choose. If you say x is the result u, then you just have to think about 1-3 examples that illustrate it. If you choose the other side, however, then you have a harder logical task in front of you - your examples need to fit a much narrower definition to make sense. See the chart below for more information on how it works. Is it the result? Is a successful community the result of people sacrificing their personal goals? Is achievement the result of the freedom to do things your own way? Is learning the result of experiencing difficulties? Step 1: Choose a side. Yes, learning is the result of experiencing difficulties, or not, learning is not the result of experiencing difficulties. Step 2: Consider what logically supports your statement (see green boxes to break down the types of support you should use). For example, if our thesis Yes, learning is the result of experiencing difficulties, we can either argue with the evidence of the time when learning is the result of difficulties, or when the lack of difficulties has led to a lack of learning. Both types of evidence support your thesis. Step 3: Think fast about 1-3 real or literary examples that meet the criteria in step 2 (see blue boxes). For our thesis Yes, we could talk about how the difficulty of unmanageable health care costs in the U.S. has led to the education and Affordable Care Act. We could also use a different type of evidence and talk about how Jay Gatsby's lack of difficulty in wealth has led to a bad learn about what really makes him happy. SAT Essay Fast Type 5: Generalize on the state of the world These types of SAT essay tips are so open that they lend themselves to all sorts of examples and interpretations. But for the same thing they can be overwhelming and confusing. See the chart below for more information on how it works. What is the modern world? Is the world more in need of creativity now than ever? Is the world really harder to understand because of the abundance of information now? Is the world changing in a positive way? Step 1: Choose a side. Yes, the world is changing in a positive way, or not, the world is not changing in a positive way. Step 2: Consider what logically supports your statement (see green boxes to break down the types of support you should use). Consider the thesis Yes. We can use evidence that problems in the past that are being solved today, or innovations today that did not previously exist. Step 3: Think fast about 1-3 real or literary examples that meet the criteria in step 2 (see blue boxes). To support our Yes message, we can find examples of the problems that are now better : women's rights, slavery and reducing violence. We can also discuss recent innovations that significantly improve the quality of life, such as the Internet and wide access to education. SAT Essay Fast Type 6: Generalize on people Just as the state of the world matters, they can be supported by almost everything, but can also get away from you if you are not careful. See the chart below for some ideas on how to manage these tips. What are people? Do people underestimate the value of society because of our culture of individualism? Are people defined by their professions? Do people learn from the past? Step 1: Choose a side. Yes, people learn from the past, or not, people do not learn from the past. Step 2: Consider what logically supports your statement (see green boxes to break down the types of support you should use). Consider the thesis No, which people do not learn from the past - we would have to find an example of when someone repeated a mistake that they could avoid from history. Step 3: Think fast about 1-3 real or literary examples that meet the criteria in step 2 (see blue boxes). A great example to use for our thesis No is the comparison between Hitler and Germany with Napoleon. In 1812 Napoleon fought on several fronts, fighting simultaneously with the Spanish army and the Russian Empire. This led to a sharp weakening of attention and led to his defeat. A century later, during World War II, Hitler fought on two fronts, simultaneously clashing with allies in Europe and Russia. He, too, was defeated by this mistake. What do I do now?
