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Sliding block puzzle games free online

Sliding puzzles come in almost every shape and shape you can imagine. There are literally thousands of variations. Some are actual mechanical puzzles, others are computerized versions. The most basic of them require to collect a pattern. It could be a picture of a cat, a flower or a painting like Grant Wood's American Gothic. The image is divided into nine sections with one missing section, the pieces wash the grid 3 by 3. Your mission is to assemble them in the right order. More complex versions divide the picture into 25 pieces in a grid of 5 to 5. In addition to these basic sliding puzzles, which are variations on the original 15 puzzle, puzzle inventors come up with some intriguing and very complex designs: Dad's Puzzle – As we saw, this slider was originally called the Pennant Puzzle. It has a large 2-by-2 square, six 1-by-2 rectangles, and two, small 1-by-1 squares. It's like moving furniture in a crowded room. The object is to shuffle the largest piece (grand piano) from one corner to another, pushing the other parts out of the way. Rush Hour - This is an award-winning slider developed in the 1990s. The goal is to free the red car from the traffic jam by moving cars and trucks back and forth to make space. Sokoban – The name of this Japanese puzzle means warehouse manager. In Sokoban, a player maneuvers a man around space so he can push boxes into the area where they belong. Because a person can't pull boxes, pushing one into a corner is a dead end - complex and complex. Quzzle - Puzzle inventor Jim Lewis used a computer program to help invent this slider, which he claims is the hardest simple sliding puzzle to solve. A variation on dad's puzzle, Quzzle requires great subtlety and understanding. Daughter in a Box - Another Japanese sliding puzzle. The player tries to free the girl (the largest of the blocks) who is trapped in prison uniforms. This one, too, is a more sophisticated version of dad's puzzle. Hanoi Junk -- Junk Kato, master designer of puzzles, came up with this deceptively simple puzzle. The player must change the pyramid blocks by moving them in a confined space. It uses only a small number of pieces, but the solution requires a large number of moves. New and increasingly complex sliding puzzles are invented all the time. At the moment, it looks like slider fans will never get out of trouble. Read on to learn one secret that will help you solve any sliding puzzles. Robo5 takes a cool steampunk style and paints it in a fun, cartoon illustration to provide hours of both casual and intense gameplay. The concept of the game is simple, but you can say that this is exactly what the developers were aiming to achieve. Robo5 is as simple as it looks when it comes to understanding controls and interface, but there are plenty of more advanced moves to help you later. The first set of levels work as a primer to get the hang of the controls and mechanics of the game. It uses a mixture of quick clues at the top of the screen along with a hand showing the correct conducting movement to get the point across. Once you get the controls and mechanics down, everything is pretty simple. You (as in, robot) use all manor houses pushing, pulling, jumping and climbing to climb the structure. For general motion, you click on a position that will force your character to move only one box (or space) at a time. Touching the side allows you to hang and move between fields, and pressing the top forces you to jump up. Wooden boxes can be manipulated with a napkin in the direction you want them to move, while the steel boxes are stuck where they are. If the styling of the cartoon wasn't any indication, we're not looking at realistic physics at Robo5. It will take some getting used to, but the boxes will continue to be fully maintained and floated while they touch the other surface at least one edge. This seems trivial at early levels, but it's the only way to complete some of the later levels. Once you stop forgetting the mechanic is there, you'll be able to use it to your advantage to scale the tower faster. Speaking of timing, the points system when completing levels is based on the number of bonus boxes you collect, the time it takes to complete, and the number of bonuses you've found along the way. You'll then get a star rating - one, two or three - based on how different components stack up. At certain times of unlocking stars, you begin to have access to diary levels. If you're not impressed with the complexity of regular levels, you're in for some fun with diaries – they put your puzzle solving skills to the test. There is a free version of Robo5 available that has a limited, but actually quite large, set of levels to play. With an in-app purchase of \$1.99, you'll unlock all 40 levels, 8 diaries and 2 separate game endings. If styling and gameplay seem interesting to you, definitely give Robo5 a try at the Play Store link above. There's more to this game than you can see at first glance, offering a great blend of casual gameplay and hard puzzles all wrapped in beautiful graphics.
