



Paul Chamberlain
Research Fellow – Indo-Pacific Sea Power

Paul Chamberlain is a PhD candidate at the Australian National University, in the Strategic and Defence Studies Centre at the Coral Bell School of Asia Pacific Affairs. His research is on the role of sea power as an instrument of statecraft in the contemporary Indo-Pacific region, with case studies of Australia, Japan, and Singapore.

He is currently the Research Fellow for Indo-Pacific Sea Power at the Yokosuka Council on Asia Pacific Studies (YCAPS). In 2025-2026, he was a Visiting Research Fellow at the National Institute for Defense Studies (NIDS) in Tokyo, Japan. Paul has over 15 years of experience in Defence and Intelligence positions with the Government of Canada. He was the first civilian Policy Advisor to the Commander of the Royal Canadian Navy (RCN) where Mr. Chamberlain provided guidance on domestic and international issues as well as maintaining the strategic direction of RCN global activities. Before starting his doctoral studies, Mr. Chamberlain was the lead for Canada's defence relations with states in Southeast Asia and ASEAN at the Directorate of Indo-Pacific Policy in the Department of National Defence (DND). Other positions include at the Directorate of Strategic Analysis in DND, at the Canadian Security Intelligence Service (CSIS), and in the Privy Council Office (PCO).
