All this time, I've been thinking about what's bothering me about Michael Newton..... and what's bothering me. First, for some strange reason, he won't identify the schools he attended or any of the places where he worked. Why? Why is all this such a big secret? Second, when I was reading something beyond reincarnation: Experience your life in the past and the life of life, it made me think of Michael Newton. The author told how clients of those who do hypnotic regression tend to tell regression stories that correspond to the faith and value system of the person who makes regression. The reason I thought of Dr. Newton is because his ghost world is a school. His clients report that they are always in class or in libraries. When they talk about recreational activities, it sounds like a team sport. When they talk about visiting Earth or other planets, it sounds like field trips. When his clients return to the spirit world, they don't meet God, they meet leaders. These leaders are teachers. They also go before a council consisting of wiser spirits who are like counselors and counselors. His spirit world is school, school, school. Michael Newton man who is ultimately living in a home with a soul mate; or in celestial religions reflecting the beliefs of organized religion; or you're just walking around the spirit world. His spirit world is very systematic, but not authoritarian. The irony here is that Dr. Newton is very authoritarian in the work of the spiritual world. This fourth book shows this in the footnotes, which it adds at the end of many regression stories. In some of these remarks, he refutes what regressed customers say, claiming that what they saw was not what they saw, or what they said happened did not happen. He once said something could happen in the spirit world, but it makes me laugh because I don't think he believes for a moment that it is, not in his strictly structured spiritual world. When customers claim to see Jesus, or think they have seen Hell, he makes sure there is no hell, and customers confuse one of their leaders for Jesus. In one of his online videos, he states that no one sees Jesus or any religious figure he can expect to see when they return to the spirit world. They are always a loving leader like Jesus or anyone, because that is what they know the soul wants or expects to see; but then, of course, the soul soon knows that in fact _____ Fill in the blank with a strange name for science fiction. Although one the book actually had a guide named Peter. I was surprised that Dr Newton had no doubt that because it was too similar to St Peter's meeting at the gates of heaven. Michael Newton said in one of the online videos that he was an atheist but now believes. He simply does not believe in any organized religious beliefs or gods. He believes only in the organized spirit world he created. Of course, he would say that he did not create this spiritual world, he only discovered it, with the help of his clients, and collected all the pieces together. There's a lot of science fiction in Dr. Newton's work, too. This book tells of hybrid humans, aquatic creatures, bird-type creatures, life on other planets. I've never bought this, and I never will, but I understand that others believe in that kind of thing. What I'm most concerned about is that sometimes alienated people like to believe they're aliens, and then they think they never have to deal with their alienation. Why are they estranged? How can they resolve their alienation? If they believe in Michael Newton's work, they don't have to decide their feelings of alienation. They can just believe they're actually aliens or partially alien. A much bigger concern, however, is Dr Newton's apparent belief that the whole world is a scene and everyone really is an actor. Well, not all of them. It's as if some actors play selected roles before they return, while others are glorified laborations that respond to those roles. Human life is significantly reduced to trivial compared to the life of the spiritual world. Suffering comes down to something that will be washed away in the shower by light when the soul returns to the spirit world. If you've done something really bad on Earth, you're going to kill yourself, and you're going to have a lot of time when your leaders. But fear not, you will soon return with your soul group. She's not hurt. This kind of belief has been taken even further in other books by other writers; The most disturbing I saw was in a self-published book *The Plan of Your Soul: Discovering the True Meaning of Life You Planned Before You Were Born*. In this book, the author had a female soul, persecuting the male soul, who said he had reborn with her to hurt her, both to learn and spiritually grow out of the experience. He kept saying he didn't want to hurt her, but she kept persevering and finally agreed. He was then told that after returning from Earth, where he caused a horrific letter-bomb attack, there would be no negative consequences for him. Of course not- she practically asked him to hurt her, and he did what she wanted. All in the name of spiritual growth. Newageland's turning into Psychoville! If you can justify violence against women in this way, you can also justify worse things like child sexual abuse. (From there are no children's souls in Michael Newton's spiritual world, only adults.) And that the bomber was a polluted soul that should be placed in isolation when he returned to the spirit world. Still, it was Dr. Newton's work that created the idea of souls being like actors playing roles on Earth, roles that had been created in advance in the spirit world. It's so easy to see how this would appeal to those who don't want to feel any real responsibility or guilt for hurting others on Earth. There was no harm. There's no hell. (Definitely good news for America's bombers!) Having finished *Memories of the Afterlife: Life Between Life Stories of Personal Transformation*, then I wondered why I was still attracted to some of Michael Newton's beliefs in the spirit world. Because some things in the world of his spirit are still very intriguing. I wonder if he hit some of the real stuff in the spirit world. Or are we just creating our spirit world after we die, as some believe? Or do we choose our spiritual world when we reach the other side, among all the different spiritual worlds that exist? After watching Michael Newton videos online that night, I couldn't help but realize that he speaks as if he knows exactly what happens after a person dies, just as it is in the spirit world, just as every soul experiences and has always experienced after death. Just like he knew everything. Something no one else has ever come up with before in the history of mankind. It makes me wonder how arrogant or deluded a man can be? ... More... More

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
