(Image: © Shutterstock) Brazilian health officials have identified the first known case of coronavirus in an indigenous man, a 20-year-old female from the Cokoma tribe. She lives in the village of San Jose in northwestern Brazil in the Santo Antonio-e-Ish region, near the border with Colombia. The woman, who has not been identified, is an indigenous health agent. She worked with a doctor named Mateus Feitos, who last week tested positive for COVID-19, and she is one of 27 people - 12 patients and 15 health care workers - who have been in contact with a doctor and are being monitored for symptoms, Mongabay reported. In a post on social media, which the woman posted in March, she described her symptoms as a dry cough and a loss of taste and smell; symptoms appeared days after she had contact with Feitosa, according to Mongabay.Related: Coronavirus in the U.S.: Latest news COVID-19 and case countsThe 12 patients who had contact with Feitosa are indigenous people in the Tikuna tribe: their village is also located in the Santo Antonio-do-Ish area, according to the independent news site Amazonia Real, which reports on the problems faced by indigenous peoples in the Brazilian Amazon.Feitos visited the village on 19 March for consultations and people who interacted with it are now isolated and under the supervision of officials of the Special Indigenous Health Area (Dse) According to Amazonia Real Doctors in Brazil are concerned that the new coronavirus could prove particularly deadly in indigenous communities, where respiratory infections can spread rapidly among immunologically vulnerable populations. We know that indigenous children suffer from anaemia and malnutrition, Dr. Andrei Moreira Cardoso, a researcher at the Brazilian Indigenous Health Working Group of the Brazilian Association of Collective Health (ABRASCO) told the Brazilian non-profit Social psychological institute. Their lungs may also be in poor condition because they may have been affected by fires (in the woods) and they may have had repeated respiratory infections, Cardoso added. Brazil has 7,910 confirmed coVID-19 cases and 299 deaths nationwide, the Ministry of Health reported yesterday (April 2).
