Laila Alvarez Sharing the music you wrote or the podcasts you recorded with millions of people around the world is just a matter of a few clicks of your computer mouse. There are so many free websites offering to host your images, videos and of course music that sharing content has never been easier. Simply by finding the hosting site that works best for you and uploading your MP3, your file is a link on the web in no time. Find the MP3 song file on your computer. For example, my documents folder may have a folder called My Music that contains MP3s. Find the MP3 file and memorize the name of this file for easy download later. Visit one of the many MP3 hosting sites. Check out www.audiohostings.com list of different mp3 hosting sites. Some, such Kiwi6, master only mp3s. Others, however, may accept MP4s, WAV or other types of music files. Look through the sites to find the one you trust the most. Kiwi6 and Filexoom are easy to understand and work well. Once you have found an MP3 hosting site that you would like to use, find a Upload Now or Review button on the website. Find an MP3 file on your computer to upload to the MP3 hosting site. Click download and wait for the file to be uploaded to your computer. You should see the bar of progress to watch the download in progress on most hosting sites. Get a link provided by the hosting site that will go directly to the song download page or link that will automatically download the song. This link should be provided as soon as the download is completed on the hosting site. You can now post this link on message boards or on your personal website to share with others. Be sure to follow any copyright guidelines that the song may have attached to it. Michael Butler Apple iPods can play songs in several formats, including MP3s. You don't need to convert MP3 songs into a different format before transferring them to your iPod. But you need to add songs to your iTunes music library before you stream them to your iPod. iTunes can import songs one at a time or in batches. Click on the File menu and then select Add File to the Library to add one song. Select Add an folder to your library to add all the songs to a specific folder on your computer. Mac users have different versions of the iTunes menu. On Mac, select Add to the Library. Browse folders on your computer to find an MP3 file that you want to transfer to an iPod or folder that contains a few songs. Highlight the file or folder and then click the Open button. iTunes processes MP3 files and adds them to the library. Connect your iPod to your computer with a USB cable. If your iPod is set to automatically throughout the music library, mp3 songs added to iTunes will be added to the iPod. If you have different iPod synchronization settings, check out the music library. Highlight the songs want to transfer to an iPod. Then drag and put the songs on your iPod icon on iTunes. Before you start trying to match more songs, I recommend re-evaluating which of these songs you really need by putting them on a playlist and then syncing that playlist to your device. You don't even have to delete files from your library if you don't want to, but these techniques should help you nail what you actually listen to and sync only those albums on your phone. Clutter can stifle you: it takes away the usable space, stresses you, and makes you feel closed in. read more Use Altered Bitrate You to say that you don't want to convert your music, but if you want to match more songs on your device, you really have no other choice. However, you can convert these files without losing quality, you just need to use a more efficient codec. Let's make a quick update to the bitrate: as we explained earlier, audio files can be unprofitable (which takes up a lot of space) or unprofitable (which takes up much less space). Lossless is a great format for archiving files, but it doesn't necessarily listen to them in this format, since it's impossible for most people to tell the difference between losing an audio file and 320kbps MP3. Read more, you already keep your music library in MP3 format, probably with a constant bitrate (CBR) of 320 or 256kbps. However, the constant beatrate is a bit inefficient as it uses the same bitrate the whole file, even if it doesn't need all that data. If you have a moment that is not very complicated, or completely silent, why spend 320kbps on this plot? The Variable Beatrate (VBR) solves this problem by changing the bitrate throughout the song to match what the song needs at any moment. So, so Complex parts have lower bitrates, getting rid of useless data and resulting in a smaller file size without losing quality. Some music stores (like Amazon) use VBR, but most music stores and CD rippers are the default CBR, so you can probably free up a lot of space by switching. However, you don't want to just convert existing MP3s into VBR, or you'll lose quality. Instead, grab a program like dBpoweramp for Windows or XLD for Mac and re-rip off the original CD (or convert out a loss-free file if you have one). Obviously, it will take some time to re-rip off the entire collection, but it's the only way you'll fit over MP3s without losing quality. For what it's worth, I did it and saved 30MB or so on an album using V0 instead of 320kbps. After converting about 100 albums, I'd release 3GB on my iPhone, and that's not a chump change when it comes to music. If you really want to go crazy, you can even experiment with more efficient file formats like AAC and Ogg Vorbis, which will be of higher quality at lower bitrates. Try streaming Insteadif it sounds like too much trouble and you're willing to cheat a bit, you can get more of that music from a streaming service like Google Music. Check out our guide on how to use Google Music as a secondary music player and you can have your entire library ready as long as you have an internet connection on your smartphone or Wi-Fi enabled MP3 player. You can use something like Spotify and Rdio, but they're much harder to set up if you're trying to duplicate your existing library. More This may not be the answer you want to hear, but there is no easy way to put more songs on the mp3 player, especially if you don't want to lose sound quality. However, I can say from experience that converting everything from 320kbps to V0 is not as difficult a process as long as you have original compact files or some non-loss files (which we recommend having for this purpose), it should only take you a day or two of work to convert all more.
