

Western's Powerline Students Climb to Success



Western Wyoming Community College Powerline Technology program is completing the first year. The course has become very popular throughout the area, providing today's young workers with the electric utility line work instruction and education which is resulting for those graduating this May, with the Certificate of Completion, a job offer straight out of the program.

According to Amy Murphy, Dean, Outreach & Workforce Development at Western, the Powerline Technology program originated from the SWMP group as a need in not only Southwest Wyoming but the State of Wyoming as a whole.

The program started in August 2022, and the students have learned the fundamental aspects of powerline work, including classroom and hands-on training in safety, climbing, techniques, electrical theory, aerial framing, rigging, operating utility service equipment and commercia driver's license training.

Murphy also stated, "Hiring Lance Caldwell was the best thing for this program. He brings a wealth of experience to the program, and the students have really learned a lot from him. Lance stresses the importance of safety as this line of work can be very dangerous."



On March 23rd, the Southwest Wyoming Manufacturing Partnership (SWMP) participated in a panel discussion at the Next Gen Academy in Lander, Wyoming, sharing the success of our region. Then panel consisted of Ron Wild, Rocky Mountain Power, Fred von Ahrens, Genesis Alkali, Amy Murphy, Western Wyoming Community College, and Craig Barringer, Sweetwater County School District #2.

The panel discussed "Creating Presence in Southwest Wyoming", and the conversation shared with the attendees how Industry-led, community-supported partnerships strengthen regional economies and connect people to jobs. Other successes shared was how the Next Gen partnership within Southwest Wyoming designed and delivered the Plant Operations and Powerline Technology programs. Both programs were developed and supported at the request of business and industry.



Focus on Education for SWCSD#2

Washington Elementary's Future Engineers

Led by third grade teacher Melissa Skinner and STEM teacher Tara Taliaferro, the Washington Elementary third graders participated in the University of Wyoming's Engineering Week. The third-grade students took a field trip to Green River City Hall and worked with the Green River Public Works Director, Mark Westenskow. He worked with them in designing a city plan to help them understand the many details that it takes to design a town.

"Creating a Safe Pathway for Wildlife". The students had to draw out a plan, build their

plan, test their plan, then improve their plan.



The students' structure had to withstand a test, which was the weight of pennies, starting with 50 pennies up to 250 pennies. Students were also given plastic animals to demonstrate if an animal could fit on their structure or inside their structure (i.e. a tunnel). Discussions were led to look at their structures to see if it was safe for animals, and if they needed to improve their structures by building a barrier so animals did not fall off.

Students have also been able to use the process of planning, testing their plans, and improving their plans in building structures that withstand an area if it were to flood. Using real-life situations in building structures helps students understand and apply third-grade engineering standards to their daily lives.
