The area offers easy access to the rest of Bangkok with underground (MRT) connections, lots of good and affordable hotels, a wonderful local catering experience, and is ideal for travelers who prefer to stay on the outskirts of central business districts. You may think that the sheer size of this place is overwhelming and you are absolutely right to think so. When navigating the world famous souvenir shopping haven, you will need some expert advice for your first time in the Chatuchak market. No matter how you slice it, you're probably lost, sweaty and exhausted. Fortunately, I have developed a system that can help you on your way to buying souvenirs for your friends and family, some happy clothes for yourself and where to get some incredible eats when you need a break from it all. As you navigate the Chatuchak market, the world's largest open-air market planning your shopping trip to the Chatuchak Market is the first thing that first - you have to accept the fact that you will probably get lost at some point. Maybe a couple of times. This happens to the best of us, even expats who have been here for years. Chatuchak is a massive market and many of the stalls sell identical products, so it can be difficult to keep your bearings. If you are shopping in a group, it is best to decide on the landmark to meet up on in case you can't find one. The absolute best milestone in my experience is the use of the clock tower in the center of Chatuchak. Chatuchak Market is divided into 27 sections and marked just like your typical Thailand. There is a main road, which is divided into smaller streets called soy. This can be a difficult decision on your first trip to chatuchak Market, but there are several different cards that you can use to guide your shopping experience. Your first option is to grab a free card at any of the information kiosks. There are also more detailed maps available online, but they range in price from \$5 to \$20. I have never personally gone down this path, but met tourists who swear by them. It's available for both iOS and Android devices. The best part of it is the shopping planning feature, which is perfect for those who know exactly what they want to buy. In and out, just like that. It also has a live map, search function and information about current promotions. Personally, I prefer free card information kiosks because it makes the shopping experience feel like something out of Amazing Race! What can I buy at the Chatuchak market? Spend any amount of time in Southeast Asia and night markets will start to look the same. You will see the same novelty shirts and souvenirs sold at every market in Thailand and Chatuchak is no exception. While in Bangkok, many will recommend checking out the MaeKlong Rail Market, but it pales in comparison to Chatuchak if you ask me. The main difference here is the sheer size of the Chatuchak, meaning you get everything you could ask for in one place (and then some). Far from it, really. All you need is a little knowledge of how haggling works in Asia and some patience. The rule of thumb here is that suppliers are quite happy with the price reduction to 30% to 50% of what they originally tell you. Sometimes you can go lower, but the reality here is that they are hoping for ignorant tourists to make a pretty penny. Most tourists do not fit this customer persona, as most trips are on a budget and only so many For souvenirs. Ask their price and make your initial offer a little lower than what you are willing to pay. Of course, they'll say no, and Keep the stern with their price or drop it for a small amount. Stick to your weapons and hold on to it until they offer you a price you are comfortable with. If that doesn't happen? You'll just leave. There are hundreds of kiosk vendors offering the same products and they know it. Sometimes just turning away will cause them to give you the desired price. Other times, they will just let you walk. It's time to move on! When is the best time to visit Chatuchak? The short answer is early in the morning. Long answer? Well, it depends on how much you can tolerate being part of a big crowd... in boiling heat. Arrive at Chatuchak in the morning and there will be a way for fewer people to get in your way, especially if you are not a fan of slow walkers. The Bangkok sun doesn't start its reign over sanity until lunchtime, so you'll have plenty of time to step around. Chatuchak Market is right next to the shuttle bus station to Don Muang Airport, so traffic can be pretty crazy. Bangkok is actually rated as having some of the worst traffic congestion of any city in the world and this is a prime example of this. You'll be stuck in a trip that takes longer than public transport, spending money on a taxi fare.
