St. Mary's annual Business of Aging event is a free, virtual discussion where leaders from around the country come together to explore the most pressing issues facing America's aging population and the organizations and people who serve them. This year's event will focus on mental health issues faced by America's seniors.

Older adults around the country are battling rises in substance abuse, increased isolation, and other personal and emotional challenges. To understand the scope of the issue, consider these statistics from the World Health Organization:

- More than 20% of adults aged 60+ suffer from a mental or neurological disorder.
- The most common mental and neurological disorders in adults 60+ are dementia and depression, which affect approximately 5% and 7% of the world's older adults, respectively.
- Anxiety disorders affect 3.8% of the older population.
- Substance use problems affect almost 1% of older adults.
- Around a quarter of deaths resulting from self-harm are among people 60+

St. Mary Development sees similar statistics with its older residents, 20% of whom self-report mental health or substance abuse struggles. Panelist: Loren Anthes

Loren Anthes is the Head of Policy and Programs at Yuvo Health, a risk-bearing physician enablement company that builds value-based care capacity at federally qualified health centers. Anthes also serves as a Visiting Fellow, Value-Based Healthcare at the Center for Community Solutions where he recently served as the William C. and Elizabeth M. Meet Ruth Maxwell, one of St. Mary's residents featured in *Hope!* and one of the residents interviewed in St. Mary's podcast. Like many of St. Mary's residents, Ruth's story is one of perseverance and faith.

Ruth comes from a family that valued hard work — and had to in order to survive. Ruth, her father, and her 12 siblings picked cotton to get by. On a rare, special day, Ruth got to go to school.

By the time Ruth was in her 20s, eight of her 10 brothers had run away from home. Eventually, her father told her she needed to leave home, too. So Ruth moved to Dayton, Ohio to live with her aunt who introduced her to a church she fell in love with. She developed connections to her community and God, read scripture, and, over time, learned that she could create a life that was rich with meaning — something she never saw as a child.

During her time in Ohio, Ruth fell in love, had five children, and later lost one of them, a daughter, to alcoholism. She helped raise her daughter's children so that they might know a love during childhood that Ruth was never given. Over time, Ruth did what so many of us strive for: She created a life of meaning, faith, and purpose despite her childhood.

Senior Village at Kettering Town Center set to open in Spring 2024

Remarkable progress has been made on Senior Village at Kettering Town Center. The community will create 52 units of affordable senior housing at the corner of Woodman Drive and Danube Court.

The new property is being developed in partnership with Oberer Companies; once the building is operational, St. Mary will provide service coordination and Oberer will serve as the property manager. St. Mary is not yet accepting applications for housing, but those interested are welcome to call St. Mary's office to learn more.

A Letter from Our President



As I watch the construction of the Senior Village at Kettering Town Center, I'm reminded of all the people I know who have asked me about living there. It's tempting to think of the poor as "other people" but over my life, I've had many family members whose incomes were low enough to qualify to live in our affordable senior apartments. I've also had quite a few family and friends who have lived in affordable housing. Most people, if they live long enough, will run out of savings, and be left with Social Security as their sole source of income. That's why the median annual income of our residents is only \$12,400--half of which is going toward rent. But in our latest resident survey, more than 80% of our residents said their quality of life was "good" or "very good." That's the miracle of St. Mary Development's work. Thank you for being part of our mission!
