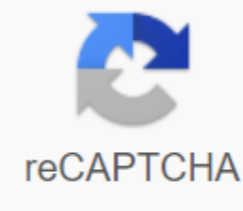




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## Jim casy grapes of wrath character analysis

His belief that individual family interests should be subject to the common well-being of mankind, and his belief that all individual souls are part of one great soul, parallels Jesus' rejection of family ties for the sake of the Kingdom of Heaven. Casey's initials, JC, correspond to the initials of Jesus Christ. He dies in a way like Christ, telling his killers that they don't know what they're doing.
