Busy

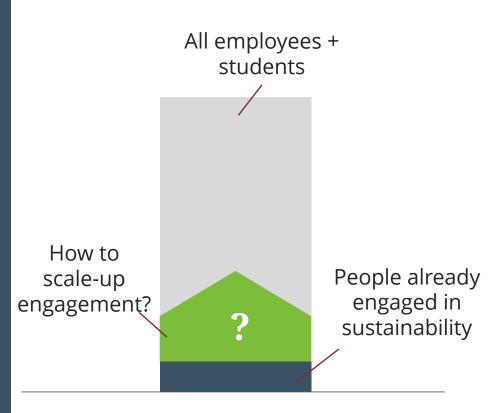
"This deadline just came up; I don't have time to do anything else."

"Nobody seems to care about what I am doing, so why should I do anything!"

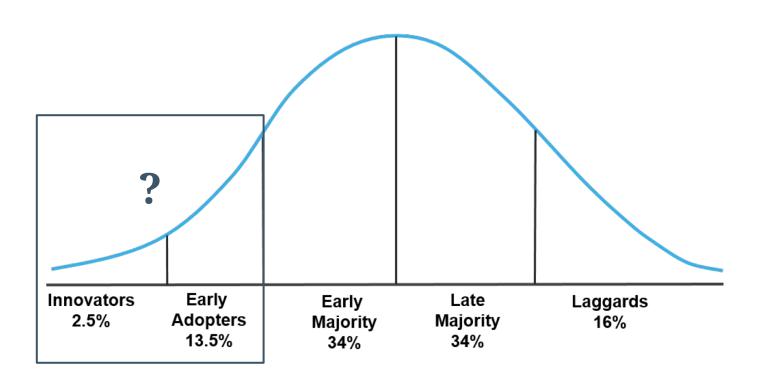

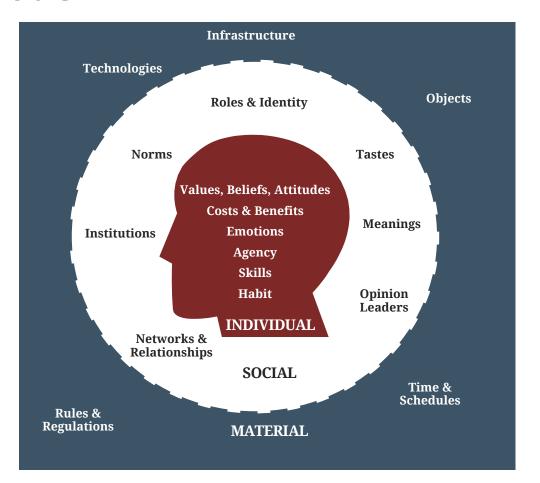

The ISM Model

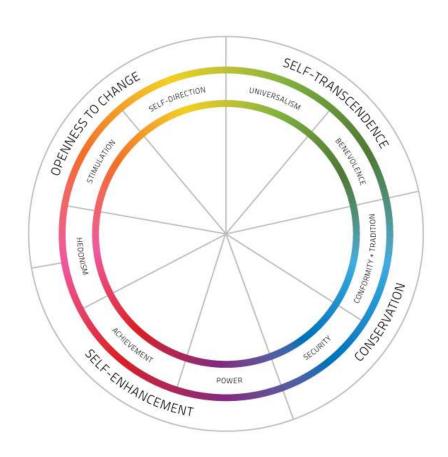

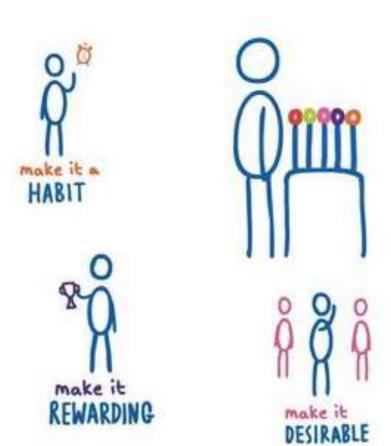

Unilever's 5 levers of change





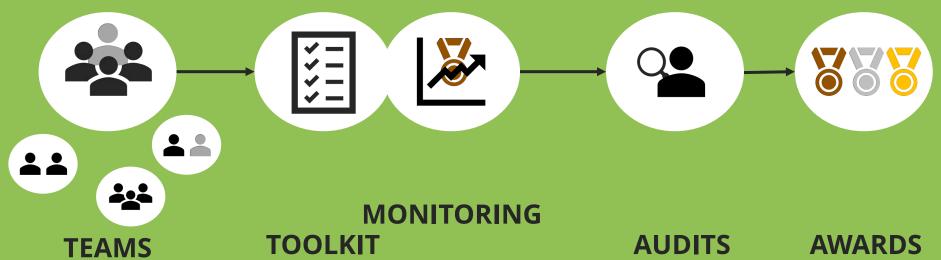

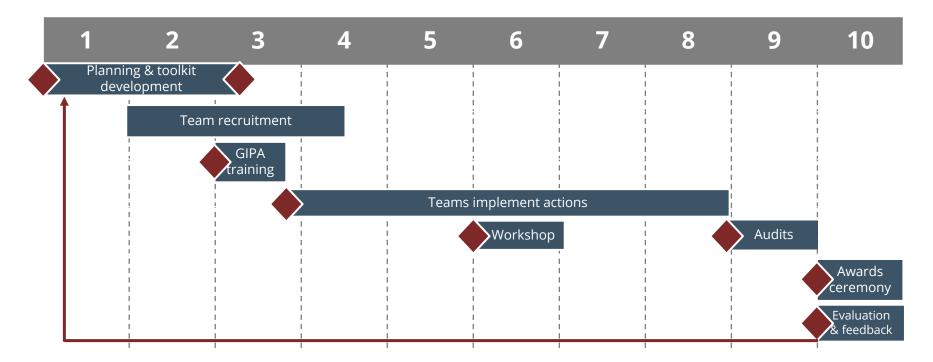
Introduction to Green Impact

The programme's characteristics:

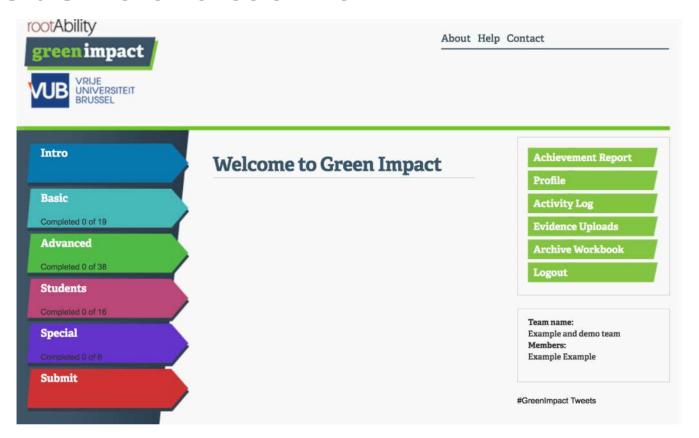


Green Impact works in an annual cycle



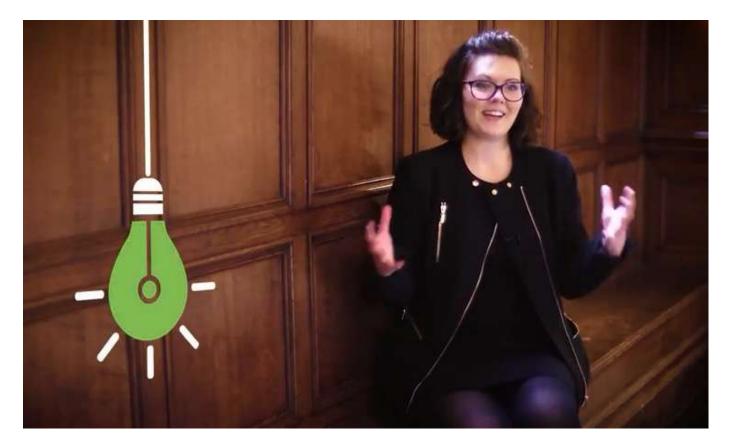

Continuously improved by National Union of Students UK since 2006

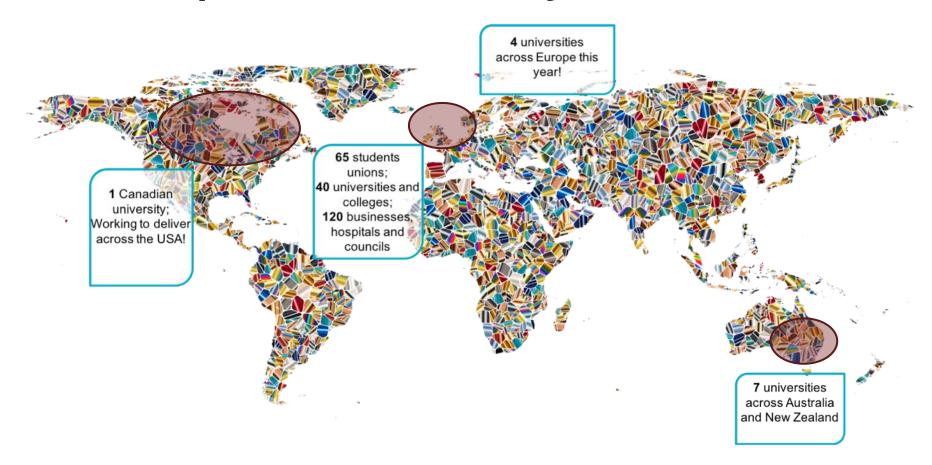
rootAbility now delivers Green Impact in NL, BE and DE

Green Impact since 2006:

- 476 organisations in the UK, NL, BE, AU and CA
- 4,100 students and staff participated in ca. 4,000 teams
- 358,000 actions realised 62% as a direct result of Green Impact
- UNESCO-Japan Prize on Education for Sustainable Development

Why do we run Green Impact?

- Large organisations have large environmental and social impacts positive and negative
- Structural changes can only make some of the difference
- Changing behaviours and attitudes is really important
- "Involving the public in decision making and in the design of projects can improve people's acceptance of and commitment to sustainable living" (Green Alliance, 2011)

Green Impact gets individuals working together to change their ideas and practices and share them with each other to make a **massive combined impact!**

Where has Green Impact worked best?

University of Melbourne

- Within 'Sustainable Campus' programme
- Ambitious targets
- Fun and easy focus
- Students as volunteers
- Senior staff buy in
- 274 individuals
- 30 teams
- 588 actions taken





Where has Green Impact worked best?

University of Manchester

- Tried different ways of accrediting teams
- Changed their approach every few years Project Plus
- Building team confidence to lead
- Taken on graduate and student support to deliver
- 70 teams
- 8 years of Green Impact!



First European GI programme outside the UK

Vrije Universiteit Brussels (VUB)

- Led by students in the GreenTeam
- 2016/17: 6 Teams completed 181 actions
- 2017/18: 11 teams completed 228 actions
- 2018/19:?
- 3rd year of Green Impact!
