This is one of Wingate's secular inspirational titles, so my main issue lies in the fair amount of language and some unresolved threads of immorality. Characters' ideas about God and angels were a little off as well. I enjoyed seeing the siblings come together again, and Eudora Gibson's own story was a nice addition. The opening involves a time jump that threw me for a moment, but it was easily forgotten as the story went on. It's indeed true that good things can emerge from bad ones. Not necessarily a book I'd read multiple times, but an enjoyable experience nonetheless. September 6, 2019 I'm in the minority here, but I didn't enjoy this book. While I loved *Tending Roses* (the first book in this series), this one was slow-moving and never grabbed my attention despite giving it a chance. Plus, I couldn't connect with any of the characters; they seemed very flat. Jenilee's property was virtually untouched, but she could see her neighbor's places were severely damaged. Driving their tractor to Mrs. Gibson's place it was clear her property was nearly a total loss. Hearing noises, she saw she needed to use the tractor to remove an obstruction on top the storm cellar to free her neighbor and granddaughter. Later, at the armory Mrs. Twenty years old and living a life limited by her past, Jenilee finds herself at the center of a crisis when a tornado ravages her farm. Her neighbor, Mr. Jaans, is severely injured, and her own family is missing in action. However, with the unexpected return of her older brother Drew, Jenilee starts to find ways to help those affected by the disaster. The story follows Jenilee as she navigates the aftermath of a devastating tornado in her hometown of Poetry. As she begins collecting mementos and items blown away by the storm, her small act brings the community together. Reunited with her estranged brother, the narrative unfolds predictably, much like other Wingate stories. The writing is easy to follow, making for an enjoyable read. The author's portrayal of Jenilee's quiet nature and her desire to help others, despite a troubled past, resonates with readers. Her experience as a helper at the local vet and rescuer of stray animals enables her to provide crucial assistance during the crisis. Told from two perspectives, the novel explores how disaster can alter people's lives, whether or not they've been physically injured. The story is not a sequel but rather a new narrative centered around different characters. The plot follows Jenilee as she collects and displays rain-soaked pictures, mementos, and letters at the Armory, allowing families to search for lost items. The community comes together in support of each other during this difficult time. I've got nothin' to say about this book other than I found one quote from it that stuck with me: "Today, I wish to give you this simple advice. Don't ask for miracles - only God knows what He's gonna send. Instead, pray for the strength to open the door when things come knockin'. The sound might be soft at first, but listen close." These lines really resonated with me! As for the book itself, it was gifted to me since it takes place in Missouri, where I used to live. It's about a series of tornadoes that wreak havoc across the Midwest and Plains, includin' the town of Poetry, which is central to the story. Now, while this book predates the Joplin tornado, it felt like it could've been inspired by it. However, the author seemed a bit mixed up with the geography of Missouri - like she changed her mind about where people lived! For instance, one character was from St. Louis, but later headed home to Kansas City. The hospital was in Springfield, but then they hit the interstate for Oklahoma City... and before that, there was this program in St. Louis that somehow ended up bein' hours away from Springfield? Yeah, that really muddled the story for me - I couldn't quite place where Poetry was supposed to be, which made it hard to follow. But I guess that's just part of why I didn't finish this book back in '09. It had some good moments, though. It made me think about how often I hide behind what others might think of me and how often I make judgments about people without gettin' the whole story. The author did a great job with those themes - it was like she punched me right in the gut! Later on, when I picked up this book again in '20, I enjoyed it more than the first time around. It's got a sweet story and a message of hope that really hits home. It shows how a community can heal and rebuild by puttin' aside their differences. However, it did feel like it went on way too long for my liking. The narrators were great, though - they changed voices just right to bring the characters to life! I guess if you liked "Tending Roses" by Lisa Wingate, you might enjoy this one more than I did, but for me, it was a bit of a slog. One thing that stuck with me from this book is: "Faith is like a sturdy ship - it can carry us through the stormy times and even make us stronger because of it." That's somethin' we could all stand to remember!
