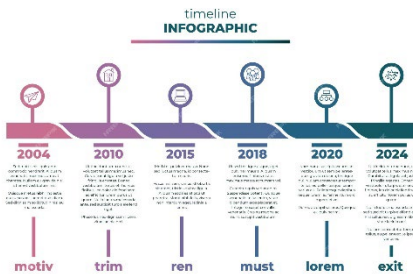


Timeline Project: A Timeline of the History of the Global Injustice You are Researching



Timeline Assignment –

Based on your research on your topic, put together a timeline of events, trends, factors, causes that you believe were instrumental in the development of the problem you are researching as it exists today. This timeline is your argument or your "narrative"/ version of why and how this issue started.

As you develop your timeline, consider how the following categories may have shaped the problem:

- Technology/Industry; Political/Legislative; Financial/Economic; Social/Cultural; Business/Labor; Science/Cutting-Edge Research

As you develop your timeline, please make sure that you:

1. Include AT LEAST 5 historical events/trends/factors/causes. By history, we mean within the last 50 years. Please do not go further than 50 years back! Annotate each event/trend/factor/cause with 2 sentences or so. (That is, you should answer the following questions: Why is this important? What's the connection between this addition on your timeline and the problem as it currently exists?)
2. With an MLA-style parenthetical citation (author's name), cite which source alerted you to this event/trend/factor/cause
3. Demonstrate, wherever possible, how one event put another event into motion (like a flow chart). Note (somehow) which events/trends span months, years, or even decades.
4. Write up: Write a short analysis of your timeline. This could be your "speech" portion where you explain what is on your time. Why do you believe this is the "story" behind the issue? This is a persuasive project. Write your analysis/speech in standard MLA style with an introduction, body and conclusion. Approximately 300 words. This written portion can be the second page of the timeline or it can be added as a Google Link on your timeline.

5. Be creative! Include photos or illustrations or animations. This is a multimodal project. Have fun!
