




Epistle Reading 1 Peter 2:11–20

Beloved, I urge you as sojourners and exiles to abstain from the passions of the flesh, which wage war against your soul. Keep your conduct among the Gentiles honorable, so that when they speak against you as evildoers, they may see your good deeds and glorify God on the day of visitation.

Be subject for the Lord's sake to every human institution, whether it be to the emperor as supreme, or to governors as sent by him to punish those who do evil and to praise those who do good. For this is the will of God, that by doing good you should put to silence the ignorance of foolish people. Live as people who are free, not using your freedom as a cover-up for evil, but living as servants of God. Honor everyone. Love the brotherhood. Fear God. Honor the emperor.

Servants, be subject to your masters with all respect, not only to the good and gentle but also to the unjust. For this is a gracious thing, when, mindful of God, one endures sorrows while suffering unjustly. For what credit is it if, when you sin and are beaten for it, you endure? St. John 16:16–22

P The Holy Gospel according to St. John, the sixteenth chapter.



"A little while, and you will see me no longer; and again a little while, and you will see me." So some of his disciples said to one another, "What is this that he says to us, 'A little while, and you will not see me, and again a little while, and you will see me'; and, 'because I am going to the Father'?" So they were saying, "What does he mean by 'a little while'? We do not know what he is talking about." Jesus knew that they wanted to ask him, so he said to them, "Is this what you are asking yourselves, what I meant by saying, 'A little while and you will not see me, and again a little while and you will see me'? Truly, truly, I say to you, you will weep and lament, but the world will rejoice. You will be sorrowful,

but your sorrow will turn into joy. When a woman is giving birth, she has sorrow because her hour has come, but when she has delivered the baby, she no longer remembers the anguish, for joy that a human being has been born into the world. And He will come again with glory to judge both the living and the dead, whose kingdom will have no end.


And I believe in the Holy Spirit,


the Lord and giver of life,

Jubilate Sunday – The Latin name for this Sunday of Easter comes from the Introit Psalm 66:1, "Jubilate Deo" – Shout for joy to God! Today we shout for joy with jubilation and exultation that Christ is risen from the dead and in Him we have eternal life and the fulness of joy.

Cover Art – "Virgin and Child" by Elisabetta Sirani, 1663. Siriani, 1638-1665, was the daughter of an artist in Bologna, Italy. At a young age she became well known for her own skill. "Virgin and Child" is her most famous work. The scene, set against a dark backdrop, displays the babe tossing a rose garland onto the head of his mother. The smiling pose placing face by face depicts a sweet and intimate relationship. In 1994, the United States Postal Service honored the painting with it being the annual Christmas stamp. The image adorned over 1.1 billion stamps. In the Gospel today, Jesus speaks of a mother's pain being turned to joy. One can see the joy and delight of Mary looking at her child Jesus.

About the Hymn of the Day – With High Delight Let Us Unite – LSB 483 This hymn was written by Georg Vetter (1536-99) and was first published in 1566. It appeared in a collection of Wittenberg hymns in 1573. The original hymn was thirteen stanzas. The exuberant joy of the resurrection is expressed with dignity and elegance in this great Easter Hymn. With the Jerusalem of Isaiah 52, Christians are invited to break forth into singing because Jesus Christ is our salvation. Who are the "pure in heart" invited to take their part? They are those set free from sin and death through faith in the Good News of salvation in Jesus Christ meant for every nation and people on earth.

As true God, Christ is the firstborn of the dead, who "by His death has destroyed death, and by His rising to life again has restored to us everlasting life," as the Preface for Easter proclaims. The second stanza reflects the description of the resurrection of the death in 1 Corinthians 15. God's Word gives the promise of victory over death and the grave that belongs to us by His grace through faith in the risen Lord Jesus Christ. As His death was "death's undoing," His life is "life renewing" for those who believe (Romans 6:5). Christ's death and resurrection are ample reason to give Him thanks, praise, and adoration. They motivate the mission of the Church to spread His "honor" in word and deed to every nation. In so doing, we claim the full joy and consolation of freedom from misery and death that belong to God's people in Christ. *Lutheran Service Book, Companion to the Hymns, Vol. 1.
