In this case, the numbers play to your advantage: Generally, only a few people will apply for every opening job as a preschool educator, and sometimes you can actually be the only job candidate. This means you don't need to be better than others. You just need to convince interviewers that you are good enough for the job. They usually use a few personal questions (questions about your motivation, goals, experiences, and strengths) and a few behavioral questions (questions about how you've approached certain situations in the past, or how you would approach them in your teaching work). That's enough for interviewers to understand your personality, motivation and attitude well, and decide whether you deserve a chance as a preschool educator. Let's look at the question! Why would you apply for a preschool educator job? Try to avoid linking to the past by saying you're in applying because you've finished the field. Focus rather on the future, what you want to achieve as a preschool educator, and, of course, on your love for children. Tell them that you enjoy being around children, that you see a meaningful purpose in this work (at no other time in life can we form children as much as we can in their preschool years) and that you feel ready and qualified to do the job well from day one. Speak enthusiastically. Interviewers have to really believe that you want a job, and don't apply just because you've finished the field, or because you need any work to make money. Describe how you imagine a typical day in the job. Now you have to show them that you know what's expected of you and that you don't wear rose-tinted glasses when it comes to learning. There will be problems, there will be challenges. But it's your attitude to the problems that matter to interviewers. Describe the games you play with children, as well as the skills and abilities you plan to constantly develop with activities of your choice. You can talk about bringing children to nature (if possible in your place), helping them build healthy relationships with both nature and their surroundings. At the end of the day, you can just say that you want to fill your day with meaningful activities, and plan to be busy from morning to afternoon, doing activities with them, and solving the problems that may arise in your classroom. Special Counsel: Download the full list of questions on one page of a long PDF document, and practice interview answers anytime later: What are the most common challenges faced by preschool educators? The correct answer to this question varies from country to country, but one thing is common for every preschool: problems with discipline. Obviously, we can't control that parents as they raise their children. In each of them we will find some children struggling with discipline and sometimes even children who may be ugly for their classmates and do not follow the rules at all. Problems with discipline present perhaps the biggest challenge, but you can remember other things, such as: cleaning, changing diapers, crying children, paperwork, etc. Do not forget to check: How to overcome interview nerves – get rid of stress and deliver your best in interviews. Why would you want to work here and not in another kindergarten? This is your chance to praise the school for doing well. Perhaps they have an amazing playground for children, or a great and peaceful location? Perhaps their teachers have an excellent reputation and you've heard just good things about them? If you can identify anything that makes them stand out in your eyes, please refer to it in your answer. And if you do not see anything special in a particular school, you can just say that this is the nearest nursery school – so you will be comfortable working for them, and not somewhere else where you have to go to work. Imagine one of the children refusing to obey your orders, on an ongoing basis. What would you do? Having such a child in your classroom is difficult, and it creates problems for everyone. When you need to pay special attention to one of the children, you cannot pay enough attention to the rest of the class. So you have to tell interviewers that you will do everything you can to solve the problem. And how can you solve it? Advising parents, working with a school psychologist (if they are employed in an educational institution), trying as much as possible to win the respect and trust of the child is the way to go. We can even say that at worst it is possible that you will be invited to release the child. You may also be interested: The elementary teacher will interview questions and answers – some questions echo preschool issues, and you should prepare for them. How would you encourage children to work together and socialize? Most children will socialize naturally and we don't have to do anything special to make it happen. Just give them a free hand, and show some love... However, you may want to suggest doing activities that naturally encourage them to collaborate together and talk to each other. Sports, games that don't have winners and losers, and activities like general drawing, or general dance are a great choice of activities. Feel free to come up with your own ideas! Other questions you might get in your preschool educator interview Why such a level of education? Why not primary or secondary school? Tell us about the games you plan to play with your students and why you prefer these games for other games. What would your former colleagues (classmates) say about you? What do you like to do in your spare time? What are your school principal and other administrators? Do you consider yourself a team player? What are your salary expectations? Your biggest weakness as a teacher? Why should we hire you and not another person trying to get this job done? Conclusion and next steps, more in-depth training You will not compete with many applicants for work in this interview, but you still have to demonstrate your motivation, correct attitude to work and readiness to work. In this case, your non-verbal communication is extremely important. Interviewers should feel that you really want a job that you enjoy working with kids. Why did you become a preschool educator? The very first question they're going to ask, and it shouldn't be a surprise when they ask. So prepare a speech on this issue and you can say things like, you love kids and its great to be around them. Or you can say that teaching children is a passion and you always want to do it. No matter what you say, just say it as you actually mean it! 2. What is your favorite thing in learning in preschool? Here you will also have to respond to things like its complex and that you love the way children learn at this stage and you want to help them at this growing stage. Before how to go for an interview, just prepare one of two lines that offer your favorites about preschool education. 3. What do you not like about preschool? This question may or may not be asked, but you have to answer it very reasonably. You can say that children at this age can be distracted very easily, but I find it challenging more than difficult. Their distraction is what makes me do more and do my best. 4. Do you realize your duties as a preschool teacher? Now it's a matter of asking you to know your preschool educator skills, and you'd better be prepared for it. You can say things like preschool are different from teaching older children, here you'll have to teach them about starting everything, whether it's quantity, alphabets or morality and values. And it will be a duty to teach them good things and add values to them. 5. What are your strengths as a preschool teacher? Now it's a matter of where you have to sell yourself. You can say things like, you're good at watching the kids and know how to meet the needs of them, how every child is different, and you can't treat everyone the same at this point. You can also say that you are very flexible and dedicated or you have good communication skills as a preschool educator. 6. How will you manage the class. In this matter, you can use your previous experience. You can say that you will not be intimidated instead of gentle and intelligent. And you can handle the kids very well. You can say that you believe in a nice but educational approach, and that's what you believe in. How do you manage to work as a team for children? You can't start your answer that you know how important it is that kids appreciate teamwork. And you can say what you've done in the past to get kids to work in a group. 8. How would you talk to your parents? This one is a pretty simple question and just make sure you come out straight. You can say that you know very well to balance children and parents and how important it is to talk to them about their child so they can be related to their child. 9. what will be your full schedule for the day in preschool. This is a typical question, you can say things like you would like to get them to do both indoors and outdoors, and you would change your schedule as needed by your student. 10. What will be your general approach as preschool? This is an individual-based issue and you can enter your personal philosophy of teaching children in preschool and how you meet their needs, including various activities to make them better learn.
