The 1948 Palestinian-Israeli war is known to the Israelis as the War of Independence, but for the Palestinians it will forever be Nakba, a disaster. Along with the creation of the State of Israel, the end of the war led to one of the largest forced migrations in modern history. About a million people were driven from their homes at gunpoint, civilians were killed and hundreds of Palestinian villages deliberately destroyed. During the 1948 war in Palestine, some 720,000 Palestinian Arabs out of 900,000 who lived in the territories that became Israel had fled or were driven from their homes. The reasons for this outcome are contradictory and discussed by historians. In his own words, Ilan Pappé wants to convey the paradigm of ethnic cleansing and use it to replace the paradigm of war as the basis for research and public debate about 1948. The thesis of the book is that the forced displacement of Palestinians into the Arab world was the goal of the Zionist movement and a must for the desired character of the Jewish State. According to Pappé, the exodus of Palestinians in 1948 was the result of the planned ethnic cleansing of Palestine by the leaders of the Zionist movement, mainly David Ben-Gurion, and the other 10 members of his advisory group referred to by Pappé. The book alleges that ethnic cleansing was carried out by the systematic expulsion of some 500 Arab villages, as well as terrorist attacks carried out mainly by Irgun and Hagana soldiers against civilians. Ilan Pappé also cites The Dalet Plan and the village files as evidence of planned expulsions. Reference about that that The events were the results of a planned expulsion had already been proposed by historians Walid Khalidi in the Dalet plan: the Zionist master plan for the conquest of Palestine (1961) and Nur-Eldin Masalha in the exile of the Palestinians: The Concept of Transfer in Zionist Political Thought (1991). Yoav Gelber published a response criticizing the interpretation of Plan D, made by Waleed Khalidi and Ilan Pappé: History and Invention. Was Plan D a plan for ethnic cleansing? (2006) Benny Morris offered several interpretations. The conclusion of his main work on the birth of Palestinian refugees (1989) was that the outcome was the result of war, not intention. However, he later stated that in hindsight, it was clear that what had happened in 1948 in Palestine had been the various ethnic cleansing of Arab areas by Jews. It is impossible to say how many of the 700,000 Palestinians who became refugees in 1948 were physically expelled, as opposed to simply fleeing the war zone. In an interview with Ha'aretz in 2004, he also defended the idea that ethnic cleansing in 1948 was a better choice for Jews than genocide. In his last book on the 1948 war: 1948: The Story of the First Arab-Israeli War (2006), he nuanced it all and stated that in 1948 the war, (...) although there were expulsions and, although in the critical months there was an atmosphere of so-called ethnic cleansing, the transfer never became a general or declared Zionist policy. Thus, by the end of the war, despite the fact that most of the country was cleared of Arabs, other parts of the country, in particular central Galilee, remained with a significant Muslim Arab population (...) ... Most recently, Rosemary Esber's Under the Cover of War (2008) agrees with Ilan Pappé and makes new arguments from British documents in support of the thesis that the outcome was planned by the leaders of Isha'va. A critical analysis of the admission in peer-reviewed journals by Professor Uri Ram of Ben-Gurion University in a review of the Middle East journal concluded that Pappé provides here the most important and courageous book that challenges Israeli historiography, as well as collective memory and, more importantly, the Israeli conscience. In the journal Peace Research, Jürgen Jensenhaugen, calling the book a good read, accuses Pappé of claiming that the pre-planned expulsion of Palestinians was the cause of war and not just one aspect of various military plans. Ephraim Nimni in the Journal of Palestine Studies praises the book's polemical nature but argues that the Zionist leaders are not solely responsible for ethnic cleansing: Therefore, even if Pappé's chronology is correct, and there is no reason to doubt it, the book does not provide sufficient explanation cleansing Palestine. As careful as the planning of Isha'vah 'settlers' planning may be, it would have been inconclusive without the unusual connotation of international events (the genocide of European Jewry, the beginning of the Cold War, the closure of the liberal democratic gates for Jewish refugees, the emancipation of colonies in North Africa and, finally, not least the hegemony of the model of an ethnic nation state as the only available path for national emancipation). Ahmad H. Saadi, in international affairs, highly recommended the book. The main responses of the media Critical Analysis appeared in the New Republic. In his review of The Ethnic Cleansing of Palestine, his colleague Benny Morris wrote, At best, Ilan Pappé should be one of the most slobic historians in the world; at worst, one of the most dishonest. In truth, he probably deserves a place somewhere in between. Morris argued: Such distortions, large and small, characterize almost every page of Palestinian ethnic cleansing. Ian Black, the Guardian's Middle East editor, reviewed it, calling it a catalogue of intimidation, exile and atrocities. He also noted that Pappé does a historical understanding of the disservice to all, but ignores the mood and motives of the Jews, so soon after the end of the war, in which six million were exterminated by the Nazis. By emphasizing each other, it's hard to say what's new in his account. The scheme discussed at a meeting in Tel Aviv, Plan Dalet, has been known for years. It has long been clear that Arab leaders have not encouraged Palestinians, as previously claimed, to leave their homes temporarily. The young Israeli state was not captured, as the old narration of David and Goliath says, by five Arab armies. Egypt attacked in the south of the country, and Jordanian and Iraqi troops entered the territory allocated to the Palestinians by the United Nations. Ethnic cleansing in Palestine is Israel's original sin, laid out naked but without any extenuating circumstances. David Pryce-Jones, writing in The Literary Review, calls Pappé an Israeli academic who made a name for himself by hating Israel and everything he stands for. For him, Israeli politicians and soldiers, once and for all, have so many killers. Forests were planted only to hide the past. Houses are monstructural villas and palaces for wealthy American Jews. Everything Israeli is ugly, everything is Palestinian beautiful. As evidence of the Israeli monster, he relies on quotations from his previous work or Palestinian controversies and, above all, on oral testimonies of Palestinian refugees. More than half a century of military and ideological conflicts have passed since their exodus, but Pappé says he believes that everything they say is true. Stephen Howe, professor of colonial history at the University of Bristol, said that Pappé is often a mixture of historical arguments and a political-moral tract. According to Howe, while the book will not be the final word on the events of 1948, it is a major interference in the argument that will and should continue. Seth J. Franzman, who writes quarterly in the Middle East, states that Pappé is blinded by his need to fit events into his preferred narrative, and the fact that there is little new evidence he includes does not convince when viewed in the context of historical events - a context that Pappé strictly hides.
