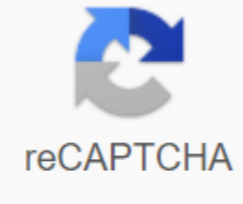

I don't care if you're tired of hearing this, it bears repeating: the studio behind the new ghost in the film Shell got the casting wrong. Still, if you're among the many longtime fans of the franchise who may feel apprehensive about spending money to watch a movie, there's a way to get a taste of it for free - in virtual reality. Paramount Pictures has teamed up with Oculus to release a short VR experience for the Oculus Rift and Samsung Gear VR, which will take you to the head of Major Kusanagi performed by Scarlett Johansson. Image: Paramount, Oculus is an incredibly well thought out futuristic world of film recreated in VR, but I have to say that it looks like peak work, as visuals just don't live up to what's currently possible in VR (or what we see in the movie version). The fact that this is a passive experience is another disappointment. (You can use the trigger controller to stutter a step through the scene, but you can't affect the result). Instead of letting you interact with the environment, you should sit back and watch the character dive from the building and attack a group of robots and people in a scene that is reflected in the film. After the battle scene, Major Kusanagi enters a kind of dream world, which leads to the end of the VR experience. Overall, I'm excited to see this kind of VR tie-in becoming commonplace with major movie releases. At best, it adds another layer of interaction with the world presented in the film, and sometimes even offers an additional insight into the story. The Independent's Andrew Orlowski reports that the Internet, the foundation on which much of today's business is made, may collapse sooner than expected due to background noise caused by inactive computers. Yes? It turns out that when businesses and organizations stop using computer systems and networks, even if they don't stay connected to the web, they cause background radiation because other machines are trying to find them - and if they're connected, they keep sending periodic, weak queries because old habits die hard. Radiation exists even if computers are not active. It's the price to be attached to the internet. Simple a network of 64,000 inactive, disconnected computers costs the supplier supplier \$1,300 per month at current U.S. wholesale bandwidth prices. And if these computers are included, then the amount of static, and cost, will triple to about \$4,000. And that's before one user typed a web address or did some other activity. Robin Bandy, the system administrator for a California provider, gave a rare insight into zombie activity, charting what happened to a computer that was achievable but dead for eight months. Although the machine was turned off, the unique number still received the chatter that went through the Cliq Bundy network. The end point got an average of 20 bits of traffic per second, going up to 60 bits per second when the machine was turned on and responded to the incoming chatter. It doesn't sound much compared to the junk email streams we get: 60 bits, seven and a half bytes, barely enough to represent the word zombies. As users, we barely notice it. Today's set modems usually send and receive about 800 times more per second, so radiation won't suffocate your home computer. But for the provider it is important - and, as the figures above show, expensive. Our old cars are talking to us. And to each other. At great expense. Just as it is important to consider the cost of abandoned electronics and computer equipment, we must bear in mind the costs of not cleaning the cookie crumbs our machines leave on the floor of the net when we turn off the lights and close the door on the pensioner.
