Carbon Ore, Critical Minerals (ORE-CM) in the Greater Green River and Wind River Basins:

Transforming and Advancing a National Coal Asset Hosting Inaugural Forum

University of Wyoming in collaboration with Western Wyoming Community College will be hosting their first CORE-CM Annual Forum on Thursday, October 20th from 8am – 5pm at Western's Rock Springs Campus, 2500 College Drive, Rock Springs in Room 3650.

Objectives of CORE-CM in the Greater Green River and Wind River Basins:

- · This project will develop and catalyze regional economic growth, job creation, and associated technology innovation in The Greater Green River Basin/Wind River Basin (GGRB-WRB) of Wyoming and Colorado.
- Growth will be achieved by increasing the supply of Carbon Ore (CORE), Critical Materials (CM), and Rare Earth Elements (REE) to manufacturers of non-fuel Carbon Based Products (CBP) and products reliant upon CM.
- · The project will develop a coalition team to describe what relationships, technology, infrastructure, and scientific understanding of these resources are necessary to achieve this objective.

Project Benefits:

- · Provide an economic benefit to U.S. Coal Basins by stimulating new development of resources centered around current coal mining and related industries.
- · Establish strategic plans to maximize the development of potential carbon ore, rare earth elements, and critical minerals; within the creation of public-private partnerships
- · Leverage highly trained workforces, existing coal technologies, energy infrastructure in entire supply chain development within coal regions.
- · Bring together a committed network of stakeholders, gaining acceptance of new energy technology within coal regions and across communities.

Workshop Details:

This day-long summit will bring together critical stakeholders in Wyoming from the federal, state, and local governments, tribal communities, industry, and other key partners to discuss coordination on broadband efforts as the state prepares to receive significant broadband funds from the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act. Connecting all people in Wyoming to affordable, reliable high-speed internet is critical to our economic stability and this event will provide an opportunity for us to discuss ways we can work together to efficiently and effectively utilize these federal dollars to the maximum extent. The day will feature a series of keynote addresses and panel discussions about relevant next steps, planning efforts, needs, and challenges.



Culinary Arts Program Gets a Makeover

Ms. Marisa DeClercq has led the way on revamping the Culinary Arts Program at Green River High School. This

past summer the District transformed her classroom from a home based cooking model to a restaurant and hospitality model.

The newly remodeled classroom will allow Ms. DeClercq to focus on teaching skills in restaurant management, hospitality, nutrition and dietetics. The environment that these skills will be taught will change the learning and will build in students an understanding of what the food industry will look like when they enter the workforce. The classroom includes 6 industrial cooking centers equipped with preparation tables and state of the art equipment. Each center looks like a smaller version of a



restaurant kitchen. The students will not only learn about the food industry, but also how to work with the new equipment and how to be safe and sanitary in the process.

Marisa has been teaching Culinary Arts at Green River High School for 6 years. She also leads the high school's active student government and loves being a Wolf! She is so excited to be working with a new group of students this year and working with them to become better chefs.

Sweetwater School District #2 is fortunate to have dedicated teachers like Ms. DeClercq whose inspired work is preparing students for the future.

Governor Mark Gordon's education initiative has completed its statewide listening sessions and is currently preparing a series of policy recommendations.

Building on the momentum of a statewide survey that garnered in excess of 7,000 responses, the Governor's Reimagining and Innovating the Delivery of Education (RIDE) Advisory Group hosted 17 listening sessions with more than 200 attendees. Participants included parents, students, employers, district employees and community members. Some of the

most common feedback received during the listening sessions included support for more individualized approaches to learning, including more flexibility for students to move at their own pace.

Attendees also advocated for addressing standards and expanding options that prepare students for careers and life, approaches which align well with the "Profile of a Graduate" work that the State Board of Education is completing. Additional topics that were also emphasized included an increase of focus on the early years before third grade, including pre-kindergarten; increasing mental health support for students and educators; and teacher preparation, retention and recruitment.

"We asked our citizens how they would improve Wyoming's education system so we can better prepare students for successful careers in our changing world," Governor Gordon said. "We heard a consistent message in both our small and large communities – they support their local teachers and want to maintain control. But we can do more to address challenges such as teacher retention, student engagement and the mental health of both students and staff members."

The RIDE Advisory Group is currently identifying opportunities for innovative approaches based on implementation methods that are achievable and sustainable in order to equip Wyoming students for success in a rapidly changing world. RIDE's work will include reviewing innovations within Wyoming, as well as other states and nations while conferring with experts and the State Board of Education to examine how these approaches might fit in Wyoming. A summary of policy recommendations will be available for public review later this fall.

"It is abundantly clear that we need to appreciate the uniqueness of each student; and to promote an educational system centered on preparing each student for a productive and fulfilling future consistent with that student's dreams and abilities," RIDE Chairman John Masters said.
