THE SAMUEL HUNTINGTON PUBLIC SERVICE AWARD

The Samuel Huntington Public Service Award was established as a memorial to Samuel Huntington who was President and Chief Executive Officer of the New England Electric System (now part of National Grid) until his untimely death in July 1988. The first award was presented in May 1989 and as of 2023, 88 awards have been granted.

2023	Seungwon (Lucy) Lee plans to lead community-based maternal and child-health education programs in the villages of Jinja , Uganda to reduce maternal and child mortality rates.
2023	Alexandra Potter will implement a multi-phase community outreach and engagement project to promote the early detection of lung cancer through screening in the Black community of Boston , Massachusetts .
2023	Jahnavi Rao will work to strengthen democracy and promote a culture of civic engagement through student-led non-partisan high school voter registration drives across the US with a focus on historically disadvantaged communities and low-socioeconomic schools.
2022	Joshua Kim developed culturally-relevant health infographics and improving workflow and patient wayfinding at medical facilities in West Philadelphia , Pennsylvania . In addition, he is implementing an ambassadorship model in an after-school program for students who have English as a second language.
2022	Tess Pollins is replacing on orphanage in Zinga, Tanzania with a new facility and working to ensure that all residents of the orphanage attend school.
2021	Wainright Acquoi established an entrepreneurial academy for high school students in Paynesville, Liberia. The program is equipping students with entrepreneurial skills.
2021	Carson Eckhard addressed the shortage of support available to incarcerated people in Philadelphia , Pennsylvania . Project HOPE assisted people seeking relief from wrongful convictions and operated a comprehensive reentry preparation program.
2021	Tolani Yesufu set up a primary health center in a section of Lagos , Nigeria that did not have a primary health center. She partnered with a local health organization to provide free tests for eyes, blood pressure, HIV and malaria.
2020	Angela Frimpong renovated a school in Gbulahagu, Ghana and implemented in the school EntrepreYearn, an entrepreneurship program that inspires socio-economic development.
2020	Addison Luck improved environmental literacy and stewardship in Kaua'i , Hawaii . He worked with local, underrepresented community members and youth to reincorporate Native Hawaiian environmental thought and attitudes in modern law and culture.
2020	Zariah Tolman established Positivity Outward which operates an app-based mentorship program that serves rural youth in Montana .
2019	Johnny Buck set up camps and on-going leadership mentoring in Washington state to support Native American youth and empower them to pursue careers in STEM. The camps combined

Indigenous and Western science through outdoor experiential education, intergenerational cultural enrichment, technical science training and in-depth mentorship. 2019 Phacelia Jane Cramer led after-school classes in Portland, Oregon in which disabled and nondisabled students participated together in activities and art projects. She worked with educators and non-profits to connect low-income families with disabled youth to needed resources. 2019 Swaraj Privadarshi pioneered an experiential learning-cum-service leadership program in India working with middle and high school students to imagine, plan and execute self-designed service projects in lower income communities. The program, entitled Dexterity Seva, was connected to Dexterity Global. 2018 Dennis Delasi Nyanyo renovated the Bolgatanga, Ghana Regional Library which was in disrepair and revamped their mobile van service so that the library could continue serving the community and outlying districts. Dennis secured the help of two agencies so that the library could continue to have quality books in its collection. 2018 Dejah Powell created HEAL (Health, Engaged Activism, and Learning). Through gardening at a school and field trips to museums and cultural events, she increased understanding among young black students on the south side of Chicago, Illinois about environmental consciousness and healthy food. 2018 Suriya Shahi built the Sapura Dream Foundation School in Humla, Nepal to provide free, quality primary and secondary education to disadvantaged and marginalized children. It was the first independent, non-political school in the area. 2017 Gianna Biaggi created a community library in the Kibera slums of Nairobi, Kenya, and established Sunflower Fellows, a 4-year literacy and leadership program for low-achieving girls attending informal schools. 2017 Josephine Gardner created employment for impoverished mothers in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia. Homeless women were taught traditional weaving skills and the scarves, wraps and other items were sold to high-end fashion outlets enabling the women to become self-supporting. 2017 Antoinette Kona Zoumaniqui established Project Y.V.E.T.A. (Youth for Vocational Education and Training in Agriculture) to educate youth in **Senegal** combining traditional classroom subjects in math, reading, and writing with vocational training in agriculture and agri-entrepreneurship. 2016 Brett Davidson launched the Connecticut Bail Fund to support pretrial detainees who lack financial resources. Assistance was provided to defendants who posed a low risk of default enabling them to keep their jobs, support their families and contribute to the community while awaiting trial. 2016 Taehoon Kim created a computer and mobile phone project to improve healthcare in rural populations of the **Dominican Republic**. The program connected patients to specialists via video conferencing and reduced medication stock-outs thereby saving lives. 2016 Sharad Sagar founded Dexterity Global and D2C (Dexterity to College) to increase college opportunities for low-income students in Bihar Province, India. Dexterity Global has grown into a national organization powering the next generation of leaders through educational opportunities and training.

Yasmine Arrington created a nonprofit entitled ScholarCHIPS (Scholarships for Children of Incarcerated Parents) that provides mentoring and financial help to high school graduates in

	Washington , DC who wish to pursue a college degree. The students she helps have a parent or parents in prison, are in positions of financial hardship and bear the burden of the prejudice associated with their parent's incarceration.
2015	Shadrack Frimpong built a tuition-free Model School for Girls in Tarkwa Bremen, Ghana on land donated by the community. His organization, Cocoa360, is championing a self-sustaining model of rural development.
2015	Kathryn Amelia Watts implemented a vocational training pilot program in Pune , India that provided greater economic opportunity for the most disadvantaged families.
2014	Alexander Epstein took abandoned city blocks in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania and converted them into vegetable gardens. His project, Urban Creators, provides nutritious food for the neighborhood.
2014	Lonnie Hackett launched an innovative model of school-based health services and education in the N'gombe District of Lusaka, Zambia . His program, Healthy Leaners, has been adopted by the Ministries of Health and Education as national policy and served 450,000 children.
2014	Michael Long started Sail for Justice which provides leadership training, team building, counseling and physical challenges to young men in Florida that the justice system deems dangerous.
2013	Alex Freid started PLAN (Post Landfill Action Network) to reduce waste on college campuses. The program has spread to hundreds of campuses across the US that are working towards a goal of zero waste.
2013	Bentrice Jusu brought Both Hands to Trenton , New Jersey as an after-school and summer program for teens. Disadvantaged youth engaged in activities using art as a tool for personal and community development.
2013	Mahmud Johnson established a program in Monrovia , Liberia that provided students with the educational background needed to attend college in the US.
2012	Michael Bernert created WAVA, an LLC that provided risk capital to small and medium scale agricultural entrepreneurs in Sierra Leone to increase food production and job creation.
2012	Tasmiha Khan improved access to sanitation in Khulna , Bangladesh with tube wells, latrines, and sanitary kits. The program empowered women to become leaders in and advocates for their communities.
2012	Dian Liu conducted after-school dance sessions in New York City for immigrant students to help them adjust to the U.S. and to an interrupted education. The dancing provided a healthy outlet that helped the young students build emotional and social competencies.
2012	Jason Lynch provided at-risk youth in Brockton, Massachusetts with an athletic outlet to teach focus and discipline. The program, which ran four days per week, offered boxing training and school support.
2011	Aïcha Cissé taught English to children and adolescents living in Morro Dos Prazeres, a shanty town in Rio de Janeiro , Brazil , through an established after-school program.
2011	Cory Rodgers established an urban agriculture and poultry husbandry program for people living with HIV and AIDS in the low-income Manzese area of Dar es Salaam, Tanzania. By providing

	the training, supplies, and support necessary for participants to grow crops and raise free-range chickens, the program provided a sustainable source of nourishment and income for people.
2011	Kelsey Tackett implemented a mentoring program for seventh grade girls in Floyd County , Kentucky . The program included volunteer work, field trips, and tutoring.
2010	Mark Arnoldy established Possible Health to treat acute malnutrition among children in rural Nepal . It has grown into an organization that delivers healthcare from hospital-to-home serving 200,000 patients annually.
2010	Arielle Tolman created the Microfinance and Maternal Health Initiative to improve maternal and infant health and promote women's economic development in the Kibera slum of Nairobi, Kenya . Female community volunteers were trained as home birth attendants and provided with birthing kits supported by the proceeds from a community garden.
2009	Sadiqa Basiri founded the Oruj Institute of Higher Education in Kabul, Afganistan. Oruj has grown into a university that serves women and men.
2009	Wendy Herrera constructed 50 composting toilets in Usa River, Tanzania . This sanitation project reduced groundwater contamination and produced safe fertilizer for agricultural use.
2008	Caitlin Lee Cohen produced six interactive radio shows that were aired as "Rajo Bamako: An Bee Ta Don" (Radio Bamako: It Belongs to Us All). They were the first radio programs to give voice expressly to problems in Mali's slums.
2008	Rishi Mediratta improved the health of orphans in Gondar, Ethiopia by training their caregivers. Community health workers were educated with the skills and knowledge to prevent and treat childhood illnesses.
2008	Kelly Quinn implemented an English language curriculum for children in an orphanage named Nuestros Pequenos Hermanos (Our Little Brothers and Sisters) in the Dominican Republic . It provided the children with job potential once they reached maturity and left home.
2007	Jennifer Browning established a soccer program for girls in Senegal called The Ladies' Turn. The program greatly expanded over time.
2007	Paul Javid used a visual database of elementary and high school lessons delivered by teachers to educate needy students and train teachers in India and Bangladesh .
2007	Elizabeth Sholtys expanded the Ashraya Initiative for Children in Pune , India by creating a health education and resource center in the heart of the Kamraj Nagar slum. The program provided education and health care to children from nomadic tribes.
2006	Abraham Awolich started a new model secondary school that educates girls and boys in Kalthok, Sudan . Girls were being kept home to grind corn for families' evening meal, so he incorporated a corn grinding machine into the plans for the school.
2006	Haley Reimbold launched the Underground Café, a student-run initiative that brought together diverse populations in the Utica , New York area to address pressing social issues through creative means.
2005	Onyi Offor started a program that provided breast cancer screening for women in Ibadan, Nigeria.

2005 Jessica Schiffman created student choirs and provided scholarships for music students in New England. 2004 Vadim Ostrovsky worked with an agency to create computer labs and gather valuable information about technology in high schools throughout **Ukraine**. The project educated students and teachers in computer literacy. 2004 Edwardo Valero established La Casa Cultura, a haven for intellectual curiosity and creative art, in Orosi, California. The program encouraged high school students in a poverty-stricken area to seek higher education while learning about how to beautify the community through mural artwork. 2003 Colleen Kinder worked with the Inter-Religious Foundation for Community Organization to launch a program to collect and oversee the distribution of equipment for the elderly in **Cuba**. The program included recreation, recruitment, and renovation projects in nursing homes. 2003 Elizabeth Rodrigues-Ross launched a training program for volunteers in Springfield, Massachusetts to assist families facing eviction. The volunteers helped people prepare clear presentations of their cases in the Western Massachusetts Housing Court. 2002 Joshua Dankoff established an AIDS education program for the four all-male schools in Abuja, Nigeria. Working with an agency, the program educated youth using a combination of discussion, presentation, and music. 2002 Karina Weinstein launched the Esperanza Cultural Center in a Santiago, Chile shantytown. The center's main focus was literacy and education, but it also served as a safe space for creative expression through community theater and visual arts. 2001 Meena Said created a program for widow refugees from the war in Afganistan. The program provided long-term gainful employment focusing on skills the women already possessed and literacy skills that were taught. 2001 Stacy Dean Truta implemented a pilot program for adolescent cancer patients in San Jose, Costa Rica. The program gave patients the opportunity to create positive experiences through peer interaction, education, and outreach. 2000 Steeve Cespedes Mordan taught English as a second language to school children, established and maintained an English library, and facilitated an after-school English language club in Croixdes-Bouquets, Haiti. 2000 **Jeannie Lang** started Let's Get Ready, a tutoring and mentoring program that provides students from historically underrepresented backgrounds across the US with the support they need to attain a college education. 2000 Lisa Avigdor Liguori planned and built a cooperative and literacy center in Purraja, Costa Rica to help the villagers manage their economic livelihoods. To sustain a continuing supply of pianguas, a small mollusk the villagers gathered and sold to restaurants, she assisted with tracking the populations of the mollusks. 1999 Jamila Ann Cutliff created and expanded her Encourage Youth Educate Society (EYES) program in which engineering students taught economically disadvantaged children math and science through hands-on interactive engineering projects. The program began in **New York** and expanded to include other U.S. cities.

1999 Jennifer Carrie Oelberger built a study center in Kibaya, Tanzania that provided living quarters for students and a library. Also, a maize grinding machine was funded to provide income for the facility and to aid the villagers. Tashi Zangmo established Project Machig Labdron (Mother of Wisdom) which educates and 1999 empowers under-privileged Buddhist nuns in Bhutan. 1998 Nazleen Bharmal worked with VISIONS Mumbai, India to establish a student-run AIDS counseling program and hotline easily accessible to youth. 1998 Elaine Leong created Dare to Dream, an extended third year Summerbridge program in Hong Kong for 15-18 year old underprivileged students. Through a collaborative arts project, students were encouraged to become independent thinkers and influential community citizens. 1998 Mehret Mandefro implemented an after-school program for Ethiopian immigrant high school students in the Washington, D.C. area. The project assisted with the development of regular study habits and reading and writing skills 1997 Ruhi Khan founded KOSHISH in central India, a center where women were taught vocational skills, AIDS awareness and general education to help them escape emotional and mental abuses. 1997 Vivek Murthy created the Swasthya Community Health Partnership to train women as community health workers in rural India. 1997 Precious Wiliams created a program called Youth Empowered for Success to help young African-American boys ages 7-13 in the Third Ward of Houston. The program provided mentoring by Black role models, enrichment workshops, and a weekend retreat. 1996 Reenah Kim developed a summer program in Chicago, Illinois' South Side where she taught for two years. Dufirstson Neree created The Credit is Due Project which launched a financially-strong credit 1996 union to provide access to capital and economic opportunity for the residents of Little Haiti - an underserved section of Miami, Florida. 1995 Yea-Lan Chiang created SAMPLE (Social Action within a Multicultural Program in Language Enrichment) in California in response to LA riots. The program helped students strengthen their English skills and develop curiosity and respect for other cultures. 1995 Perry Weinberg proposed to establish a Tenant Information Hotline in New York City. 1994 Matthew Meyer founded Eco Sandals through which street kids in Nairobi, Kenya make sandals out of used tires and get an education. The business has grown and two of the original "children" now own it. E. Franklin Miller worked with the W.E.B. DuBois Academy in Cambridge, Massachusetts. He 1994 recruited college students to provide mentoring and tutoring to young African-American males. 1993 **Bernetta Avery** directed an after-school mentoring program, Operation Hope, for at-risk students in Ann Arbor, Michigan. In addition, she developed a program for in-school suspension students who were taught non-violent conflict resolution alternatives.

1993 Osman Waheed sought to establish a rural community-based literacy school for children at the Community Learning Center outside Islamabad, Pakistan. Due to a lack of community support for educating girls, the program was abandoned and the award money was donated to a local charity. 1992 Angela Lee Duckworth founded the Summerbridge project, now known as Breakthrough Greater Boston, a summer school for low-income students. The program annually serves as many as 750 students and trains 150 teaching fellows in Massachusetts. 1992 Nyaguthii Chege set up internships for high school students in Nairobi, Kenya to volunteer their vacation time to work at tree nurseries on school grounds and other public service activities. 1991 Jenn David directed the Summerbridge project in Providence, Rhode Island. Sixth graders were empowered with study skills necessary to succeed in academically challenging high schools. 1990 Kent Koth created the Alternative Break Coalition in Portland, Oregon where he recruited Oregon's college students to do volunteer work in a variety of settings during their spring and summer vacations. 1990 Jamie Metzl worked with refugees in camps in Cambodia on projects involving motor safety, prosthetic limbs production, writing, reporting and research. 1990 David Milner set up a non-profit organization in Washington, D.C., Funds for the Community's Future, that raised funds to create community-sponsored scholarships enabling economically disadvantaged youth to go to college. 1989 Lillian Ortiz worked on a literacy development project in Quito, Ecuador where she collaborated with the Spanish-as-a-second language team in writing and revising the first-grade teachers' guide for oral Spanish. The curriculum was developed for the special educational needs of the indigenous communities.
