
That same day, three female student athletes from our first Girls Division senior class signed their National Letter of Intent, committing to the following athletic programs:




## **ST. JOHN PAUL II LITURGICAL CENTER UPDATE**

In our Catholic liturgy, December is a month of beginnings and fulfilment. With Advent, we begin our liturgical year. Mary's Immaculate Conception, celebrated on December 8, takes our reflection back to the creation story, to God's original plan for humanity. Jesus's birth is the fulfilment of the salvation history and the high point in the human history. St. Paul refers to it as "the fullness of time" when "God sent his Son, born of a woman, born under the law, to ransom those under the law, so that we might receive adoption. As proof that you are children, God sent the spirit of his Son into our hearts, crying out, 'Abba, Father!" The birth of Jesus is therefore a new beginning, re-creation, restoration of God's original plan for humanity to live for eternity. St. John Paul II, in preparation for the Jubilee year (General Audience, Wednesday, Dec 10, 1997), makes an interesting reflection eternity brought to us through Jesus' nativity in the excerpt below.

## IN THE WORDS OF ST. JOHN PAUL II:

2,000 years of Christianity, the Jubilee takes us back to the event that inaugurates the Christian era: the birth of Jesus. Luke's Gospel tells us of this extraordinary event in simple and moving words: Mary "gave birth to her firstborn son and wrapped him in swaddling clothes, and laid him in a manger, because there was no place for them in the inn" (2:7).

*Jesus'* birth makes visible the mystery of the Incarnation already realized in the Virgin's womb at the time of the Annunciation. In fact, she gives birth to the child that, as the docile and responsible instrument of the divine plan, she had conceived by the power of the Holy Spirit. Through the humanity assumed in Mary's womb, the eternal Son of God begins to live as a child, and grows "in wisdom and in stature, and in favour with God and man" (Lk 2:52). Thus he manifests himself as true man.

This truth is stressed by John in the Prologue of his Gospel, when he says: "The Word became flesh and dwelt among us" (1:14). By saying "became flesh", the Evangelist is alluding to his human nature not only in its mortal condition, but also in its entirety. The Son of God assumed all that is human, except sin. The Incarnation is the fruit of an immense love, which spurred God willingly to share our human condition to the full.

*In becoming man, the Word of God brought about a fundamental change in the very condition of time.* We can say that in Christ, human time was filled with eternity.

This transformation touches the destiny of all humanity, since "by his Incarnation, he, the Son of God, has in a certain way united himself with each man" (Gaudium et spes, n. 22). He came to offer everyone participation in his divine life. The gift of this life includes sharing in his eternity. Jesus said so especially with regard to the Eucharist: "He who eats my flesh and drinks my blood has eternal life" (Jn 6:54). The effect of the Eucharistic banquet is that we already possess this life.

Elsewhere Jesus indicated the same possibility with the symbol of the living water that could quench thirst, the living water of his Spirit given in view of eternal life (cf. Jn 4:14). The life of grace thus reveals a dimension of eternity that lifts up our earthly existence and directs it, with true continuity, to our entrance into heavenly life.

# ST. NICHOLAS' DAY (Dzień Świętego Mikołaja/Mikołajki) THE MAGIC MORNING FOR KIDS IN POLAND

December 6<sup>th</sup>, St. Nicholas' Day (*Dzień Świętego Mikołaja*, also known as just *Mikołajki*) starts off the Christmas holiday season in Poland and is one of the most exciting days for children.



St. Nicholas, the 4<sup>th</sup>-century Bishop of Myra in Lycia, which is now a province of Turkey, had a reputation for secret gift-giving. His legend and generosity continue to be a big part of Polish Christmas celebrations and tradition that are passed on in many Polish families.

On the night of December 5th, St. Nicholas drops

off gifts either in carefully cleaned shoes that children place near their bed or in smaller packages hidden under pillows or on the floor next to the bed. The gifts are the first things children see after waking up the morning of December 6th when the magic of Christmas begins.

Most of the schools in Poland organize a special *Mikołaj* event where the children share gifts with each other. Weeks earlier, they draw cards with each other's names written on them, and then exchange the small symbolic presents during the school day that is closest to the day (for example if it falls on Sunday, the event could be held on any day around that weekend). This tradition of exchanging gifts is even popular among some close student groups at universities and even some workplaces.

Many people prepare small gifts for their closest friends, family, and loved ones, and gift them randomly on December 6th saying that St. Nicholas had "accidentally left the package in a wrong place".

In Poland, the gifts hidden under the Christmas Tree later in December are believed to be left, for example, by an Angel (*Aniolek*) or the Little Child (*Dzieciątko*, the Baby Jesus) - it depends on the beliefs of a particular region.

St. Nicholas' Day has not always been celebrated in the manner it is nowadays. The idea of Santa Claus/St. Nicholas bringing gifts to the children started becoming widespread only in the 19<sup>th</sup> century. Before that it was popular mostly among the wealthier families, such as the *szlachta* (Polish nobility). *Mikołajki* started to be widely celebrated at the end of 19<sup>th</sup> and beginning of the 20<sup>th</sup> century but gained the biggest popularity only after the end of the Second World War.

Polish Language Schools in Metro Detroit also celebrate a version of *Mikołajki* with their students. For example, students from the Father Dąbrowski Language Center at Orchard Lake will celebrate the tradition with a meaningful gathering for language instructors, students and their families. *Święty Mikołaj* (Saint Nicholas) will be dropping by on December 15<sup>th</sup> to celebrate the Christmas season and share small gifts with students in honor of his name day.



## PICR HOSTS COALITION OF POLISH AMERICANS

The Annual Convention of the CPA (Coalition of Polish Americans) occurred on the campus of Orchard Lake Schools, November 4-5, 2023.

Additionally, the Polish American Coalition held their elections. Mr. Leszek Pawlik was re-elected for a consecutive term as Chairman of the Coalition.

The Polish American Coalition is a non-profit organization that started its operations in 2017 and its main goal is to promote the interests of the Polish diaspora in the USA.

The Polish Institute of Culture & Research also hosted a Meet & Greet for Coalition representatives with the Institute's director, Dr. John

Radziłowski and representatives of the Institute's Board of Directors. Director Radziłowski answered questions from

the audience. The questions ranged on topics regarding the Institute's mission,





continuing Polish heritage at the Orchard Lake Schools and its strategic plan for the future. The Master of Ceremonies was Mrs. Maria Szonert-Binienda.

# POLISH INSTITUTE SPONSORS CHILDREN'S PROGRAM AT THE 30TH ANNUAL ANN ARBOR POLISH FILM FESTIVAL

The Polish Institute understands how critical it is to support language development at a young age. The Film Festival took place on November 10-12, 2023 at the State Theater in Ann Arbor. ## HERE ARE SOME REASONS WHY CARTOONS ARE IMPORTANT • by Ania Biciuk

Language Preservation • Polish language cartoons provide an opportunity for children of Polish descent to learn and practice the Polish language. By watching cartoons in Polish, they can develop their vocabulary, grammar, and pronunciation skills. This helps them maintain a connection to their heritage language, ensuring its preservation for future generations.

CULTURAL IDENTITY • Cartoons are not just about language; they also convey cultural values, traditions, and customs. Polish language cartoons expose children to Polish folklore, history, and traditions, fostering a sense of cultural identity and pride. Watching these cartoons together can facilitate intergenerational communication and strengthen family ties.

COMMUNITY BUILDING • Polish language cartoons can contribute to the formation of a Polish American community. They provide a shared cultural experience and can be a catalyst for organizing cultural events, language classes, or community gatherings. This sense of community helps Polish Americans connect with each other, fostering a supportive network and a sense of belonging.



## NICK DI PONIO (P'98) - NEW HEAD BASEBALL COACH



We're so excited to welcome back NICK DI PONIO as St. Mary's Preparatory Head Baseball Coach! The Prep Class of 1998 graduate helped lead the varsity baseball team to its first MHSAA state championship (1998) in school history. During his senior year, he was named to the All-State Dream Team and USA Today All-American honorable mention. "I played freshman and JV basketball, plus JV baseball in 9th grade," said Di Ponio, "and Varsity Coach John Willis asked my dad, Ben, if he'd be interested in the JV head coaching job. After I was asked to step into a few varsity games, I was moved up, and during my sophomore year, my dad moved into the varsity assistant coach position. I earned the privilege of being a two-year team captain my junior and senior years at OLSM."

Di Ponio continued his baseball career at Oakland University where he finished with a career .339 batting average, and currently ranks in the top ten

all-time in several offensive categories. During his college years, he pursued his degree in business and finance and met his wife, Lisa, who was pursuing a secondary education degree before going on to earn her Master of Arts in Teaching and Teaching English as a Second Language in subsequent years. Following his collegiate career, he played overseas in the Italian Professional Baseball League for four seasons. In 2002, he was a member of the San Marino Baseball Club competing in the European Cup in Barcelona, Spain.

Nick and Lisa married in 2004. From 2005-2010, he served as OLSM's varsity baseball head coach, bringing his dad, Ben, back as an assistant coach along with 1984 World Series Championship team member Dan Petry as another assistant coach. "During these six years, I brought in several other assistant coaches, including OLSM alumnus Joe Zacharzewski, and former Oakland University teammates Tony Marulli and Dominic Carmosino." Di Ponio helped lead the team to six district titles, three regional titles, and state runner-up finishes in 2007 and 2009. Several of his former players went on to college and professional baseball.

As their family grew, Di Ponio knew he had to move on with his family's needs and career demands in his real estate, property management and building business while wife, Lisa, worked full-time teaching high school students in the Farmington Public Schools. "In 2017, an opportunity arose to purchase an old driving range," adds Di Ponio. "It gave us a blank slate – a place to build an athletic complex." Today, Coach Di Ponio owns and operates the Huron Valley Athletic Complex (HVAC) in Milford, Michigan, as well as owning and operating the West Oakland Wings (WOW) amateur baseball and softball program, with 18 current travel teams from 8U-18U. 


