"From Old to New." Del Thomas will be the featured speaker and will bring quilts from her renowned collection.



It’s my turn to submit a recipe! I loved the comments about the carrot cake I brought in March, so I asked Phyllis if I could submit the recipe for the newsletter. It came from a book compiled by the United Methodist Church in Pacific Palisades, CA back in 1970. My aunt, Pauline Wade, gave the book to my mom with this inscription: “To my dear Sue, with all love and good wishes. Remember that “cooking can be fun” if we season every dish with love...” The recipe itself was actually submitted by Evalyn Spring—an appropriate name for an April reprinting. (by Sherri Vasquez)

Delicious Carrot Cake

2 C. Carrots (finely grated)
2 C. flour (sifted)
2 C. sugar
1½ C. oil
4 eggs
½ C. nuts
2 tsp. Baking powder
1 ½ tsp. Soda
2 tsp. Cinnamon
1 tsp. Salt
¾ C. pineapple (crushed)

Combine dry ingredients. Add the rest. Mix with a spoon until blended. Bake 40 minutes at 350 degrees in a 9X13 in greased pan. Ice in pan while warm.

Icing: Mix together:

4 oz. Cream cheese
2 Tbsp butter
1 tsp. Vanilla
½ box powdered sugar

Law clarification is good news for quilters

SAFE SEWING AHEAD: Quilters' and crafters' donations to children will not be affected by the law, which goes into effect today.

Quilters and crafters can breathe easier today knowing that a new law will not affect their donations to children.

For months, artisans have worried that the new law would make it illegal to donate quilts and other items to kids before testing all the fabric and thread for lead and other substances. The law, which goes into effect today, was passed in 2007 after Mattel recalled millions of toys imported from China that contained dangerous quantities of lead.

"I don't know how many quilters you know," said Carol Anderson of Houston, "but we tend to be a pretty generous group of people. I do a lot of very small blankets for neonatal units. It hurt me that these children in the hospital could be deprived of something that gives them a lot of comfort."

Recent clarification from the Consumer Product Safety Commission says that the law, directed at products for kids 12 and younger, would not fine or penalize anyone for distributing:

- Items made of natural materials such as wood, cotton or wool that rarely, if ever, contain lead.

- Dyed or undyed textiles (not including leather or vinyl) and nonmetallic thread used in children's apparel and other products, such as baby blankets.

Countless local groups and large national nonprofit organizations, including Project Linus and Quilts for Kids, rely on recycled or unwanted fabric for the quilts they send to children.


Testing for lead and phthalates (odorless, colorless chemicals often found in vinyl) would have busted their modest budgets.

Clarification of the new law is also good news for thrift and consignment stores.

The product safety commission on Jan. 30 also delayed some testing and certification requirements for importers and manufacturers for one year.

Anderson took the good news in stride, immediately posting a link from the Commission's Web site onto HGTV's quilting and needlework message board, where she talks to her quilting friends across the country.

"I know they are going to be so relieved," Anderson said.

Then we will sew groupings based on

your birth month and day. After lunch, we will work with these two groups to design our very own special block and quilt. There are many possible designs for each date so no two will look alike. A really fun experience.

About Lyn

Lyn Mann started quilting in 1981 and has been “hooked” ever since. Six years later, Lyn started teaching and found that this was where her real gift was. Over the past years, she has taught thousands of students and loves the one on one approach to teaching.

Ever active in her quilt community, Lyn was a past president of Flying Geese Quilt Guild and belongs to 3 Orange County quilt guilds. She is also a member of both Northern and Southern California Quilt Councils.

Besides teaching for guilds through-out the United States, Lyn has taught at “Road to California”, “Quilt Utah”, “Camp Watch-A-Patcher” and “Quilt Camp In The Pines” quilt conferences.

Lyn has taught on 7 quilting cruises including Alaska, the Hawaiian Islands and a cruise from the West Coast of Africa to Barbados.

In 1998, she was the featured artist for the Christmas exhibit at the La Conner Quilt Museum in La Conner, Washington.

Lyn has made over 440 quilts and designed approximately 70 for mysteries alone. She has had quilts pictured in 5

different major quilt books and 6 different quilting magazines. The featured book for the 2004 So. California quilters run was [“Hit The Pavement”](#) a book that Lyn wrote. She also wrote a series of 8 articles for Quilters’ Newsletter called “Slick Tricks”.

Lyn will be teaching her “Birthday Quilt” for our guild. Everyone’s quilt will be different, and it will be fun seeing them all when they are completed.
