The question is almost as hard to answer as the dreaded interview opener Tell Me About Yourself. But I don't want to give a two- or three-word answer for fear of ignoring the interviewer and decide for myself how to answer the question. The words you use can vary depending on the type of job you are interviewing, what others say about you and where you see yourself on your career track. Use words that match the most important conditions of the job. For example, if you're applying for a hotel housekeeping position, consider using words like conscientious, attentive or efficient. These are traits that will serve you in a position where employees expect to follow strict procedures in their duties such as cleaning, hotel guest service and managing the time they spend on several projects each day. Think about the words your colleagues use to describe you. Using words based on the perception of others may have more weight than bragging or trying to recall words that might be unassuming. When an interviewer asks for that one saying, he can say, My colleagues usually say I'm the most trusted member of our team because they can rely on pulling my weight and relying on me when I get a team assignment. In this case, it is appropriate to elaborate on why you choose the word. If you're interviewing for a job with your current employer, use language that will help you get promoted. I would be incredibly flattered (and very surprised) if someone called me charismatic. But if I call myself charismatic, you'd think I was jerky. Every remarkably focused person I know readily admits that he or she struggles to remain disciplined. Why is that? It's hard to get back on track. It's hard not to go to tangents. It's hard not to give and use the expression of football, take some plays. So you worked really hard and stayed at work today. Big deal. So you resisted today's temptation. Big deal.
