<p><b>1. Provide clear sorting for recycling and achieve a 50% recycling diversion rate.</b></p> <p>Diverting waste from the landfill to recycling can conserve natural resources and landfill space, while also reducing disposal costs. Get your free recycling container and be sure to put up appropriate signage.</p>	<p>Contact Groot to decide which recycling container size and collection frequency is right for your business. <p><b>2. Implement a composting program.</b></p> <p>Composting provides businesses with a method to dispose of a large portion of waste in a way that benefits the environment. <p><b>3. Get a free facility assessment for your business from ComEd and/or Nicor Gas and implement at least one recommended action.</b></p> <p>ComEd and Nicor Gas can help your business find energy-saving opportunities by doing a walk through and providing a report detailing energy efficiency projects with estimated energy savings, cost savings, project cost, and incentives.</p>	<p>Contacting ComEd and/or Nicor Gas in the beginning of the recognition process will help your business achieve multiple sustainable actions and find long term money savings.</p> <p><a href="#">ComEd Facility Assessment</a> <a href="#">Nicor Gas Facility Assessment</a></p>	<p>The facility assessment report from ComEd and/or Nicor along with receipts of implemented action</p>
<p><b>4. Purchase 100% renewable energy for your business.</b></p> <p>Buying renewable energy will offset the CO<sub>2</sub> emissions from your business' electricity and natural gas usage, reduce air pollution, and reduce water</p>	<p>Find a certified renewable energy provider to ensure credibility and confirmation of the product's environmental value.</p> <p><a href="#">EPA Guide to Purchasing Green Power Green-e</a></p>	<p>Bill of purchase</p>
<p><b>5. Replace 50% of incandescent light bulbs with LED light bulbs.</b></p> <p>Energy efficient lighting can help reduce your energy consumption and save your business money since efficient lighting technologies require significantly less energy and have a longer lifespan.</p>	<p>Conduct a lighting audit or get a ComEd facility assessment. 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<p><b>6. Install lighting controls, such as occupancy sensors in spaces of variable occupancy, daylighting controls, and time clocks.</b></p> <p>Turning off unnecessary lighting can save energy and money.</p>	<p>Identify the most appropriate areas for lighting sensors – think about common areas such as a bathroom, closets, conference rooms, kitchens, lounges, etc.</p> <p>Daylighting controls can be helpful in spaces with reasonable amounts of sunlight and can adjust artificial lighting levels automatically.</p> <p><a href="#">ComEd Choosing the Right Bulbs</a>  <a href="#">ComEd Lighting Incentives</a></p>	<p>Documentation of the purchase, installation receipts and/or photographs of the lighting controls</p>
<p><b>7. Make a policy requiring the purchase of ENERGY STAR and WaterSense qualified equipment and appliances.</b></p> <p>WaterSense aims to protect the water supply and promote and enhance the market for water-efficient products and services. ENERGY STAR labeling program helps identify the most efficient models for appliances and equipment. Efficient equipment can save energy, water, and money.</p>	<p>Meet with staff who are responsible for purchasing appliances and discuss ENERGY STAR and WaterSense equipment with vendors. ## Water

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<p><b>8. Replace all pre-rinse spray valves with low flow ones.</b></p> <p>Low flow pre-rinse spray valves can reduce water consumption and energy cost without sacrificing the functionality. They are easy to install and will save your business money.</p>	<p>Install pre-rinse spray valves with a target flow rate of 1.28 gallon per minute (gpm). <p><b>9. Replace all bathroom sink faucets with low flow faucet aerators.</b></p> <p>Demand for water has increased, but the supply is not stable and is vulnerable. Replacing equipment with low flow equipment can achieve cost savings and reduce risk when local supplies are not stable.</p>	<p>Install low flow faucet aerators with a target flow rate at 1.5 gallon per minute (gpm) maximum and a minimum of 0.8 gpm.</p> <p><a href="#">EPA’s WaterSense Bathroom Faucets</a>  <a href="#">Free products from Nicor Gas</a>  <a href="#">EPA Water Assessment Tools</a></p>	<p>Receipt of brand and model of sink faucet aerators</p>
<p><b>10. Utilize green infrastructure to decrease total volume of stormwater runoff.</b></p> <p>Stormwater runoff is a major cause of water pollution since it carries trash, bacteria, heavy metals, and other pollutants from the urban landscape. Green infrastructure uses vegetation, soils, and other natural processes to manage water.</p>	<p>This can be accomplished with native plantings, planter boxes, rain gardens, permeable pavers, or rain barrels.</p> <p><a href="#">Benefits of Green Infrastructure</a></p>	<p>A picture of green infrastructure on your property</p>
<p><b>11. Switch all-purpose cleaning products and cleaning products for restrooms to low toxic cleaning products.</b></p> <p>Avoiding toxic cleaners can reduce or eliminate health hazards for employees, improve indoor air quality, and protect the environment.</p>	<p>Any Green Seal, Safer Choice, EcoLogo, certified products meet guidelines to be non-toxic, but also offer the same cleaning performance as toxic counterparts. Cleaning products should be non-toxic and be ammonia, chlorine, and phosphate free.</p> <p><a href="#">EPA’s Safer Choice Product List</a></p>	<p>Receipt of purchase of products with names</p>

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<p><b>12. Switch to go/disposable utensils and packaging to compostable or recyclable options.</b></p> <p>On average, Americans generate 3.2 million tons of disposable food packing a year and less than 1% is recycled. Help reduce your business’s environmental footprint by switching from non-renewable petroleum products to an eco-friendly option.</p>	<p>If you want the products to be compostable, make sure to-go silverware and tableware are BPI certified. A lot of disposable products may say “biodegradable,” “degradable”, or make false claims if they are not certified by a third party. If you want the products to be recyclable, make sure it is numbered 1-5 or 7. Avoiding products made from polystyrene is better for your customer’s health and the environment since it is a number 6 plastic. <p><b>13. Eliminate the use of plastic bags.</b></p> <p>Plastic bags cost retailers more than \$4 billion dollars and are used on average for 12 minutes. They are hard to recycle, become litter, and break down into toxic smaller pieces.</p>	<p>Identify places plastic bags are given to customers and replace with paper or reusable bags. <p><b>14. Provide at least one dish on the menu with a Fair trade product, organic, or local ingredient.</b></p> <p>Fair trade ensures that the product was sourced ethically, which supports workers in the supply chain and the environment. Organic foods are grown without the use of toxic synthetic pesticides and fertilizers, irradiation, sewage sludge, and genetic engineering, which limit the need for chemicals that pollute waterways, exploit resources, and cause cancer in farmers. Buying locally saves energy from limiting transportation, waste and natural resources from packaging, and land from industrial development.</p>	<p>Fair trade food must be Fair-Trade Certified, organic food must be USDA Organic approved, and local food must be within 100 miles or less from farm to plate. 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<p><b>15. Purchase 100% post-consumer recycled copier/printer paper and 30% post-consumer recycled products (e.g. paper towels, envelopes, notepads, boxes, etc.)</b></p> <p>Producing paper is economically and environmentally costly. Buying napkins, toilet paper, office paper, and other paper products made of recycled content can reduce the use of raw materials.</p>	<p>Meet with your procurement department and draft a new policy for purchasing paper products. <p><b>16. Work with vendors to minimize and/or take back product packaging where possible.</b></p> <p>Finding products with less and without unnecessary packing will reduce the amount of waste you have to pay to dispose of. Some vendors are even willing to take back product packaging.</p>	<p>Ask your supplier if they have a takeback policy or alternate packaging. For example, some suppliers can bring milk in reusable glass containers and take them back for reuse.</p>	<p>A copy of the policy or a picture with a description of the waste reduction</p>

<p><b>17. Enroll in the RTA Transit Benefit Fare Program to allow employees to pay for transit fare using pre-tax dollars.</b></p> <p>Encouraging employees to take eco-friendly modes of transportation can ease traffic congestion and reduce emissions from car tailpipes.</p>	<p>Check with employees to see if this program would be beneficial to them and then visit the website to enroll.</p> <p><a href="#">RTA Transit Benefit Fare Program</a>  <a href="#">Shared-Use Mobility Center's Mapping Toolkit</a></p>	<p>Proof of enrollment and number of employees using benefit</p>
<p><b>18. Implement 3 strategies that show you are an Age-Friendly Business.</b></p> <p>Older adults are the fastest-growing segment of the population in the country. <p><b>19. <p><b>20. Implement a hiring policy that prioritizes Evanston residents and have at least 30% of your business's payroll include Evanston residents.</b></p> <p>A local hiring policy enhances local economic development and helps Evanston grow as a community.</p>	<p>Consider hiring an Evanston resident next time you need laborers, apprentices, or journeymen.</p> <p><a href="#">M/W/EBE's Local Employment Program</a></p>	<p>A list of your employees and an indication of who is an Evanston resident</p>
