

Most special nouns are made by multiple number, adding -s to the end of the single form. When the noun ends in the Siberian sound - /s/, /z/, /l/, /r/, /t/, /d/ - plural is formed by adding -es, or -s, if the singular already ends in -e. Multiple form of some noun, end in "r" or "le", made by changing the ending to -V(es). When the noun ends in the o, preceded by a consonant, the plural is often written by adding -es. Nouns that end in 'o', preceded by a vowel, are made by a plural, adding -s. When 'y' follows the consonant, changing 'y' to 'i' and adding -es. When 'y' follows the vowel, the plural is formed 'y' and adding -s.
