This thick paperback summarizes each time period in several short chapters of 20 pages each. The sections end with skills development activities, eight multiple-choice questions and four short answers to questions. Each period includes several long essay requests as well as a documentary question. The book concludes with a full practical exam. AMSCO was not designed as a textbook, but many teachers use it this way. The argument is that it is very difficult to get high school students to read textbooks at the college level. This has sparked lively debate in online teacher forums! Many believe that students should learn to read the dense text of non-fiction. Others find that the compressed coverage in AMSCO is much better preparation than reading nothing. The College Board reacted calmly to the debate by including AMSCO in its list of textbooks. Since this is not a popular book for school use, there are not many support materials on the internet.
