THE UNITY TOWER

The Orchard Lake Schools have embarked on the restoration of the historic campus tower, one of the institution's most recognizable landmarks. REFLECTION

Each year on August 6, we celebrate the Feast of the Transfiguration of the Lord. It commemorates the biblical event when Jesus Christ revealed his divine glory to the Apostles Peter, James, and John on a high mountain. The event of the Transfiguration is recorded in three Gospels: Matthew 17:1-9, Mark 9:2-8, and Luke 9:28-36. Jesus took the Apostles Peter, James, and John with Him up upon a mountain,

and while they were on the mountain Jesus was transfigured. His face shone like the sun, and His garments became glistening white. Tradition names Mount Tabor as the site of the revelation. A church first raised there in the fourth century was dedicated on August 6. A feast in honor of the Transfiguration was celebrated in the Eastern Church from about that time. Western observance began in some localities about the eighth century. Here is the address of St. John Paul II delivered on August 6, 1999, during the commemorative Mass for Pope Paul VI

In the Words of

ST. JOHN PAUL II

Today, the Eucharist which we are preparing to celebrate takes us in spirit to Mount Tabor together with the Apostles Peter, James and John, to admire in rapture the splendour of the transfigured Lord. In the event of the Transfiguration we contemplate the mysterious encounter between history, which is being built every day, and the blessed inheritance that awaits us in heaven in full union with Christ, the Alpha and the Omega, the Beginning and the End.

We, pilgrims on earth, are granted to rejoice in the company of the transfigured Lord when we immerse ourselves in the things of above through prayer and the celebration of the divine mysteries. But, like the disciples, we too must descend from Tabor into daily life where human events challenge our faith. On the mountain we saw; on the paths of life we are asked tirelessly to proclaim the Gospel which illuminates the steps of believers.

This deep spiritual conviction guided the whole ecclesial mission of my venerable Predecessor, the Servant of God Paul VI, who returned to the Father's house precisely on the Feast of the Transfiguration, 21 years ago now. In the reflection he had planned to give at the Angelus on that day, 6 August 1978, he said: "The Transfiguration of the Lord, recalled by the liturgy of today's solemnity throws

a dazzling light on our daily life, and makes us turn our mind to the immortal destiny which that fact foreshadows". Yes! Paul VI reminds us: we are made for eternity and eternity begins at this very moment, since the Lord is among us and lives with and in his Church.

As we commemorate my unforgettable Predecessor in the see of Peter with deep emotion, let us pray that every Christian will know how to draw courage and constancy from contemplating Christ, who "reflects the glory of God and bears the very stamp of his nature" (Heb 1:3), in order to proclaim and witness faithfully through his words and works.

May Mary, our tender and caring Mother, help us to be bright rays of the saving light of her Son Jesus.



St. John Paul II Liturgical Center Celebrates

USA'S SEMIQUINCENTENNIAL



On Sunday, July 5, 2026, the St. John Paul II Liturgical Center sponsored a joyful and heartfelt celebration of America's 250th anniversary — and the dawn of its next 250 years. The theme woven through the entire 1:00 PM Polish Mass was simple and powerful: gratitude for the past, hope for the future.

Speaking for the Polonia community, Joe Majcher shared deep appreciation for the United States, a country that welcomed millions of Polish immigrants from the earliest days of Jamestown, Virginia. Those men and women arrived with courage, skills, and dreams, and although their lives were not easy, they helped build a nation that offered their children and grandchildren opportunities beyond what was possible in Poland at the time.

Among those immigrants was Fr. Józef Dąbrowski, whose journey to America made possible something

profoundly meaningful to all of us: the founding of the Orchard Lake Schools in 1885. His vision, sacrifice, and belief in the future of Polonia and the United States created the very campus we cherish today. Without his immigration — without his willingness to leave Poland in search of a place where faith and culture could flourish — the Orchard Lake community as we know it might never have existed. His legacy stands as a living testament to what one immigrant's courage and determination can build for generations.

Today, as large waves of immigration fade into history, the torch passes to the younger generation. They are now the guardians of Polish language and culture in America — and during the celebration, they shone brightly. The youth choir Laurki, lovingly organized by our organist, Mrs. Kinga Kostreva, filled the church with Polish hymns and later honored the United States with touching performances of "God Bless America" and "America the Beautiful." Their voices beautifully united two identities: Polish roots and American home.

Mass was celebrated by our own Fr. Bernard Witek and a visiting priest from Poland, and the entire liturgy became a moment of unity, remembrance, and heartfelt emotion — a reminder that gratitude binds generations, and hope carries our heritage forward.

Witek for his faithful priestly ministry, his care for our students and community, and his dedication to preserving and advancing the spiritual legacy entrusted to OLS. We will work closely and in consultation with the Most Reverend Edward J. Weisenburger, Archbishop of Detroit, to identify a priest to succeed Fr. Witek and to ensure the continued celebration of the sacraments and the ongoing pastoral and spiritual care of the OLS and Polonia community.

Additional information regarding this transition will be shared as plans are finalized. In the months ahead, the OLS community will have an opportunity to express its appreciation to Fr. Witek and to recognize his service. We ask our community to join us in prayers of gratitude for Fr. Witek's ministry and to pray that the Lord will continue to bless and guide him as he prepares for the next chapter of his priestly service.

August also offers an opportunity for reflection. On August 1, we commemorate the anniversary of the **Warsaw Uprising**, honoring the extraordinary

On August 15, Poland celebrates the **Feast of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary** and the **Day of the Polish Armed Forces**, two observances that beautifully unite faith, patriotism, and remembrance. These occasions remind us that Polish heritage is preserved not only through remembrance of the past, but through the music, art, literature, scholarship, and community we continue to cultivate today. We look forward to welcoming you back to the Galeria and the Polish Institute this fall.

Filmmaker Patrick Ney's North American

DOCUMENTARY PREMIERE



During his stay, Ney spent a day exploring the archival collections of the Polish Institute of Culture & Research at Orchard Lake and visited Holy Sepulchre Cemetery where many Blue Army veterans are laid to rest. A stop at Detroit's historic Sweetest Heart of Mary Church further deepened his appreciation for the faith, sacrifice, and perseverance that have sustained Polish communities on both sides of the Atlantic.

On June 20 at the Galeria, the Polish Institute of Culture & Research (PICR) welcomed more than 100 guests for a memorable evening celebrating history, sacrifice, and the enduring legacy of Polonia. The program featured the North American premiere of *Covenant of Blood: The Last Soldiers of World War II* and our special exhibition, *Faces of Polonia: America's 250th Anniversary Edition*.

Fresh from its premiere in England, *Covenant of Blood* introduced North American audiences to the story of the Żołnierze Wyklęci (the “Cursed Soldiers,” members of the Polish anti-communist resistance) who continued their struggle for freedom in the aftermath of World War II. Filmmaker Patrick Ney, a native of the United Kingdom who currently resides in Poland, traveled to Michigan to present the documentary and spent the weekend immersed in the history and traditions of Detroit Polonia. Following the screening, he engaged guests in a lively Q & A session, sharing insights into the making of the film and the importance of preserving these stories for future generations.

Guests also enjoyed *Faces of Polonia: America's 250th Anniversary Edition*, a special exhibition commemorating America's 250th anniversary and highlighting the lives, stories, and contributions of metro Detroit Polonia. Through photographs and personal memories, the exhibit celebrates a community whose devotion to faith, family, and country has enriched both Michigan and the nation.

Together, the film and exhibition offered two powerful and complementary narratives: one recalling the heroism of those who resisted communist oppression and the other celebrating generations of Poles and Polish Americans who helped build and strengthen America. It was an evening filled with reflection, discovery, and pride—a fitting tribute to freedom and to the enduring Polish spirit.

The PICR extends its heartfelt gratitude to everyone who joined us for this historic occasion and to Patrick Ney for bringing *Covenant of Blood* to North America and for embracing the rich heritage of Detroit Polonia during his visit.
