New Kickstart Scholarship Program Targets Those 24 and Older

Kickstart Wyoming's Tomorrow Scholarship is an exciting new statewide program offering up to \$1,800 per semester toward tuition at Wyoming's eight community colleges and the University of



Wyoming.

The new state-funded scholarship program is for those age 24 and older who want to pursue degrees or certificates, or who need to take more classes to finish degrees they already started.

Kickstart Wyoming's Tomorrow Scholarship was created and funded by the Wyoming Legislature to help working adults obtain the skills and education necessary to reenter the workforce, move up in their current careers or pursue new career paths.

Those eligible could receive up to \$1,800 per semester if they are enrolled in 12 or more credit hours, and students are eligible for up to four full-time academic terms.

"What a great opportunity for our adult learners in Southwest Wyoming to either start or finish their degrees and pursue certificates needed to achieve their career goals," Western Wyoming Community College President Dr. Dale shared. "Western was able to expend their funds before the Fall 2023 semester started. There is a definite need for these dollars, and we cannot thank the legislation for their vision and support of this program."

Scholarship funds are limited, so all awards are dependent on funding availability. Beyond the age requirement, applicants must be Wyoming residents, complete a Free Application for Federal Student Aid and register for the Wyoming at Work program through the Wyoming Department of Workforce Services. This program provides access to information and career resources to assist in the job search process. For more information on the program, <u>CLICK HERE</u>.

The Wyoming's Tomorrow Scholarship program and its initial endowment fund contribution of \$10M were established by the 2022 Wyoming State Legislature. Currently, the scholarship program endowment fund is only partially funded, so the 2023 Legislature set aside \$1.25M to "kickstart" the scholarship program until its endowment fund reaches the required \$50M and the scholarship is fully funded. By kickstarting the scholarship program, scholarship funds are available now rather than later to assist those that want to pursue their degree or certificate at a Wyoming college or university.



Governor Highlights Early Successes of Wyoming Innovation Partnership
October 26, 2023 In 2021 Governor Mark Gordon launched the Wyoming Innovation Partnership (WIP) utilizing federal funds to support economic growth and diversification, and build a highly skilled Wyoming workforce. Phase I of WIP was launched in 2022, and a recently released report highlights the partnerships that have led to early success.

"The Phase I report showcases the impact WIP has already made across the state, and we are just getting started," Governor Gordon said. "WIP marks an important watershed in how we think about post-secondary education. Instead of only talking about a program, we will now be able to evaluate its progress, its performance and its value. WIP program graduates will secure quality jobs with Wyoming companies, ensuring they can advance their careers while remaining in the state."

The first phase of WIP sought to address workforce gaps across the state that included energy, tourism and hospitality, healthcare and entrepreneurship. Nearly 500 students enrolled in WIP programs, there were 469 workforce training participants and 29 programs were developed or are in progress.

The WIP collaboration includes the University of Wyoming and the state's eight community colleges, as well as the Wyoming Business Council, Wyoming Department of Workforce Services and the Wyoming Department of Education. Programs launched during Phase I include:

- \cdot The development of Wyoming's first applied software development degrees through a partnership with Sheridan College and the University of Wyoming
- · A Powerline Technology program at Western Wyoming Community College
- · An Echocardiology program at Laramie County Community College
- · Support for expanded efforts at the University of Wyoming's Center for Entrepreneurship and Innovation.

SWMP Recognized at the Governor's Business forum as a Wyoming Success Story



The Southwest Wyoming Manufacturing Partnership had the honor of presenting at the 40th Annual Governor's Business Forum, highlighting the remarkable success achieved through their collaboration with educators. They emphasized the importance of bridging the gap between industry and education, and how this partnership has positively impacted the manufacturing sector in the region. By working closely with educators, they have been able to align curriculum with industry needs, providing students with the skills and knowledge required for the job market. This collaboration has not only increased the employability of graduates but has also boosted the competitiveness and growth of the manufacturing sector in Southwest Wyoming. The presentation served as a testament to the power of partnerships between industry and education in driving economic progress and creating a skilled workforce.

What does collaborative success actually look like?

The synergy between Western Wyoming Community College (WWCC), with the Powerline Technology Program, and the Southwest Wyoming Manufacturing Partnership epitomizes the essence of collaborative success. WWCC's commitment to launching the Powerline Technology Program in Fall 2022 demonstrates a proactive response to local and statewide industry needs for skilled powerline technicians. This innovative initiative was not created in isolation; it is the fruit of cooperative dialogue and input from local industry partners, such as Rocky Mountain Power, Rural Electric Association, UWA 127 and IBEW 57, among others. These partnerships have been crucial in shaping a curriculum that aligns with the real-world demands of employers, ensuring that graduates are not only educated but truly ready to meet the challenges of the field.

The program is possible through funding from a broader initiative known as the Wyoming Innovation Partnership (WIP), championed by Governor Mark



Gordon. WIP represents a transformative approach to post-secondary education and workforce development, emphasizing strategic collaboration between the state's higher education institutions. Through WIP, nearly 500 students enrolled in innovative programs addressing workforce gaps in critical sectors such as energy, tourism, and healthcare. This alliance exemplifies how joining forces can result in a fortified educational offering that promises quality jobs and career advancement opportunities, keeping talent within the state.

Collaborative efforts underscore the power of partnerships in fostering economic growth and diversification. By connecting education with industry through initiatives like the Powerline Technology Program, Wyoming is setting a precedent for how targeted educational programs can fill workforce gaps and support local economies. The success of these endeavors, as seen in the early triumphs of WIP, signals a promising future where educational institutions and industry partnerships work in concert to achieve common goals, ensuring that individual success translates into prosperity for the entire community.

In November, Green River High School held its Perkins Advisory Meeting. This year, instead of telling the community how Perkins funds are used in Career and Technical Education (CTE) programs, students showcased their work and how to progress from entry-level classes to advanced-level classes.

LaBarge captures between 6 and 7 million metric tons of CO2 per year, which is nearly 20% of all CO2 captured in the world annually.

Our CCS expansion plans at LaBarge will capture an additional 1 million metric tons of Co2, bringing ExxonMobil's total global capture capacity of CO2 to about 10 million metric tons per year.

The LaBarge expansion project will require around \$400 million in investment. We anticipate it will create some 400 jobs during construction and add another 10-15 long-term roles to our employee base of 200.
