For the corporate event, everyone was advised to wear formal **attire**.

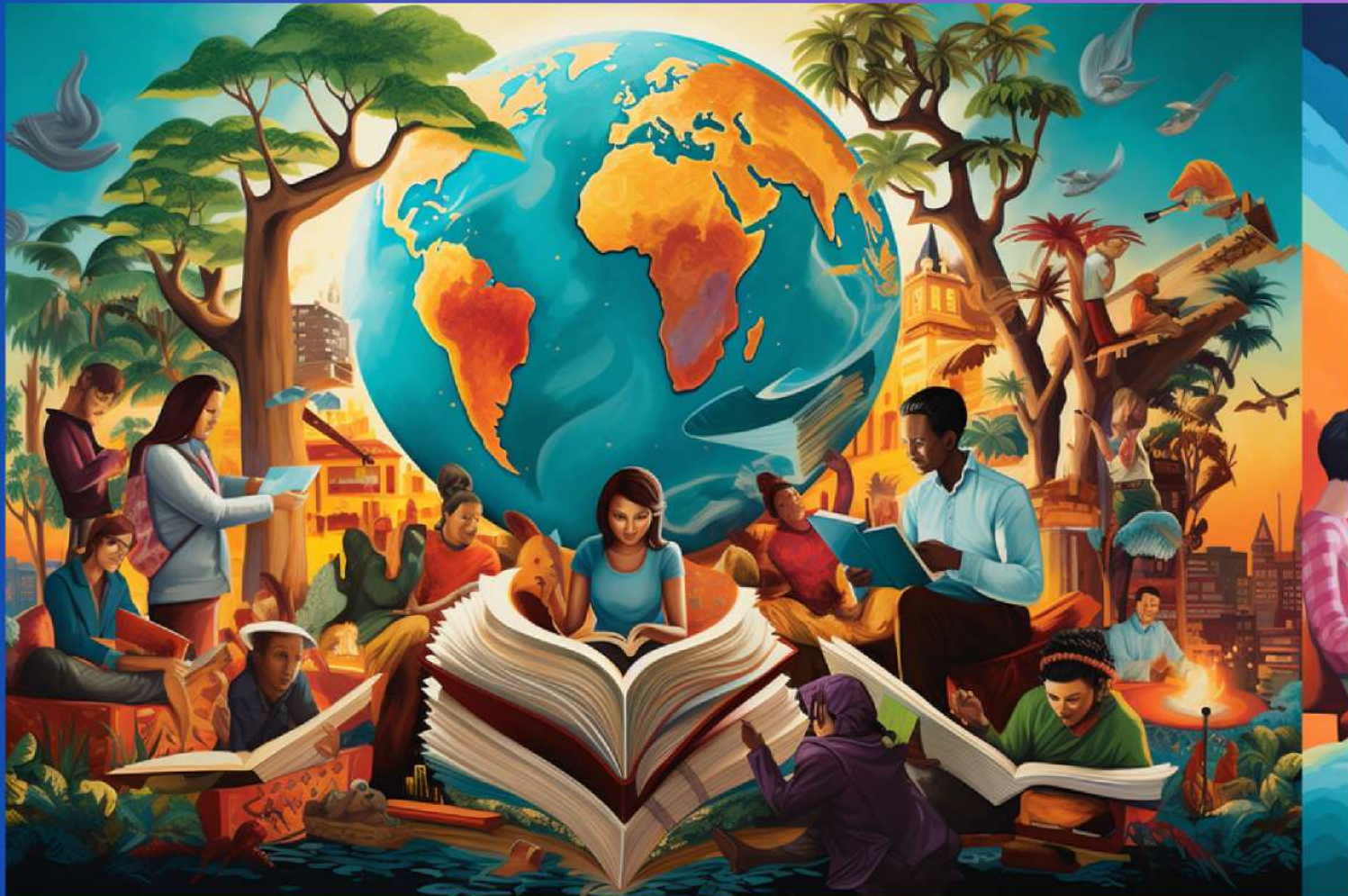
Culture - Vocabulary

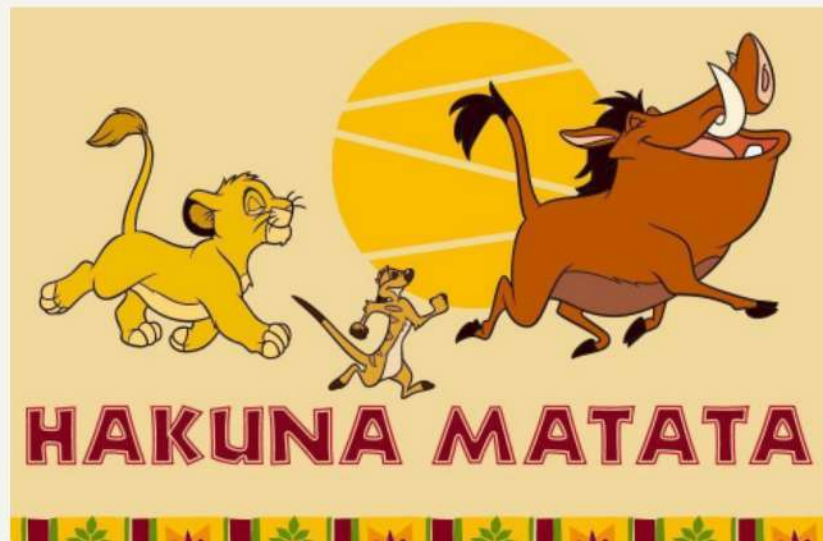


Ready for a Safari?

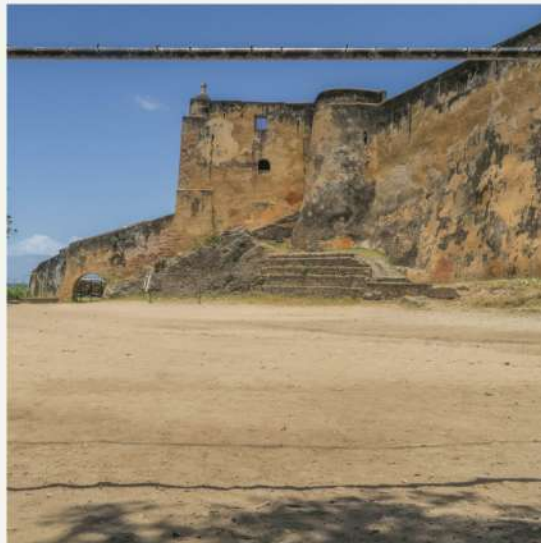
