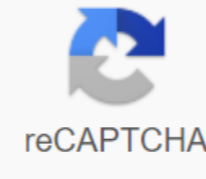




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## Jim edmonds net worth 2018

St. Louis Cardinals, San Diego Padres, Chicago Cubs, Milwaukee Brewers and Cincinnati Reds of Major League Baseball (MLB). Known for his defensive ability, Edmonds was also a prolific hitter, batting .284 with 393 home runs and an on-base-plus slugging percentage (OPS) of .903. He is affectionately known to Cardinal fans as Jimmy Baseball and Jimmy Ballheim. Edmonds was born on June 27, 1970, in Fullerton, California. His parents divorced when he was a child and had joint custody. His father's house was a few hundred feet from Anaheim Stadium. He attended Diamond Bar High School in Diamond Bar, in the Eastern District of Los Angeles. Edmonds' professional career was selected in the seventh round of the 1988 Major League Baseball draft by the California Angels. He injured his shoulder in high school, causing him to fall in the draft. After the draft, he was assigned to the Bend Bucks (in Bend, Oregon), a branch of the Angels' A-Short Season in the Northwest League. In 1988, he played in 35 games for the Bucks and hit .221. The following year, he was promoted to four cities by the Angels, a class-A affiliate team in the Midwest League. He played in 31 games and hit .261. In 1990, Edmonds went on to play for the Palm Springs Angels, the highest-A team in the California League. He played 91 games and hit .293. He stayed with Palm Springs during the 1991 season as well. In 1992, he was promoted to Double-A with the Midland Angels in the Texas League. He hit .313 in 70 games for Midland. He was promoted again in 1992, moving to Triple-A Edmonton Trappers for 50 games. The Angels changed the Triple-A team in 1993, so Edmonds played for the Vancouver Canadians. Edmonds was traded from Anaheim to St. Louis for second baseman Adam Kennedy and pitcher Kent Bottenfield shortly before the start of the 2000 season. Throughout his career, Edmonds played in the middle of the field. However, he played first base in stretches, usually as a result of an injury, starting first baseman, but sometimes just provide rest for players to regular position, or give another outfielder game time. For example, Edmonds made six starts at first when Albert Pujols suffered an oblique injury in June 2006. He also pitched two innings while in the high-a ball in 1991. Edmonds hit 30 or more home runs in five seasons, while maintaining a .284 career batting average, and tapped for 1,199 runs in his career. He also received eight Golden Gloves awards in his career in center field, most of them coming as a member of the St. Louis Cardinals. Three of Edmonds' most spectacular defensive plays came while at the Cardinals and Angels. On June 10, 1997, playing in center field for the Anaheim Angels, Edmonds ran straight to the center wall of the Kauffman Field Stadium in Kansas City, and dove stretched for a fly ball over his head, making a catch on the warning track. His other memorable catch came when the St. Louis Cardinals on July 16, 2004, while covering center field against Reds batter Jason LaRue. LaRue hit a deep shot into center field that would surely have been enough to be a home run. On a dead run, Edmonds scaled the wall, reached all over his right hand over the fence, and caught the ball. In the 2004 NLCS against the Houston Astros, Edmonds made a diving, game-saving catch. Edmonds' 2004 season of batting for the Cardinals in the 2007 2004 season was Edmonds' best season. He hit .301, had a .643 slugging percentage, 42 HRs, and 111 RBI; All but the batting average had career highs. As a result, he received the Silver Slugger Award, the Golden Glove, and was fifth in the voting for most valuable player award. The defining moment of Edmonds' career came in 2004 in the National League Championship Series, in which Edmonds hit an extra-inning home run to win Game 6. In Game 7, Edmonds made an impressive defensive play at center, helping the Cardinals win the pennant. During a Chicago Cubs-Cardinals game at Wrigley Field on July 19, 2004, pitcher Carlos Zambrano was ejected from the game for throwing at Edmonds. He yelled at Edmonds as he rounded the bases on a home run, earning Zambrano a five-game disqualification. Edmonds, along with Albert Puyols and Scott Ralino, earned the nickname MV3 for the phenomenal 2004 seasons. Edmonds was on the cover of the 2004 MLB video game Slugfest. After 2005 Edmonds was batting for the Chicago Cubs in 2008. On Mother's Day, May 14, 2006, Edmonds was one of more than 50 attackers who brandished a pink bat in favor of the Breast Cancer Foundation. In 2006, Edmonds helped the St. Louis Cardinals win their first World Series title since 1982, contributing four RBIs. In the last two seasons in St. Louis and 2007), Edmonds struggled with the syndrome after a concussion, caused dizziness and blurred vision. On December 14, 2007, Edmonds was traded to the San Diego Padres in exchange for prospect David Freese. As part of the deal, the Cardinals also agreed to pay part of Edmonds' salary in 2008. Edmonds' 241 home with the Cardinals are the fourth-largest in franchise history. On May 9, 2008, the Padres released it, hitting just .178 with one home run in 90 bats. On May 14, 2008, the Chicago Cubs, needing a left-handed bat, signed Edmonds to a one-year contract, of which the Cubs were only responsible for the league minimum. He started the next day against his former team, the Padres, and went 1 for 4. Edmonds wasn't well received initially by fans in Chicago, but after joining the Cubs, he hit more than .300 with eight home runs in the first six weeks. On June 21, 2008, Edmonds hit two home runs in the fourth inning against the Chicago White Sox. He also had two other multi-homer games like Cub: one on July 31, 2008 against the Milwaukee Brewers and one on August 8, 2008 against his former team, the St. Louis Cardinals. Edmonds returned to the Milwaukee Brewers in 2010. Edmonds didn't play in 2009 because he didn't get what he or his agent thought was a good offer. In January 2010, he announced his intention to return to majors. On January 28, Edmonds signed with the Milwaukee Brewers. The Brewers added him to the league's main roster on March 25. At the time, he said, Last year was a mistake, I had to play somewhere. On August 9, 2010, Edmonds was traded to the Cincinnati Reds in exchange for Chris Dickerson. Both Edmonds and Dickerson had to clear waivers because the non-failure trade deadline had already passed. On February 4, 2011, Edmonds signed with the St. Louis Cardinals; However, after continuing symptoms of a strained Achilles tendon sustained during the 2010 season, Edmonds officially announced his retirement from baseball on February 18, 2011. On March 14, 2013, Fox Sports Midwest announced the firing of Jim Edmonds as a member of their St. Louis Cardinals broadcasting team. Edmonds will serve as an analyst during the Cardinals Live pre-season and postgame broadcasts. He replaced former Cardinals pitcher Cal Eldred, who served in the same role for FSM since 2009 and moved on to become a special assistant to the Cardinals organization. Edmonds expressed a desire to one day be part of the Cardinals' ownership team. Edmonds has two daughters with his first wife, Leigh Ann Horton. She died in 2015. Edmonds and second wife Allison Jane Rascoe were married from 2008 to 2014; together they have two children, a boy and a girl. Edmonds married Megan O'Toole King on October 24, 2014. Megan's sister - professional football player Julie Megan joined the cast of The Real Housewives of Orange County in 2015. Edmonds himself also appears on the show. They had a daughter on Thanksgiving 2016. On November 27, 2017, it was announced that the couple are expecting twin boys together in June 2018. The twin boys were born on June 5, 2018. On October 25, 2019, Edmonds filed for divorce from Megan, the day after her fifth wedding anniversary. On March 28, 2020, it was reported that Edmonds had been hospitalized and was undergoing COVID-19 tests. Later, in April and May, in numerous interviews, Edmonds confirmed that he had fully recovered from the disease. A business venture after retiring from baseball, Edmonds remained in the St. Louis area for several years, where he was involved in the restaurant business. In September 2013, Jim Edmonds 15 Steakhouse closed in St. Louis, which he owned at 50 percent and was named after his jersey number. In December 2013, Edmonds and his business partner Mark Winfield reopened The Precinct's Jim Edmonds 15 Steakhouse. The restaurant was called the safest bar in the city as well as home of the hottest wings. The first claim, like the name of the restaurant itself, was an attempt to become a hangout of city police officers as soon as they moved into their new headquarters just around the corner. Police themed memorabilia shared space on the walls with framed Cardinals jerseys and flat-screen televisions. Edmonds and Winfield continued to collaborate in the restaurant business with the opening of Winfield Gathering Place in Kirkwood, Missouri as a barbecue-style restaurant. He doesn't promote the Edmonds celebrity brand. In fact, there are no Edmonds, Cardinals or other sports memorabilia, although there are TVs in both the dining room and bar to watch games. The site closed in May 2015. On July 2, 2016, Winfield closed. The Edmonds Cardinals Hall of Fame award speech by Edmonds' fielding ability earned him recognition from major league coaches and managers who voted for him to be the Rawlings Golden Glove winner eight times in nine seasons from 1997 to 2005. ESPN's Rob Neyer lists Edmonds as #12 of the top 100 players of the first decade of the 21st century because of his performance at the plate and gold glove skills in center field. On August 8, 2014, Edmonds was inducted into the St. Louis Cardinals Hall of Fame. He was declared a candidate for the National Baseball Hall of Fame and Museum on November 9, 2015, but was eliminated from the ballot on January 6, 2016, receiving only 2.5% of the vote in his first year in office.
